Area Blessed With Additional Rains

The Friona area enjoyed a second round of rains during the past week, with farmers receiving from an inch to three inches of rainfall in addition to what they had received the previous week.

Official measurement in the city of Friona was 1.69 inches this week. Added to the 1.62 inches received on July 13-14, that makes 3.31 inches for the month, making July easily the year's wettest month, moisture-wise.

"It looks like they got more rain out north and northwest of Highway 60 this time," said Don Huckabee, manager of West Friona Grain. Huckabee indicated that the rainfall amounts seemed to be more skimpy, or spotted, to the south. "Some would get an inch and a half, and the farmer next to him wouldn't have gotten any," Huckabee said.

It was reported that Gerald Wright received 1.25 inches at his place northwest of Friona. Huckabee said he measured an inch of rain at the elevator west of Friona.

Randy Thomas, manager of Attebury Grain at Black, said that farmers in the Black vicinity received anywhere from 1.1 inches to 1.7 inches.

"It's been a life-saver for the corn, which was really needing a boost. We still may not have what you'd term a bumper crop, but these rains will definitely boost the crop yields considerably," Thomas said.

Thomas had heard reports of 1.6 inches of rain to the north of Black, and the 1.7-inch report was between Black and Friona.

County Extension Agent for Agriculture, Gary Patterson, said that up to three inches of rain was received this week in the Farwell area, and Lazbuddie caught from an inch to an inch and one-half.

"The rain has sure helped everything. The corn was getting behind schedule, and it (the rain) was just what it needed," the county agent added.

Patterson noted that the hot temperatures this summer have been great for the county's cotton crop. "It looks extremely good, especially compared to last year," he said. The cotton is fruiting, and there again, the moisture should help the cotton put on more fruit.

Patterson said the county lost a minimal amount of acres to the weather, and there should be between 50,000 and 60,000 acres of cotton in Parmer County this year.

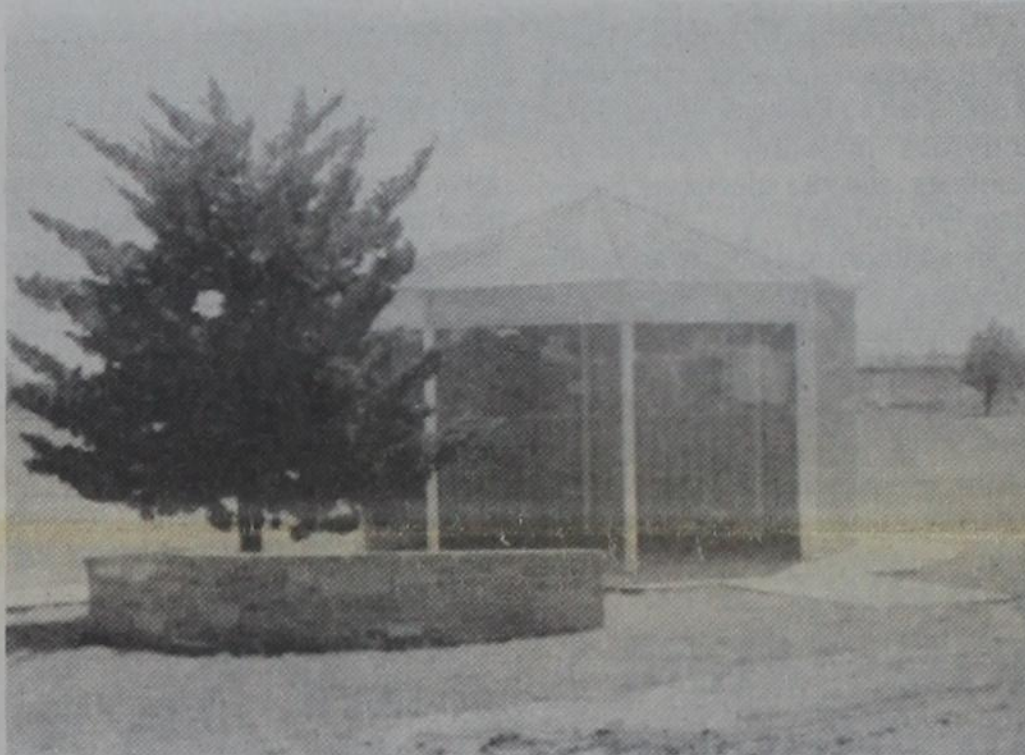
The expected near crop failure, due to the flooding in the Midwest and the drought in the Southeast should result in overall higher prices for area farmers, especially for corn.

