Mr. Allred who, during the first section of the campaign did nothing but yell for help because all the others "were on him," opens his campaign by accusing Tom Hunter of using bait that will catch everybody. Well, that's just what we need. Laws that will fit everybody, equal and equitable—the same law to apply to the rich and the poor, the learned and unlearned, the high and the low. In other words "What's sauce for the gander." Allred is one of the old school, and, in seeking a new deal, he should, according to rules of the game, move out. If memory hasn't failed us, Jimmy rode into high office on the Ferguson bandwagon, but in some manner, the fact has been lost sight of. But Ambitious Jimmy, when he landed on top had no more use for those who helped him attain his goal. He reminds us of a Grecian emperor of whom it was said "Friends to him is Ambition's ladder by which he climbed, and on reaching the top turned his back and scorned the base degrees by which he did ascend." His plea for office is the fact that he won a case against some oil company trying to steal our oil lands. Not such a feat when we take into consideration the fact that Mr. Allred gets a salary of \$4,000 a year to do that very thing. That's what you and I, and every other tax payer expects him to do. His other plea is promises to give his enemies hell when he wears the "big breeches," with particular punishment to be meted out to Jake Wolters. Maybe he will. He claims to be in debt after nearly four years as attorney general, yet for nearly a month before the primary he made speeches of one hour and a half over the radio, at a cost of thousands of good, hard, dollars. Needless to remind you that radio rates are slightly higher than telephone rates. Who is backing him? Backers of candidates expect something in return, or politics has sure made an about face. HELP YOUR SCHOOLS

Eight proposed changes in the Constitution, which Texans will vote on in November, are published in the Times this week. They deal with various phases of county government—creating new counties and consolidating old; consolidating several counties offices and giving the particular office a new name. One of them, however, deals with an issue vital to this section. It is the University School Land Amendment—House Joint Resolution No. 30—whereby it is proposed to tax these lands for the direct benefit of the general fund and the school districts of the counties in which these rich oil lands are located. Seventeen counties and 28 school districts are affected, and Terrell is one of them. In one or two of these counties the school facilities are inadequate, notwithstanding that the lands of the county are very valuable. The taxes revert to the University's general fund, now one of the richest in the United States, and because these university acres are non-taxable for school purposes, there is no hope for the schools in counties made up largely of University lands. A vote for this amendment will be a long step in remedying a grave injustice to the school children of this part of Texas.

According to Supt. Brannan our schools will formally open on Monday, September 3, with appropriate exercises and programs in the splendid auditorium.

The purchasing of sheep and goats by the government will likely begin August 20th, according to newspaper reports from San Angelo, the information being released following a meeting held in that city Wednesday by the ranchmen and Dr. E. W. Sheets, national director of drought relief.

The scale of prices, according to the announcement, will be a flat rate of \$2 a head for sheep and \$1.40 for goats, from yearlings up, whether they are accepted or rejected and disposed of, or whether they are in or out of wool. The ranchers must deliver the animals to the shipping point, and if any drop out on the way and are lost, it will be the ranchers' loss.

There will be no veterinarian to examine the sheep, just an experienced sheep operator under the direction of O. B. Martin, the state drought director, and G. W. Barnes, assistant director, Dr. Sheets said.

The program will continue until it is finished, rain or no rain, and according to advice received, lien holders and ranchers will share equally in the checks received from the sale of sheep and goats.

Mrs. Marsalis, Noted Aviatix, Held Many National Air Records

Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. Carter Meets Death When Plane Plunges to Ground During National Meet for Women

MRS. Frances Harrell Marsalis, a former Sanderson girl, and one of the outstanding women flyers of the country, was killed late Sunday afternoon when her plane crashed during the annual 50-mile free-for-all feature event of the Women's National Air meet, which was held in Dayton. Mrs. Marsalis was flying a biplane, which crashed at the south end of the triangular 50-mile course, when her ship was caught in the backwash of five other planes. It plunged to the ground at terrific speed, dug a hole in the ground three feet deep and then nosed over. Mrs. Marsalis was still alive when spectators and officials reached the scene of the wreck, but died in the ambulance as she was being rushed to a hospital.

PIONEER TEXAN PASSES AWAY IN FLAGSTAFF, ARIZ.

