To say that these efforts have fallen between these extremes. Men have been put to work by the hundreds of thousands -- men who had had little or no work for two or threeyears, and had been forced to suffer the ignominy of organized charity in order to keep their families and themselves from utter privation. Wages have been appreciably raised and the sweat-shop encouraged by the depression, has been eliminated. Child labor is on the wane. The C. C. C. camps, whatever their shortcomings, have served to provide thousands of young men with useful work under army pay and discipline, and have kept them away from debilitating and demoralizing influences.

And in other fields the Administration has much on which it can hopestly pride itself. It has started a program whereby the transportation difficulties of the country may eventually be solved. It has done a good job in solidifying and safeguarding the banking structure. It has attempted to protect the public against stock swindlers and fly-bynight promoters, who reaped so fine a harvest in the boom years and even after. It has created machinery seeking to encourage home financing and private construction.

This is all on the credit side of the ledger. The entries on the debit side are not less important -- and it does the country and the Administration no service to overlook them. All great experimental movements breed errors--and Mr. Roosevelt and his advisories would have been a great deal more than human had they avoided them. * * * * * * * * * "People are crying that the depression is terrible, that they cannot get as much to eat as formerly. I believe if they will just grasp Opportunity by the horn and put forth every effort there is no reason for their pantry shelves to be empty, their children crying for food, and their husbands out of sort." So speaks Mrs. O. C. Barlow, a Kaufman county farm wife who has 984 quarts of fruits, vegetables and meats on her pantry shelves as a result of her work as a home demonstration club 4-H pantry demonstrator at Prairieville.

Twenty-eight Nolan county 4-H club boys put baby beeves on home grown rations of ground mile heads. bundle sorghum and cottonseed meal in November in preparation for a cattle show May 15th.

From a 2-acre pecan orchard put out 18 years ago, but which really started 7 years ago when he began top working unprofitable trees to improved varieties, S. R. Buchanari of Saratoga, Hardin county, has sold \$200 worth of pecans and has several hundred pounds on hand to sell. the county agent reports.

A local canning record has been established by Mrs. Y. R. Gaither. home demonstration club 4-H pantry demonstrator in Johnson county. She has 1633 containers of food. Everything in the pantry was produced on the farm execept 1-2 bushel of apples.

A small farm poultry flock, if, properly managed, is still a good paying investment, says the county agent in Blanco county, who points to the year's records of four demonstrators. A total of 929 hens laid an average of 157 1-2 eggs each at a feed cost of 4.8 cents per dozen. Total income per hen was 84 cents.



DESCRIBES FARM **ADJUSTMENT PLAN**

Agricultural College President Says Federal Program Seeks to Coordinate Production with Reduced Exports

The Federal farm adjustment program is partly guide by the belief that export of agricultural commodities will not soon recover its volume of five or ten years ago, in the opinion of F. D. Farrell. President Kansas Agricultural College, writing in the August issue of the American Bankere Association Journal.

"Nobody knows whether the farm adjustment program will succeed." writes Mr. Farrell. "Its sponsors describe it frankly as an experiment. It seeks to socialize agriculture at least to the extent that farmers, in what is believed to be the public interest, will restrain their production activities and that processors, distributors and consumers will contribute something to ward paying farmers for exercising this restraint. The adjustment programs definitely are based on the fact that prices are determined primarily by supply an., demand. They also are based on the assumption that the export business in agricultural commodities will not soon return to its volume of five or ten years ago.

Dependence on Public Support

"The plan offers wheat price insurance for 1933, 193; and 1935, for the domestically consumed portion of the wheat crop. The insured price is to he sufficiently high to give the do mestically consumed portion of the wheat crop pre-war purchasing power. if the plan is as effective as its sponsors hope it will be, the reduction in supply may influence wheat prices so that the entire wheat crop will have pre-war purchasing power.

"If the adjustment program succeeds, its launching probably will mark the end of an era of extreme individualism in agriculture in the United States," says Mr. Farrell.

Recent fundamental changes led Secretary Wallace to say, 'What we really have to do is to change the whole psychology of the people of the United States. This is a large order. it involves the whole program of farm adjustment as well as the larger as ional economic program, of which farm adjustment is a part. if the people decline to participate in the program to the extent necessary to give the experiment a fair trial, we shall never know whether farm 44justment as now proposed would have succeeded or not if it had been given

How long does it take to go from here to San Antonio, six hours? Well I'm here to brag about a chap that made it in one hour and seven minutes flat-yes sir, three and onehalf miles per minute. > Three brand new Keystone bombers from the San Antonio air depot at Duncan Field arrived here 1 p.m. December 30th. Each of these ships was crewed by 1 pilot and 1 mechanic. Their destination was Rockwell Field. Calif., where they will be received by the 11th Bombardment Squadron to be used in connection with 1934 tactical manoeuvers. Two Wright Cyclone 600 horsepower engines 3 bladed propelors furnished the driving power of these enormous mechanical birds allowing them to cruise at 140 miles per hour. The war time crew of these airplanes consist of 1 pilot, 1 mechanic, 1 radio operator and 2 nachine gunners. A 50 cal. machine gun is mounted for the front cockpit, commonly known as the "meatcan" and a similar gun is mounted for the rear cockpit. Two 30 cal., nachine guns are mounted on the fusalage, at a 45 degree angle and manned by either the pilot or mechanic. In addition to the above, twenty-four 50 pounds bombs, 12 in the fusalage and 12 in the bombracks which are fixed under the wings, or one 1,000 pound bomb can be suspended on a special rack under the fusulage. Five gas tanks-3 on the top wings and 2 on the lower wings-holds 400 gallons of gasoline which is dissipated at the rate of 70 gallons an hour for both engines. An individual oil tank for each engine holds 46 quarts. This oil is changed every 30 hours (flying time). Ninety-five per cent of this oil is reclaimed, scientific tests having proven that this oil is equal to new oil. The process of reclaimation is infinate.
