According to Mr. Alvey, all loans will be made on a business basis and according to the security furnished by the applicant.

"The loans that will be made in this county and the other 7 counties served by the Uvalde association must be good loans and loans that are collectible if the association is to continue as a permanent service to farmers in this and other communities, as intended," Mr Alvey

"Fortunately, not all farmers in this county need credit," he continued, "but for those who do the association stands as a business organization-not as a charity institution. Loans may be obtained for periods of 3 to 12 months by any eligible deserving farmer or stockman who needs credit and has security; but if a farmer or stockman is eligible for credit it must be extended on a business basis."