Dipping Clinic Scheduled Due To Tick Problem

Dr. Gary Cash, of Friona Veterinary Clinic, has announced that he will be conducting a clinic in the City Park next Thursday evening, July 29 from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. The purpose of the clinic will be to dip dogs for fleas and ticks and cost will be \$10 per dog.

Dr. Cash noted that this area has had an unusually large infestation of ticks this year and he has seen some dogs dying from blood loss by having so many ticks on their bodies.

Anyone whose pets have even a few ticks will want to take advantage of this clinic and, as a follow up, it will be necessary to spray your yards and dog bedding to keep them away from your animal. Cats will not be dipped, however.

Athletes' Physicals Are Slated

Friona High School boys who will be involved in athletics during the coming school year are being advised by Athletic Director Frank Belcher that physicals will be given at Friona Clinic on Thursday, July 29, beginning at 7 a.m.

All boys in grades nine through 12 are asked to take the physicals. A special rate of \$20 per person will be charged on Thursday, Belcher said.

FHS Given Certificate By Governor

Friona High School was recognized by the Texas Successful Schools Awards System with a certificate at a ceremony at the University of Texas in Austin last Saturday, July 17.

Governor Ann Richards presented the award. On hand to receive it were Hal Ratcliff, Superintendent of Schools for the Friona Independent School District, and Cliff Stephens, principal of Friona High School.

FHS qualified for the recognition by scoring ten percentage points above the state average on the Academic Excellence Indication System (AEIS), which includes TAAS Exit Tests and College Entrance exams.

The certificate was signed by Governor Richards and Lionel R. (Skip) Meno, Commissioner of the Texas Education Agency.

"We are very proud of the award, and salute everyone connected with the school for their efforts," said Ratcliff.

Prairie Acres Renovation Completed

Prairie Acres recently finished the first renovation project on its original building at a cost of nearly \$65,000.

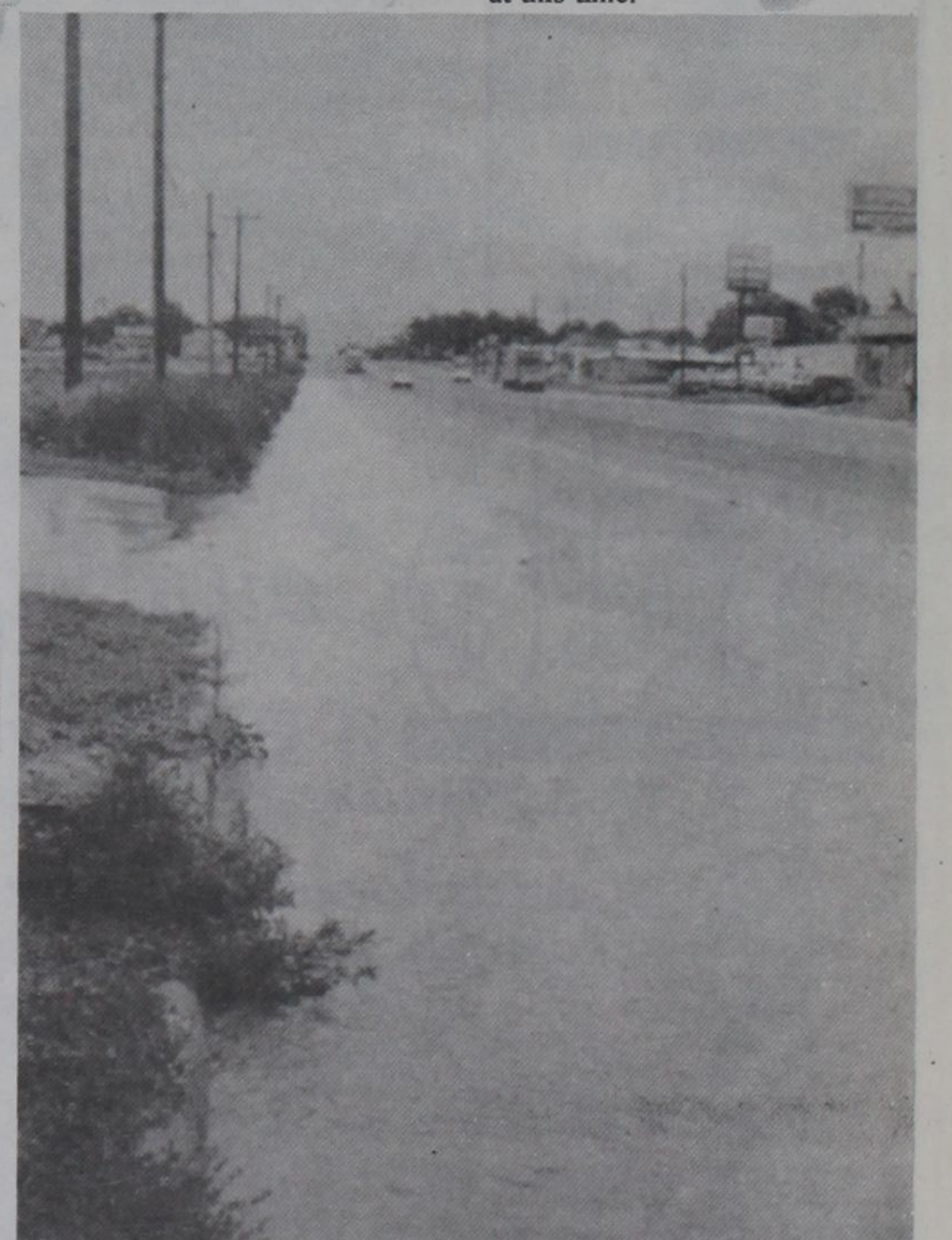
They repainted the entire building, replaced resident cabinets and chairs and bought five wheelchairs. In addition they updated wall monitors in the residents' rooms and linked them to the nurses' station.

