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

A newspaper is somewhat handicapped in advocating an extension of this policy to all tax spending bodies for the reason that it might be a beneficiary of the policy, for the published exhibit of claims is paid matter, and at least one newspaper, eligible to publish items of legal nature, will receive the business. In March, 1933, he was assigned o Fort Worth to succeed Tom Hickman as head of the Rangers in this section. Ranger Leon Hanna will be in charge of the headquarters here until a permanent appointment s made by Governor Ferguson.