Mrs. Boozer Among First Settler in Present Town of Sanderson

Mrs. M. Boozer, 76, a resident of this city for many years, died Wednesday morning at Flagstaff, Ariz., according to a telegram received by Joe Kerr of this city.

Mrs. Boozer was a native Texan and she and her family were among the first settlers in Sanderson, coming here soon after the town was set led. She made her home here until about 1927 when she went to Los Angeles, Calif., to make her home with a daughter, Mrs. Stella Ford. She had been in poor health for the past year and last week her condition became serious.

She is survived by four daughters Mrs. Alva Howell of El Paso, Mrs. Clara Newberry of New Orleans, La., Mrs. Opal Haliburton, of Los Angeles, and Mrs. Stella Ford, of Tucson, Ariz.; three sons, Roy of Seattle, Washington; David of Los Angeles, and Clyde Boozer of Tucson.

Funeral services will be held in El Paso this afternoon at the Kaster & Maxon chapel, and burial will be in Restlawn cemetery.

When she was very young the family moved to this city, where she grew to womanhood, attending the Sanderson schools. It was here that she met and married Murray Harrell, but this union was dissolved by divorce about nine years ago, after the family moved to El Paso.

Surviving her, besides her parents, are three sisters, Misses Myrtle, Gladys and Sammie Carter; two brothers, Clyde and Leslie Carter, all of Sanderson. She also has three children, by her first marriage, residing in El Paso: Billie Murray, 15; Zoe, 13; and Eugene Harrell, 11. Mr. Carter, the father, is an employee of the T. & N. O.

World's Record Endurance Flyer

On December 30, 1933, Mrs. Marsalis and Helen Richey, another famous woman flyer, landed at Miami, Fla., after an endurance flight during which they remained in the air for 9 days, 21 hours, and 42 minutes for the world's record in continuous flying. Their ship was refueled while in flight. Prior to that time Mrs. Marsalis was co-holder of this same record when she and Louise Thaden, in a flight at Long Island, remained aloft for 8 days, 4 hours, and 5 minutes. At the end of this flight Miss Thaden collapsed, but Mrs. Marsalis show no ill effects whatever.

Mrs. Marsalis was rated as one of the best women flyers of the nation, and had a well-established reputation for fearlessness. Her services were in great demand at air shows throughout the United States.


She was married to William Marsalis, also a flyer, and co-pilot with the Eastern Air Transport company.

The body, accompanied by Mr. Marsalis, was taken to his home in Centerville, where burial was set for today. Due to the long distance and poor train connection, none of the family from Sanderson were able to attend the last rites.

in November, A. D. 1934, at which election each ballot shall have printed the words: "For the Amendment of Section 3 of Article VIII of the State Constitution providing for the levying and collection of taxes and fixing the maximum amount thereof which can be collected and expended each biennium."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That there be added to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas a new section to be numbered Section 2-A and to have five (5) lettered subdivisions and which section shall read as follows:

(a) General management and control of the affairs of the County shall hereafter be vested in the Commissioners Court, provided that in the exercise of powers not specifically granted to the Commissioners Court by the Constitution and Amendments thereto, the Court shall be subject to the authority of the Legislature of the State, and the Court shall also be subject to the authority of the Legislature of the State, and the Court shall also be subject to the provisions of this Amendment until such laws are modified or repealed.

(b) All duties heretofore performed by the Clerk of the District Court and the County Clerk shall hereafter be performed by an officer to be known as Record Clerk all duties heretofore performed by the County Tax Assessor and the County Tax Collector shall hereafter be performed by one officer known as Tax Clerk and in the counties where the sheriff performs the duties of the Tax Collector he may hereafter perform the duties of the Tax Clerk.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 3 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 3. Taxes shall be levied and collected by general laws and for public purposes only; and the total amount of revenue which the State shall be authorized to collect during such biennium from taxes, licenses, permits and fees, (except fees paid by students to state educational institutions, and except rentals, bonuses and royalties obtained from public lands and other public property) shall not exceed a sum reasonably estimated to equal the product obtained by multiplying the number of inhabitants of this State by the sum of Twenty-two and 50-100 (\$22.50) Dollars, provided, however, the total amount of such revenue which may be so collected, shall be reduced by the amount of any surplus funds or unexpended appropriations remaining at the close of the preceding biennium.

of assistants, deputies, and clerical personnel which said officers may employ; nor shall such general law change the present constitutional limitations as to particular and total tax levies for any or all county purposes; nor shall such general law change the present constitutional limitations on counties to incur public debts.