They replaced beds and curtains with new blinds and updated the lighting. They removed carpet in some rooms and replaced it with tile and replaced the old carpet in the office with new carpet.

They did receive quite a surprise when they replaced the walk-in refrigerator and freezer. For some reason, the original walk-in was installed without exterior insulation. As a result, the wall and ceiling around the walk-in was frozen solid. Jo Blackwell, Administrator, said that there was anywhere from six inches to nine inches of ice in the walls.

They replaced the walls, added insulation and bought a walk-in unit that is insulated.

The renovation project began in March. The building was opened in 1978 and is owned by the city. They added onto the building in 1989, Blackwell explained and she added that they have 95% occupancy at this time.

Cast Iron Cookware Can Last Through Generations

Several years ago, my husband called me while visiting his hometown, Houston, to let me know he was bringing me a surprise.

Even with the warning, I was not prepared for the large and extremely heavy box that came down the luggage chute at the airport.

He brought me a big box of old cast iron skillet that had been his grandmother's. The collection included a round griddle, two mini-skillets, two regular-sized skillets and a chicken fryer.

The cast iron was coated with black, baked on grease and some pieces were rusted. Having grown up in the non-stick coating era, I didn't know where to begin in making the cookware usable.

I sought advice and received plenty of it. Several people told me to place the cast iron pieces directly in the flames of a campfire. When the fire has burned out and the cast iron is cooled, the pieces should be cleaned and seasoned.

Some people recommended putting the cast iron in the oven on the self-cleaning cycle. A few suggested that I take the skillets down to a radiator shop and have them dipped in acid. (That method is not considered safe by food safety experts.)

The method that Tony and I chose was good old-fashioned elbow grease. We bought a wire brush with a metal scraper on the end and wore it out on the griddle. It took several days of both of us scraping and scrubbing to clean off the years of built up grease.

But, it was worth the effort. After being seasoned, the griddle now has a non-stick surface that is

easy to clean and cooks pancakes almost as good as Tony remembers his grandmother making. The griddle shows no signs of wearing out and probably will last another lifetime.

To season cast iron cookware, coat the piece inside and out with unsalted grease--unsalted pork fat, shortening, oil, etc. Place the greased item in an oven at about 300 to 350 degrees. Leave the cast iron in the oven for one to two hours, swabbing the inside from time to time with a paper towel to re-distribute the grease.

Remove the cast iron from the oven and allow the cookware to cool. When the piece has cooled, wipe out the excess grease.

