Austin, Aug. 6.-Railroads received permission from the Texas rialroad commission today to increase rates on intrastate shipments to provide revenue to meet rising operating costs although the commission did not concur fully in advisability of the action.

An increase of 7 per cent in carload rates, not to exceed 5c per 100 pounds, with maximum of le to 4c on specified commodities. was allowed.

A 10 per cent increase was granted on less than carload shipments, subject to specific increases ranging from 1 to 11 cents per 100 pounds. Agricultural commodities, fertilizer and lumber from domestic woods, generally. were exempted.






