ABUSES OF THE LAW

At a recent annual meeting of the American Bar Association it was openly admitted by prominent members that public confidence in the courts and their administration of the law is being steadily weakened.

A report was adopted denouncing "the growing prevalency of the use of expert witnesses, with their conflicting testimony." This referred particularly to the use of alienists in criminal cases, where experts may always be secured to testify that the accused is insane, provided he has the money to employ them.

As a matter of fact, lawyers in convention very frequently criticise the prevailing method of criminal procedure, but so far they have done very little to correct it.

Countryside Broadcasting Edited by Jno. V. McCall, Pastor Sanderson Presbyterian Church

August is the month for evangelistic meetings in many country churches. These annual revivals have in the past served to awaker. whole countrysides to the vital need of religion. Such times of emphasis seem to be necessary, but why not have in every country church a program that will maintain the revival spirit throughout the year?

-:- -:- -:-The country churches which are dependent alone upon the annual revival and once or twice a month preaching have not succeeded very well. There are but few rural communities in which the churches are really functioning. It is true that there are many little buildings and many little organizations, but the country multitudes are as sheepscattered abroad, having no shepherd. Most of these country churches have an occasional preaching service by an absentee minister, but there is no permanent program of teaching or evangelism. Why not maintain a resident pastor?

turn to the New Testament method of the continual revival. One of the prime requisites for the building of the Kingdom of God among the country people is the three hundred and sixty-five day program of evengelism and religious education on the part of the country church.

It requires a higher type of Christian living to be able to carry on continuous activity in soul winning than to do personal work only during the period of an emotional meeting. The prime need of the church is not more members but Christians of a better type.

The church is what its members make it. A country church composed of deeply spiritual, praying, witness-bearing. Christianlike-living members will be a soul-saving institution. It is recorded in the New Testament that "there were added unto the church daily such as should be saved."




