Marfa, Dec. 6.-Grand champion calves of the 1933 Highland Fair held here were judged first and awarded the championship of the International Livestock show held at Chicago this week. The International Show is considered the greatest in the world.

Places won by Highland cattle totaled seven of the eighteen awarded. This is the best showing Highland cat le have ever made and probably the greatest number of places won by any section in any show.

W. B. Mitchell, T. C. Mitchell and F. A. Mitchell of Marfa and J. W. Merrill of Fort Davis were breeders of the prize winners.

Between 300 and 500 cars of cattle are selected from all sections of the range country in the United States and of these only 85 cars were allowed to even be shown. Out of the 85 cars select loads eighteen are awarded places.

RECIPES Banana Cream Pie

3 large bananas 1-2 cup of sugar

1-2 lemon, grated rind and juice. 1 egg slightly beaten

I cup of milk 1-4 teaspoon of salt

1-4 teaspoon of nutmeg

Force the bananas through a fine ton sprinkled with a little sachet milk, salt and nutmeg. Put mixture and sew up the open sides.
