TORNADO STRIKES IN CITY

Estimated Property Damage Between \$10,000 - \$15,000

MEXICAN IS INJURED

C. A. C. HALL HEAVIEST LOSS; MANY HOMES DAMAGED BY FLYING TIMBERS AND SHEET IRON FROM ROOFS

A small tornado roared thru the northeastern part of Sanderson last Friday afternoon about six o'clock causing between \$10,000 and \$15,000 damage to property, but with no loss of life.

About an inch rain fell following the storm, which lasted about twenty minutes, accompanied with considerable hail.

The only injury reported was that suffered by a Mexican, Gabriel Falcon, who was struck in the back by flying timber, inflicting a gash that required several stitches.

Houses were unroofed, barns and other outhouses, in some instances, were completely demolished and several windmills were badly damaged. Fences were levelled, trees and shrubbery were uprooted and otherwise destroyed.

The Catholic Athletic Association hall, located in the eastern section of the city, was totally demolished, only one wall left standing. The roof was carried clear across town damaging many houses that were in its path. Already workmen are busy rebuilding the structure, which was of adobe and stucco construction.

About an hour before the storm struck the city a light shower fell which was followed by an extremely hot spell. Many were unaware of the tornado, thinking it was only a strong wind and duststorm, which are common in this section.

The tornado evidently spent itself here as there were no reports of damage being done outside the city.

Trucks Operated For Hire Must Fly Blue Eagle Plates

Heavy Penalty For Each and Every Day Truck is Operated Without NRA Emblem, July 13 Last Day

Austin.—After July 13 no truck operating for hire without NRA insignia plates will be allowed to work upon any project upon which Federal funds are being spent, according to Col. H. E. Stewart, chairman of the Texas trucking code authority. "This will include much of the road construction, public building renovations and other public works under way," he said.

The names of over 400 truck operators who have not registered under the Code have been certified to NRA Compliance office at San Antonio, according to Mr. Stewart.

"Almost 2000 registrations have been made in Texas," he said, "but of course there are always laggards who stay out until the last minute. July 13 is the last day on which any one operating a truck for hire can operate legally without the NRA plate, but the Code Authority will continue to accept registrations from those who can show reason for not having registered. Anyone who should register and has not done so by that date will be subject to the full penalties of the Recovery Act, and each day is a separate offense under the Code."

Full information on registration may be had from the headquarters of the Code Authority in the Littlefield Bldg., Austin, Texas.

Blaze Sunday Night Reveals Helpless Condition of City

Lunch Room of J. I. Daniels Is Total Loss; To Rebuild

WATER BADLY NEEDED

FIGHTERS HANDICAPPED AND BUSINESS SECTION ENDAN- GERED THROUGH LACK OF FIRE- FIGHTING APPARATUS.

Fire, caused by the explosion of an oil stove, destroyed the Highway Lunch Room in this city Sunday night, and for a while threatened nearby buildings.

The blaze started about 10 o'clock when J. I. Daniels, the owner was preparing to close. He had turned the stove out and was in front checking the day's receipts from the cash register, when he heard the explosion. The alarm was quickly given and soon volunteer firemen were on the job fighting the blaze with tubs, buckets, chemical fire extinguishers and garden hose.

The loss of the building together with the contents amounts to about \$1500 Mr. Daniels stated Monday, and was partially covered by insurance. He also stated that he would rebuild.

Purchase of Cattle Starts in Terrell

Over 1700 Head of Cattle Registered Here This Week

MAYBE SHEEP & GOATS

EFFORT BEING MADE BY SEN. TOM CONNALLY TO HAVE SECRETARY INCLUDE SHEEP AND GOATS.

The emergency drouth relief program for Terrell county was started on Wednesday of this week, when several hundred head of cattle were inspected, appraised and accepted by government representatives in charge of this work. The exact number of cattle accepted could not be ascertained before the Times went to press, as they had not yet been delivered.

More than 1700 head of cattle had been registered this week on the work blanks furnished by Joe Kerr, chairman for this county. It is the belief than over 2000 head will be offered the government before the program is completed.

Under the provisions of purchase the applicant must pen the cattle for inspection and appraisal. Carl Cochran has been appointed appraiser for Terrell county, and Daniel M. Purdy, of the department of agriculture, has been named as

inspector.