(e) In any and all cases where provisions of the Constitution of this State are in conflict with the provisions of this Amendment (Section 2-A, Article IX) shall control; provided, however, should any county adopt a home rule charter under authority of any provisions of the State Constitution or Amendment thereto, this Amendment shall not be applicable to such county.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State, qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1934, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"For the Amendment of Article IX of the State Constitution by adding Section 2-A thereto, giving the Commissioners' Court general management and control of county affairs, and authorizing the Legislature to provide more economical forms of county government and different than as now provided by law."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 16, Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 16. All land mentioned in Sections 11, 12 and 13 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas now belonging to the University of Texas shall be subject to the taxation for county and school district purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned; provided they shall be rendered for taxation upon the values fixed by the State Tax Board and that the values fixed for school district purposes shall not exceed the values fixed for county purposes on the same land; and provided that the University of Texas from the University Available Fund, shall remit annually to each of the county and school districts in which said lands are located an amount equal to the tax imposed upon said land for county and school district purposes."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the next general election, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas subjecting the lands of the University of Texas to taxation for county and school district purposes, and providing for the payment of said taxes to the proper authorities of the counties and school districts where said lands are located," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas subjecting the lands of the University of Texas to taxation for county and school district purposes, and providing for the payment of said taxes to the proper authorities of the counties and school districts where said lands are located."

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 9 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature shall have the power to create counties for the convenience of the people subject to the following provisions: "First. In the territory of the State exterior to all counties now existing, no new counties shall be created with a less area than nine hundred square miles, in a square form, unless prevented by the pre-existing boundary lines. Should the state lines render this impracticable in border counties, the area may be

less. The territory referred to may, at any time, in whole or in part, be divided into counties in advance of population and attached, for judicial and land surveying purposes, to the most convenient organized county or counties.

"Second. Within the territory of any county or counties now existing, the Legislature may by a two-thirds vote of both Houses, create new counties, combine existing counties and parts of counties and abolish existing counties and change county boundaries at will, provided that no new county shall be created with an area of less than nine hundred square miles nor shall any existing county be reduced in area so as to contain less than nine hundred square miles unless such new county, or such remaining county, and both shall have a population of not less than fifty thousand according to the last United States census prior to the date of the creation or change of such county. When any part of a county is stricken off and attached to, or created into another county, that part stricken off shall be held for and obliged to pay its proportion of all liabilities then existing, of the county from which it was taken, in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

"Third. No part of any existing county shall be detached from it and attached to another existing county until the proposition for such change shall have been submitted in such manner as may be provided by law, to a vote of the electors of both counties and shall have received a majority of those voting on the question in each."

Section 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934. At this election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed in that ballot the words:

"For the amendment to Section 1 of Article 9 of the Constitution of Texas, providing that the Legislature may by a two-thirds vote of both Houses create new counties and change the boundaries of existing counties."

Those voters opposing said proposed amendment shall write, or have printed on their ballot the words:

"Against the amendment to Section 1 of Article 9 of the Constitution of Texas, providing that the Legislature may by a two-thirds vote of both Houses create new counties and change the boundaries of existing counties."

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article 16, be amended by adding thereto another Section, Section 61, which shall read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000), or more, according to the then last preceding Federal census, shall hereafter be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties of this State the Commissioners' Court shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000) according to the then last preceding Federal census, the Commissioners' Court shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis. All fees earned by district, county or precinct officers shall be paid into the County Treasury where earned, for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county or any municipality, or in case where pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid to the County Treasury, when collected, and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis, such fee may be retained by such officer, or paid into the Treasury of the county as the Commissioners' Court may direct. All Notaries Public, County Surveyors and Public Weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified voters of this State at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday, after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1934, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas adding Section 61 to Article XVI, abolishing the fee system of compensating all district officers and all county officers in counties having population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more; and authorizing the Commissioners' Court to determine whether County officers in counties containing less than twenty thousand (20,000) population shall be compensated on a fee basis or a

salary basis; and authorizing the Commissioners' Court in all counties of this State to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee or a salary basis."