With careful use and cleaning, cast iron can last for many years. I usually wipe out the griddle with a clean towel, wash it to remove any baked on food particles and dry it thoroughly to prevent possible rusting. If necessary, I apply a thin coat of oil to the griddle before storing it. The seasoning process can be repeated from time to time if needed.

To get the most from your cast iron cookware, keep the following tips in mind:

*Do not pour cold water into a hot, dry skillet; the cast iron can crack.

*Similarly, cast iron can crack when dropped on a hard surface.

*Store in a dry place with lids or tops off.

*Thoroughly dry each piece before storing.

New cast iron cookware also needs to be cleaned and seasoned before being used. New cast iron comes from the factory with a coating that needs to be removed with soap and water before the

cookware is used. After cleaning, season the piece as described above.

Here are a few recipes that are perfect for cast iron skillets, griddles and chicken fryers.

CRISPY FRIED CHICKEN

2-1/2 to 3 pound chicken, cut up
1 cup buttermilk
1 cup all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon black pepper
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
1/2 teaspoon paprika
Vegetable oil for frying

Rinse the chicken pieces and pat dry with paper towels. Put the chicken in a dish or pan; pour buttermilk over chicken. Turn chicken to coat well; cover and refrigerate for 30 minutes to 12 hours, turning two or three times. (Note: do not soak the liver and gizzard in the buttermilk.) Put the flour, salt, pepper, garlic powder and paprika in a plastic or paper bag; close the bag and shake to mix. Remove the chicken from the refrigerator; turn over in the buttermilk to coat once again. Remove one or two pieces at a time and let the excess milk drip off. Drop the chicken pieces into the bag and shake to coat the chicken. Pour oil into a large, heavy skillet to measure 1/2-inch deep. Heat the oil over medium high heat for 4 to 5 minutes. Using tongs, put the coated chicken into the oil. Reduce the heat to medium and cook for 20 minutes. Adjust heat to keep oil bubbling around chicken, but not browning the chicken too fast. Cook the liver, gizzard and bony pieces of chicken for 15 minutes. Makes 4 to 5 servings.

PANCAKES

1 cup all-purpose flour
1 tablespoon sugar
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 egg, well beaten
1 cup milk
2 tablespoons vegetable oil

In a medium-sized bowl, mix together the flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. In another mixing bowl, combine the egg, milk and oil. Add the milk mixture to the flour mixture all at once. Stir the mixture just until blended; the mixture should be slightly lumpy. Pour 1/4 cup batter onto a lightly greased hot griddle or skillet. Flip the pancakes when they are golden brown on the bottom and bubbly on the top with slightly dry edges. Makes 8 to 10 pancakes.

GRILLED CHEESE SANDWICHES

8 slices white or wheat bread
1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted
16 slices cheese, American or Colby Jack

Brush one side of one piece of bread with melted butter. Place the bread, buttered side down, on a hot griddle; top with two pieces of cheese. Butter another piece of bread and place it on top of the cheese, buttered side up. Cook until the bottom slice of bread is slightly browned and the cheese is beginning to melt; flip and brown the other side of the sandwich. Repeat with the remaining bread and cheese. Makes 4 sandwiches.