May Include Goats and Sheep

Up to date no provision has been made to purchase sheep or goats by the government. Such move in this area would be a real relief. However from Del Rio comes the information that Tom Connally has wired Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace, asking that sheep and goats be placed on the same basis as cattle in designated drouth areas. Senator Connally asked that sheep be valued at \$2.50 a head and goats at \$1.50, on all healthy animals the ranchmen sell to the government.

Docket is Light for July Term of Court

Grand Jury Indicts Three; Recesses Until Saturday

MURDER CASE 17TH

PRESENT TERM LIKELY TO END NEXT WEEK. MANY CASES CONTINUED, THREE SLATED FOR HEARING.

To date very little business had been transacted at the July term of district court which convened here Monday morning with District Judge Brian Montague of Del Rio presiding. Other members of the court in attendance are Mrs. Bell Southernland, court reporter; Julian La-Crosse, district attorney; both of Del Rio, and Sheriff Lee Cook, and District Clerk F. L. Burnside, of this city.

On Monday morning the following were selected from the panel to serve as grand jurors: R. H. Murray, foreman; Ruel Adams, E. McSparren, Kenderick Harrell, D. H. Cunningham, M. R. Lattimore, J. W. Happle, L. A. Lowe, N. E. Charlton, Clyde Higgins, O. H. McAdams, and Donald Duncan.

The grand jurors remained in session until Tuesday afternoon, and

recessed until Saturday morning. Their investigations resulted in returning three indictments, as follows: Braulio Gutierrez, charged with murder; Haymond Everett, driving a car while intoxicated; the third indictment being for child abandonment, in which case no arrest had been made up to yesterday.

On Tuesday several civil cases were called for hearing, the majority being continued. One case, where in Celia Saldivar is suing Melecio Saldivar, was set for hearing next Tuesday, July 17. Another, in which C. F. Haass is suing the T. & N. O. Rty. company, for alleged personal damages, is set for hearing Monday.

The case of Braulio Gutierrez, charged with the fatal shooting of Manuel Coronado on July 4th, has been set for trial on Wednesday, July 18th, a special venire having been summoned from which to select a jury.

The trial of Haymond Everett is set for Friday.

Members of the petit jury reported Thursday morning and were excused until 1 p. m., at which time the case of Kyle Smith, charged with felony, and with theft and burglary, was called for trial, but was postponed until this, Friday, morning, on account of the absence of the principal witness for the state, and said witness was held to be in contempt of court, and fine \$100.

In all probability the court will be in session until the latter part of next week.

OUR FIRE PROTECTION

By all means we should have some kind of an adequate fire protection and means of fighting fires other than a bucket brigade such as fought Sunday night's blaze after a few chemical fire extinguishers had been used up.

Let's take steps now and get an equipment of some kind whereby we may be prepared for the future. It will be a saving in many ways and will cut down our fire rate which we lost this past year the our town was re-rated.

Loans to Farmers and Ranchmen in Drouth Counties Will Get Immediate Attention; See Local Relief Officers

Drouth relief funds from the one hundred million dollar drouth relief appropriation to farmers and stockmen made available by congress for the purchase of feed for farm and range livestock and to plant forage crops in primary drouth areas in Texas, New Mexico and Arizona, will be disbursed immediately, according to announcement made this week by Charles W. Sherrill, regional manager of the Southwestern Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Office of the Production Credit Division, Farm Credit Administration at Dallas.

Mr. Sherrill, returning from a conference in Washington with S. M. Garwood, Production Credit Commissioner, and Norman Monaghan, Assistant Director in charge, has given explanation of the regulations governing the loans to local county administrators of the FERA, county loan committees, county agents, chamber of commerce executives, and field supervisors of the regional office.

In discussing the provisions of the regulations, Mr. Sherrill pointed out that applications can be accepted only from applicants residing in the counties designated as primary drouth areas. Applicants eligible to receive consideration must have no means or other sources of credit enabling them to undertake the production of a forage crop or crops or to purchase feed for their livestock.

Loans will be advanced in monthly installments, with a supplemental application necessary for each and every month's requirements.

The lien securing the promissory note given will be subject to non-disturbance agreement to be executed by lien-holders, if any, who must agree to take no steps to enforce the payment or collection of any claim against the borrower nor dispossess him of any property until January 1, 1936.

