Here, in a nutshell is the plan for borrowing modernization funds under the Federal Housing Pro-

Repair Loans

1. A modernization loan is solely for the purpose of repairing, altering or improving your home, shop, farmhouse, store or other building. Diversion of the money for any other purpose is strictly prohibited.

2. It cannot be for less than \$100 of for more than \$2,000. The borrower must have a bona fide source of income equal to at least five times the annual payments.

3. It can be made for terms up to three years, but may be paid in full earlier than the maturity date if the borrower desires.

4. Maximum charges, including interest and fees, cannot exceed an amount equivalent to \$5 discount per year per \$100 original face amount of the note.

5. To get a modernization loan the property owner must present to the bank or other lending institution a precise estimate of the cost of the improvements and he should be able to prove that they are necessary or advisable.

6. In addition the property owner must file a Property Owner's Credit statement, showing his financial condition, sources and amount of income and other information necessary to determine his ability to repay the loan.

If the bank considers the improvements advisable and necessary and the property owner able to meet the payments when due, it can advance the money on the personal note of the property owner. The note must be signed by

both husband and wife, if the property owner is married. No mortgage or collateral security is necessary, unless State laws or the financial institution's official de-

If the fact that some 375 mail order catalogs were sent to the Sanderson office the past week for distribution doesn't set some of our merchants to thinking and planning, business here in deep in the doldrums. The country paper is one of the most loyal institutions, and even its humblest efforts are an asset to any town. They have preached-still are preaching-the doctrine of "Trade at Home." But, no matter how loyal the home paper, nor how strong its appeal to support home merchants, it's so much lost motion without the fullest cooperation on the part of the merchants. The Times goes into practically every home in Sandersonyour message, Mr. Businessman, could just as easily go with it. That's the principle upon which the success of the mail order houses are builded. "If we can get our message into the homes of the nation the biggest part of our work is done. Results are sure!" Too often though, the merchants in the smaller towns consider advertising in the home paper akin to charity. If this be true, then the mail order houses of the country are the largest contributors to charity in the world. It would be interesting if the total revenue from the disribution of these catalogs in Sanderson was made known at the end of the year.

WHY HE QUIT

This is the story of a man who quit the teaching profession. He was considered one of the best of teachers. Pressed for a reason for his action days in Austin this week on busithe following answer was received: "There is such an absence of training and discipline in the home that teaching has become a burden that I have decided to carry no longer. There is so little backing up of the teacher by parents that discipline in the schools is becoming harder and harder to maintain. The lesson of obedience is taught so lightly in the home that struggling to enforce it in schools has become too irksome for me to longer attempt it. I have been solicited to put in my application in a dozen school-but I have enough. The fact that I have determined to quit is of little moment, but it is a very serious situation that has caused rain at his place. me to change my vocation after giving a dozen years of my life to it."

Any fair-minded person. with even a casual interest in his own school-even in Sanderson-will recognize the truth of this teacher's complaint. In the past our public schools stressed the fundamentalsmany of us old timers "graduated" with but a faint smattering of the "Three R's"-discipline was strict in such a limited range of courses. But today the system, like everything else, is modernized. Subjects undreamed of as subjects in the schools of 30 years ago, are a matter of course in today's public schools. Nonchalantly do youths discuss problems relative to the Einstein theory, of biology, chemistry, etc. Nor is Economy in Relief this all, the physical side-neglected in the old days-is amply provided for. Every game under the sun is included in high school athletics. All this is wasted, lost motion, if you please, if your child is not amenable to the rules of discipline which, necessarily, are part of this fine train-! ing system incorporated in our public schools of today. THE G. O. P. KEYNOTE

Already we have been given the keynote of the next Republican campaign. It is "Tyranny.

We are to be told-are already being told-the "new deal" is really the old deal of kings and dictators, tyrants who ruled as they willed and their people obeyed like sheep.

We have had this keynote struck by the American Liberty League of Al Smith and others. We have had it in numerous Constitution Day addresses, notably by Col. Theodore Roosevelt, republican, and by Bainbridge Colby. Mr. Colby is a democrat, was secretary of state under Woodrow Wilson for a time, and is a corporation lawyer.

The idea of these "new deal" opponents is that the present administration has gone too far in taking and the congress has gone too far in giving extraordinary power to the president who, in turn, delegates the power to individuals, boards and commissions, who act in an arbitrary and autocratic manner, bossing people and expecting them to obey like

To some extent this may be true. If true, it is due to the fact that when the Roosevelt administration went into office the congress and the people were panicky. They were calling for a leader. If one is to be a leader he must lead, and the people must follow. That's what they are doing. We have no doubt that as conditions improve throughout the Government Leases country pressure will be increased in Washington for a lessening of the executive authority, and for a return of various delegated powers to the congress where rightfully they belong.

Indeed, we believe the Roosevelt administration would like nothing better than to accomplish this before next election, if for no other reason than to spike the Republican guns.-El Paso Times.

STATE EXPENSES NOBODY IS INTERESTED IN

Few persons in this State, including members of the legislature and candidates for State office, realize that the Texas government alone spends ration, it was announced early this annually more than \$1,000,000 for food. It shows up in the comptrollers' report for last year as totaling \$1,009,000. There were two items for food, one at \$467,000, one at \$412,000 and a third item for 130,000 for purchase rate of 50 cents per head. Governof meals by State officials and employes. The entire \$1,000,000 is paid out of tax money, and none of the food went to those on relief rolls.

But this report contains other information that would interest those candidates in the runoff campaign who urged economy in government. The bill for ice and water alone reached \$77,000. The State paid out \$143,000 for stamps while the telephone bill was \$114,000.

Besides the large amount of money allowed for regular traveling expenses the State reimburses officials and employes for using their own leasing was made to Texas. cars, and this reimbursement bill last year exceeded \$200,000. But in addition the State bought gasoline to the amount of \$105,000. The light and power bill amounted to \$223,000 and fuel cost the State \$307.000. For drugs and chemicals the State paid out \$130,000; for hotel and room rent \$100,000 was expended. The stationery bill was \$107,000, but this does and friends. not include printing of reports, text books and law books.

For clothing and dry goods the bill was \$160,000, and for lumber it was \$58,000. For automobile repairs \$29,000; new passenger cars \$32,000 and new trucks \$7,000. Railroad and bus fares took nearly \$75,000 in spite of the \$200,000 given for the use of personal cars.