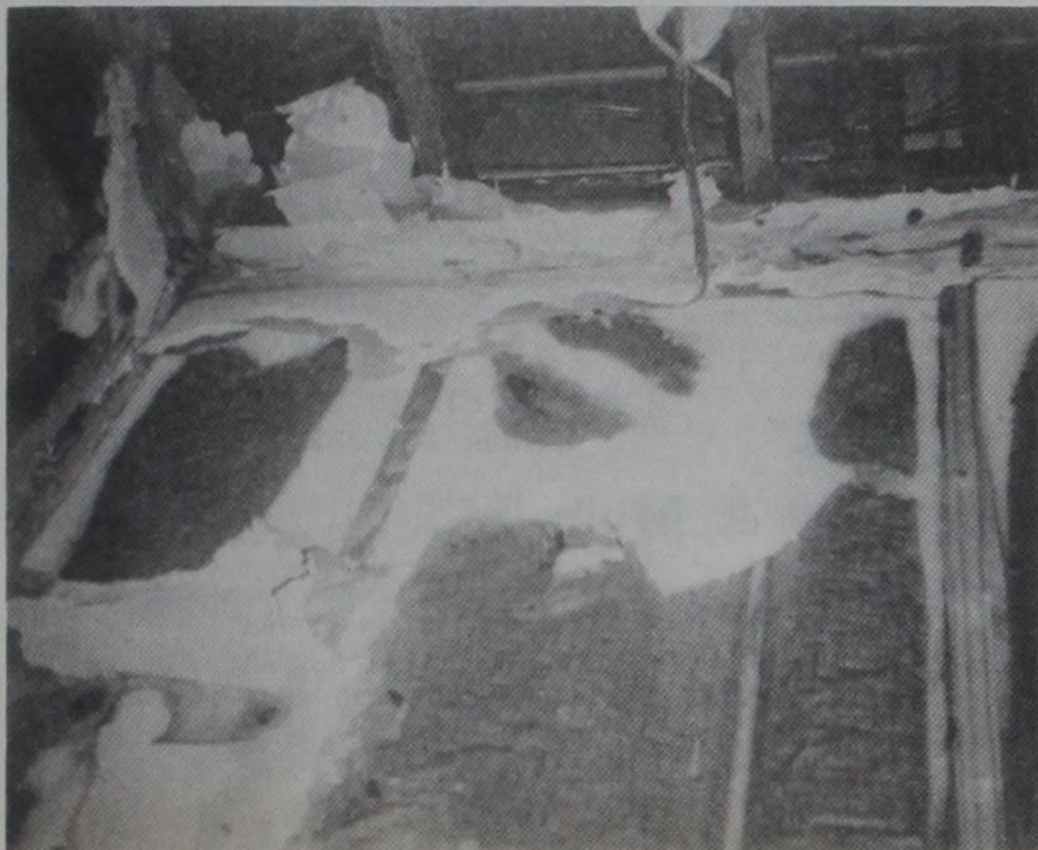

Single Family Housing Loans

Rural housing loans for very-low and low income applicants are available through County Offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Thomas S. Taylor, FmHA county supervisor, said this week.

Home ownership loans may be used to buy, build, improve, repair, rural homes and to provide adequate water and waste disposal systems. Homes may be built on individual tracts or in subdivisions. Funds may also be used to modernize homes-ad improvements such as bathrooms, central heating, modern kitchens and other improvements.

Borrowers may buy an existing house and lot or buy a site on which to build a home. Loans may be made for up to 100 percent of the appraised value of the site and the new home. Interest rates for this type of loan are presently 7.75% with 33 year terms.

Monthly payments are subsidized with the amount of the payment dependent on the borrower's annual income. Homes will be modest in size, design, and cost but adequate to meet the family's needs. New homes average about 1050 square feet of living area.

In addition, Farmers Home Administration guarantees home ownership loans made to applicants of low or moderate income. Guarantees offer opportunities to families who are unable to afford a commercial loan without a guarantee. These loans may be made for up to 100 percent of the value of the property and are made for terms of 30 years.

The interest rate is based on the Federal National Mortgage Association rate with a maximum loan amount in most counties of \$67,500.00.

The Farmers Home Administration assists rural America by guaranteeing private sector loans and by providing temporary, supervised direct loans to farm and housing borrowers who have a reasonable chance for success, and whose current needs cannot be met at reasonable rates and terms by commercial sources. The Agency is committed to excellence in providing its services.

"Applications for assistance may be obtained at the Farmers Home Administration office located at 109 3rd, Farwell, Texas, FmHA County Supervisor said. The FmHA office in Farwell is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and closed 12 p.m. to 1 p.m. for the lunch hour, Monday-Friday. Monday is office day and no appointment is needed.

Texas continues to play at 8:30 p.m. Monday through Saturday in Pioneer Amphitheatre located in Palo Duro Canyon State Park.

