#### Deliberations Started, But No Verdict Reached As **Times Goes to Press**

The special term of district court convened in this city Wednesday for the purpose of trying Braulio Gutierrez, who was indicted by the Terrell county grand jury at the regular July term, charging him with the murder of Manuel Coronado, who was shot and killed here on July 4.

On Wednesday, the opening day of court, the major part of the session was taken up in challenging a special venire of 000 men from which 11 jurors were selected. The twelfth juror was selected from an extra venire of ten men.

Those selected to hear evidence and pass sentence were C. M. Breeding, W. E. Grigsby, Hugh Cox, A. A. McDonald, Roy Haley, Lynn Har-rell, Milton Smith, W. H. Savage, Bozarth Brown, Dee Schooley, O. T. Schupbach and W. F. Harrell.



#### SUPERVISED CORRESPONDENCE STUDY

There came to the editor's desk this week an article from the Teacher College, Columbia University, which she thinks is the best yet and one that would solve, even right here in Sanderson, the problem of the boy and girl who would like to go off to college but can't afford to, that is the supervised correspondence study in our high schools.

L. P. Arduser, director of the High School Service Department of the International Correspondence Schools has this to say: "We are up against the problem in this country of keeping the boy occupied in school until he can find a job even though he has completed the regular course. We can't keep the boy out of work and out of school at the same time. Supervised correspondence study in the high schools, because of its low comparative costs, makes it possible for the high school to widen its curriculum and provide for a larger student body without making unbearable the burden of taxation.'

Fundamentally, supervised correspondence study consists of an arrangement between the local high school and a university extension division or correspondence school, whereby the high school is able to offer one or a group of its students any one of the great number of courses offered by these two types of educational institutions. Adopted by some 150 high schools, it has enabled the schools to fit the curriculum to the natural aptitudes and inclinations of the individual students, while avoiding the great increase in costs which such enrichment of the curriculum would ordinarily entail. A member of the school faculty is appointed to supervise and assist in the correspondence study. A regular period during the school day is alloted for this work.

At the least this is a worthy plan and one that should be given a thorough trial before being condemned as unsatisfactory.

#### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 3. Taxes shall be levied and collected by general laws and for public purposes only; and the total amount of revenue which the State shall be authorized to collect during such biennium from taxes. licenses, permits and fees, (except fees paid by students to state educational institutions, and except rentals, bonusus and royalties obtained from public lands and other public property) shall not exceed a sum reasonably estimated to equal the product obtained by multiplying the number of inhabitants of this State by the sum of Twenty-two and 50-100 (\$22.50) Dollars; provided, however, the total amount of such revenue which may be so collected, shall be reduced by the amount of any surplus funds or unexpended appropriations remaining at the close of the preceding bi-ennium. # Good Advice to Parents as School Term Approaches

Austin, Aug. 16.-The schools of Texas will soon be reopoening for ther term and the Texas State Department of Health urges the parents of school children to see that they are protected against disease in so far as possible. Vaccination, as a protection against typhoid, diphtheria and smallpox, should be done

School children are exposed to much infection, so that where a definite preventive is known, parents should take advantage of it. These vaccination may save many days out of school, doctor fees and, maybe, life itself. More than six hundred children die each year in Texas from diphtheria. The child should be taken to the

family physician at this time for a physical examination to determine if he has any remedial defects. A child with subnormal eyesight or hearing cannot be expected to do as well in his studies as one that has normal sight and hearing. A dentist should be consulted in regard to the teeth. Any defect found and corrected before schools opens will of course mean much to the child, and will have its effect on his school work as well as his physical well be-

Some physical defects of children, such as underweight or mal-nourishment, show no appreciable present effect. If such a condition is not corrected it may result in something serious later. No hard and fast rules as to a child's weight at a certain age are available, but parents should see whether or not the child shows some gain in weight.