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas adding Section 61 to Article XVI, abolishing the fee system of compensating all district officers and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more; and authorizing the Commissioners' Court to determine whether county officers in counties containing less than twenty thousand (20,000) population shall be compensated on a fee basis or a salary basis; and authorizing the Commissioners' Court in all counties of this State to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee or a salary basis."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed amendment.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 41

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 5, of Article XI, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. Cities having more than five thousand (5,000) inhabitants may, by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that purpose, adopt or amend their charters, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, and providing that no charter or any ordinance passed under said charter shall contain any provisions inconsistent with the Constitution of the State, or of the general laws enacted by the Legislature of this State; said cities may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law or by their charters; but no tax for any purpose shall ever be lawful for any one year, which shall exceed two and one-half percent (2 1/2%) of the taxable property of such city, and no debt shall ever be created by any city, unless at the same time provision be made to assess and collect annually a sufficient sum to pay the interest thereon and creating a sinking fund for at least two per cent (2%) thereon; provided further, that no city charter shall be altered, amended or repealed oftener than every twelve (12) months."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the next general election, to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934; at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting any Home Rule City to alter, amend or repeal its charter every twelve (12) months;" and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting any Home Rule City to alter, amend or repeal its charter every twelve (12) months."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 42

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 30, Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 30. The duration of all offices not fixed by this Constitution shall never exceed two (2) years, except that the elected officials of a city that has adopted and amended its Charter as provided in Section 5 Article XI of the Constitution of Texas may, by amendment to such city's charter, hold office not to exceed four (4) years; provided, that when a Railroad Commission is created by law it shall be composed of three (3) Commissioners who shall be elected by the people at a general election for State officers, and their term of office shall be six (6) years; provided, Railroad Commissioners first elected after this Amendment goes into effect shall hold office as follows: One shall serve two (2) years, and one four (4) years and one six (6) years; their terms to be decided by lot immediately after they shall have qualified. And one Railroad Commissioner shall be elected every two (2) years thereafter. In case of vacancy in said office the Governor of the State shall fill said vacancy by appointment until the next General Election."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the next General election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934, at which election all voters favoring the proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting Home Rule Cities to so amend their charters that the elected officials of such cities may hold office not to exceed four (4) years," and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting Home Rule Cities to so amend their charters that the elected officials of such cities may hold office not to exceed four (4) years."

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 1. Taxation to be equal and uniform as to real estate and to be equal and uniform as to all reasonable classifications of property and occupation and income taxes; exemptions; limitations upon counties, cities, etc. Taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform. All property in this State, whether owned by natural persons or corporations, other than municipal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value, which shall be ascertained as may be provided by law. The Legislature may by general laws make reasonable classifications of all property other than real estate property for the purpose of taxation, and may impose different rates thereon; provided that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform. The Legislature may impose a poll tax. It may also impose occupation taxes, both upon natural persons and upon corporations, other than municipal, doing business in this State. It may also tax incomes of both natural persons and corporations other than municipal, except that persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits shall never be required to pay an occupation tax; provided that Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture, belonging to each family in the State, shall be exempt from taxation, and provided further that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town for any year on persons or corporations pursuing any pro-

fession or business, shall not exceed one-half of the tax levied by the State for the same period of such profession or business."

Section 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution of Texas shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934. At this election all voters favoring said amendment shall write, or have printed, on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform; and providing that the Legislature may make reasonable classifications of all property, other than real property, for the purpose of taxation, and that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform; and providing further that the Legislature may impose poll tax and occupation tax and income tax and exempting from occupation tax persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits; and exempting from taxation Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture belonging to each family; and providing that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town shall not exceed one-half that levied by the State for the same period."

Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform; and that all property in this State, other than that owned by municipal corporations shall be taxed in proportion to its value as ascertained as may be provided by law; and providing that the Legislature may make reasonable classifications of all property, other than real property, for the purpose of taxation; and that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform; and providing further that the Legislature may impose poll tax and occupation tax and income tax, and exempting from occupation tax persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits; exempting from taxation Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture belonging to each family; and providing that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town shall not exceed one-half that levied by the State for the same period."