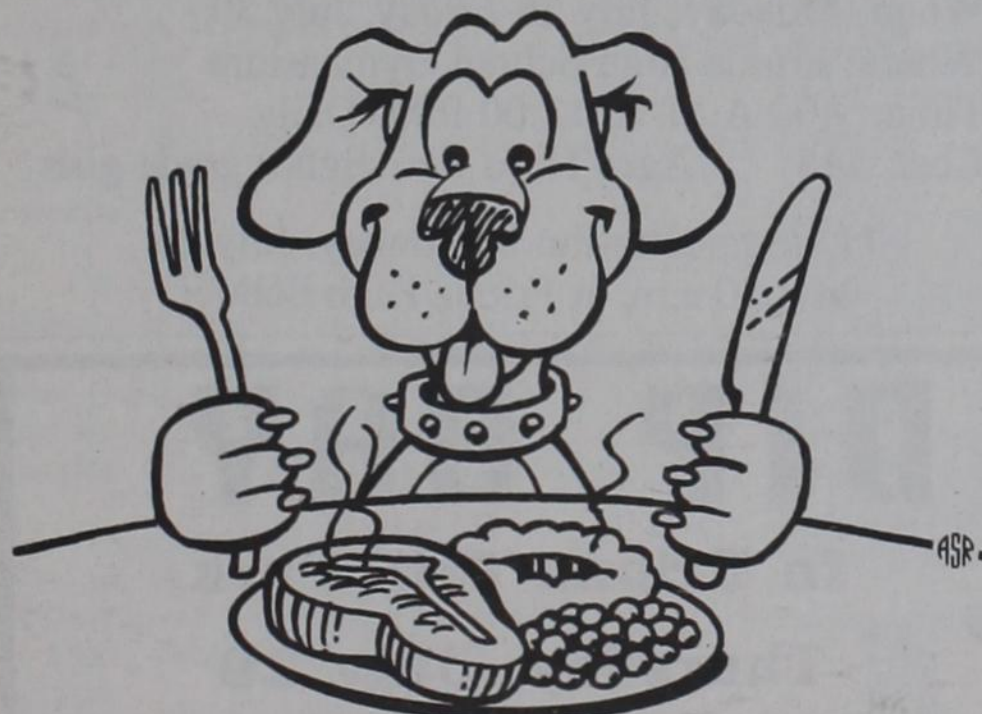

USDA To Help In Providing Housing For The Homeless

Rural residents who are homeless or inadequately-housed families may now have a chance to become homeowners under a plan being adopted by the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Thomas Taylor, FmHA County Supervisor, said this week.

Under the plan, special emphasis will be given to homes that have been in FmHA's inventory at least 18 months. Inventory homes will be offered to public bodies, including housing authorities and non-profit community-based organizations, for rent to the homeless, or in some cases, FmHA will rent directly to the individuals, Taylor said. In addition, homes which were recently acquired by FmHA into inventory but have not yet been repaired will also be offered for lease to the homeless.

The families who obtain the housing from the public bodies or non-profit organizations may apply to buy the house at any time during the lease. Those who rent directly from FmHA will pay rent based on their income and will be given the opportunity to buy the house they rent. Taylor said that many homeless people work, have incomes and have the potential to become homeowners.

"By helping people find a decent place to live, we also help eliminate the cost to taxpayers of maintaining vacant houses," Taylor said. FmHA officials in Texas are

seeking organizations which are interested in providing housing to the homeless and to inadequately-housed families.

"Information concerning housing for the homeless may be obtained from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located at 109 3rd, Farwell, Texas, 806-481-3349," FmHA county supervisor said. The FmHA office in Farwell is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Discovery Center Sets Program On Meteors

The Don Harrington Discovery Center will be hosting a Perseid Meteor Shower Observing Session at 9 p.m. on August 12, in the Discovery Center's parking lot.

The observing session is free to the public, and everyone is encouraged to attend this exciting event. Members of the Amarillo Astronomy Club will be on hand with telescopes that will enable participants to view the planets,

stars, galaxies and nebulae. The most incredible sights, however, will be the meteors, or falling stars, for which you will not need a telescope to see.

The Perseid showers occur between August 10-13, with maximum visibility on August 11 and 12. The Earth passes through a region in space filled with tiny particles of dust, which burn up in our atmosphere. The particles, meteoroids, are debris from the Swift-Tuttle comet, which is slowly deteriorating as it revolves around the sun. The shower has long been known as the Tears of St. Lawrence in memory of the Saint who died on August 10, 358 AD.

Most meteor showers have only a few (15-60) meteors visible per hour. This year, however, some astronomers are predicting a heavier shower. "This year's shower may prove to be a meteor storm," comments Christine Brunello, planetarium coordinator at the Don Harrington Discovery Center.