Applications must be submitted to the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan committee for the county in which the applicant's livestock is located and/or forage crops to be planted. Headquarters of the county loan committee will be at the office of the local County Relief Administrator who will serve as a member of the county committee. Stenographic and other help will be supplied by the Relief Administration, according to agreements reached in conference with Col. Lawrence Westbrook of the FERA, Mr. Sherrill says.

Persons Refusing Work Are Taken From Relief Roll

The following communication from the Texas Relief Commission, Austin, is for consideration of those on the county relief rolls, Terrell Co.: Upon instructions embraced in a resolution passed by the Texas Relief Commission June 27, 1934, notice is hereby given to the effect that persons physically able to work who are offered employment at the prevailing wage scale in the locality wherein the work is to be performed and who refuses to accept without good cause, shall not be furnished relief.

The following instruction are issued to all citizens of Terrell county, to-wit:

Any person or persons offering employment to others, whether on relief rolls or not, will inform the local county relief board chairman in writing immediately when employment offered by such citizen is refused. Such advice to the county board chairman will include, when possible, the work-seeker's full name, address, employment offered and wages offered.

When any person has been offered employment, and has refused it, under the conditions above stated, the county relief board of Terrell county is prohibited from giving either direct or work relief to such person.

This is published under direction of the Texas Relief Commission, whose membership requests universal cooperation of the people of Texas in support of this action which is directed at the displacement of persons on relief who refuse to accept work.

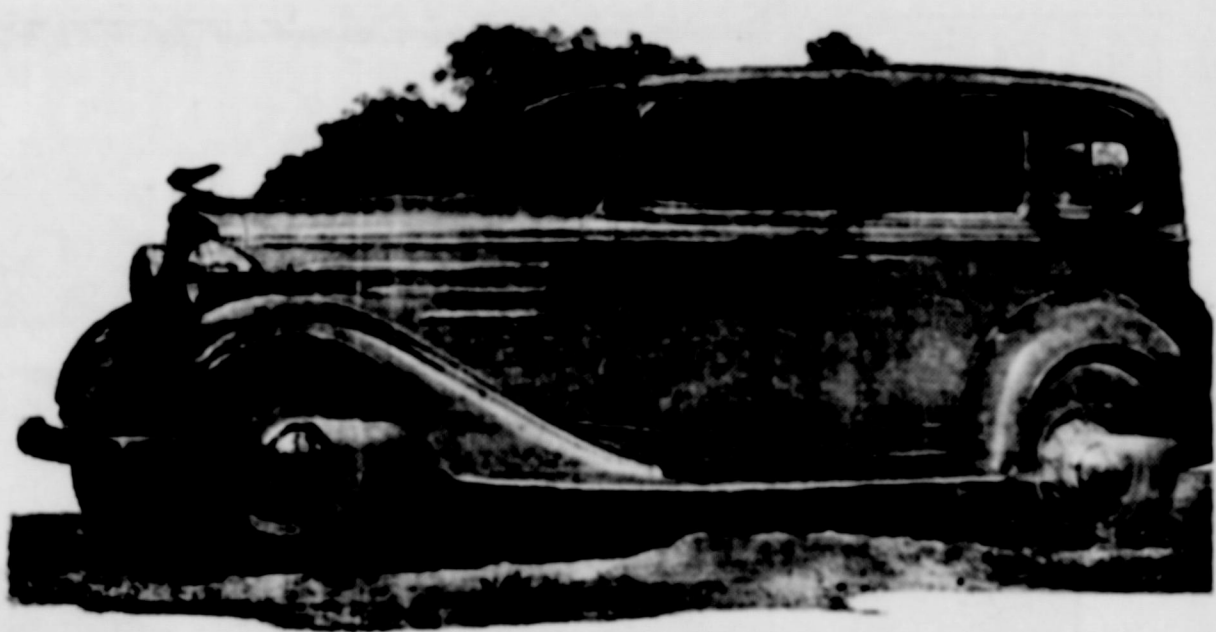

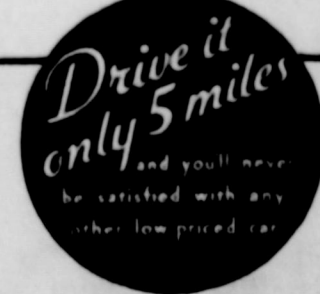