The first Perseid Meteor Shower was witnessed by Chinese observers on July 17, 36 AD. The second sighting was noted in late July, 714 AD by Chinese, Japanese and other Asian observers. From 811 AD to 830 AD, the meteor showers were noted by European observers. The Perseid Meteor Showers were named by Schaiparelli in 1866--Perseid being the daughter of Perceus.

Don't miss the opportunity to view the planets, stars, galaxies and nebulae while participating in the Perseid Meteor Shower Observing Session, August 12 at the Don Harrington Discovery Center. For further information please contact Christine Brunello at 355-9548.

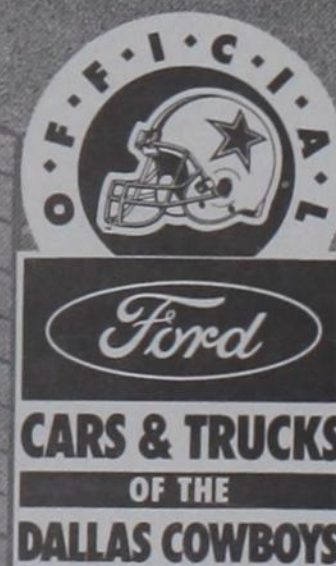

Ways To Receive Dividends

Dividends, which reward shareholders for their investment by sharing part of the company's profits with them, are an important reason to buy stocks. In fact, dividends are the only regular payments made to shareholders. Although dividends are not guaranteed, most corporations make every effort to pay them regularly.

The most popular types of dividends are (1) cash dividends, (2) stock dividends and (3) stock splits.

Cash dividends are the most common of the three. The corporation's board of directors decides on the amount of each dividend and typically pays it quarterly. The amount of the dividend generally reflects the profitability of the company.

Stock dividends and stock splits are different from cash dividends. A stock dividend is the distribution of additional shares instead of cash. For example, if you own 100 shares of XYZ Corporation, a 2 per cent stock dividend would give you two additional shares. The value of each share of outstanding stock is then reduced proportionally by the number of shares distributed so that there is no change in value, only in number of shares owned.

When a stock dividend equals more than 25 per cent, it typically becomes a stock split. For example, a 2-for-1 stock split means the owner of 100 shares now owns 200 shares. This is also called a 100 per cent stock dividend. Of course, each share would be

worth half as much, so there is no real increase in the value of your investment. It is like exchanging a dollar bill for two half-dollars. Alternatively, if a stock split is accompanied by an increase in dividends, the value of your investment would increase.

Investors tend to prefer stocks that trade within a range of about \$20 to \$100 a share. When share prices approach or exceed \$100, directors often declare splits to create more public interest in their stock.

How can you make sure you receive all the dividends to which you are entitled? First, the payment of any dividend requires the new shareholder to be registered as holder-of-record. Because there is a necessary delay between the time a stock is bought and the time the new owner is recorded on the company's books, a stock must be purchased five business days before record date to receive that dividend. To avoid confusion, the company and the exchange on which the stock is traded report the ex-dividend date. Any shares purchased prior to the "ex-date" are entitled to a dividend; any shares purchased on or after the "ex-date" are not.

Directors pay particular attention to the dividend policy. They must be confident that they can maintain a dividend increase if it is declared. A sure way to erode confidence in a company's leadership and stability is to lower or eliminate the regular dividend. For these reasons, dividends can be one of the most stable and predictable ways to evaluate a company.

YOUR EYES



Sight Vs. Vision

Sight refers to visual acuity, the ability to see objects and letters clearly. Most commonly, this is tested with an eye chart and is graded 20/20, 20/40 or other appropriate number.

What 20/20 means is that the person tested can see and distinguish letters at 20 feet that most normal average eyes see at that distance. The person with 20/40 eyesight can only distinguish at 20 feet the letters that most normal average eyes can see at 40 feet. Conversely, someone with 20/15 can see at 20 feet what the average eye can see only at 15 feet. Thus, 20/40 is poorer-than-average acuity; 20/15 is better-than-average.

Vision, however, is the recognition, comprehension or perception of what the individual sees. For example, when looking at a strange object for the first time, we do not comprehend or "visualize" what it is. The second time we see it, we will recognize it. For some people, perception problems may translate into reading problems.
