### Membership Drive Will Start Here November 11; One Dollar to Enlist

### P.-T. A. Carnival Was Big Success

Against a colorful setting of festive celebration, the Parent-Teachers association sponsored its annual Halloween carnival on last Thursday evening, beginning at 6:30 in the vacant building next to the Loma Alta cafe. The traditional parade of grammar school children in Halloween costumes and masks, led by the high school band began at 6 o'clock at the grammar school building and stopped at the carnival grounds. Hamburgers, coffee, doughnuts and chili were served cafe style in the main building. In the rear of the building was staged the musical show of "Don Quien Sabe." The "House of Horrors" was also in the main building and balloons, pop corn, whistles and home-made candy were sold at the front of the building.

On the carnival grounds was the "Beano" stand, supervised by D. L. Duke; the strong man's side show, the "Sanderson Quintuplets" side show and the penny game. The doll rack and the fortune telling booths were also included in the carnival attractions. Mrs. Clyde Higgins, chairman of the P.-T. A. ways and means committee and general chairman of the carnival, reported the net proceeds from the carnival to be \$124.58. She stated that the association now has sufficient funds to finish paying for the piano in the high school auditorium. The football boys, with the assistance of Coach Duane Smith, sponsored the doll rack, penny game and the "Beano" stand, and were given half the proceeds of the three features to apply on their athletic fund. Their profit amounted to \$11.45.

### Planning 9-Hole Golf Course On Airdrome Field

Plans for the construction of a nine-hole golf course at Dryden airport are being perfected, according to an announcement to the Times this week by Sergeant H. L. Richardson, who is in charge of the port. Mr. Richardson stated that if a sufficient number of people become interested in the plan, that a meeting will be held and organization of a club perfected. He also stated that very little expense will be incurred in keeping the course in condition, and that play on the course would not interfere with the coming and going of planes that land on the field.

A throng of Texans from all parts of the state, including Gov. Jas. V. Allred and other officials were here for the opening celebration.

### Sanderson Holds Second Place By Saturday's Win

The Sanderson Eagles retained second place rating in the district Saturday when they beat Fort Stockton by a score of 7 to 6.

The game was a thriller from start to finish. It was another game like the Iraan-Sanderson tilt.

Fort Stockton won the toss and chose to defend the south goal. Sanderson received and drove the ball to the 1-yard line. Halley had hurt his ankle and was limping rather badly. He was called on to buck the ball over, but did not have the power with only one good leg. The ball went over.

The Panthers punted from behind their goal line, and the first quarter was fought out on even terms.

The second quarter the Warriors had the wind to their backs. A pass from Lochausen to Bogusch was good for 20 yards and nearly a touchdown. Fort Stockton kept the ball nearly all of the second quarter. They started on one long drive which resulted in a touchdown. They hit the line for extra point, but failed to go over. The score at the half was Stockton 6, Sanderson 6.

Bogusch attempted a pass. Lochausen tripped into the wind so Bogusch returned to the 40-yd line. The Panthers used a few running plays, but were forced to punt. Sanderson punted back, and the Panthers used one running play at the line, and then pulled a lateral which was intercepted by Bogusch who, with the aid of Deaton's blocking of King, ran for a touchdown. Lochausen's "wicked toe" kicked a perfect ball between the uprights to give the Eagles another victory.

There was only one minute left to play when a pass-back was fumbled and Fort Stockton recovered the ball on the Eagles' 10 yard line. The Panthers ran one play and the ball was put on the 2 yard line. On the next play Halley stopped them at the line of scrimmage and the game ended. Halley, Lochausen and Sullivan were the offensive start of the ball game, while Appel, Deaton and Allen were the main defensive players.

Lewis and King were outstanding for the losers. Lewis is one of the best line tacklers in the district.

### BUSINESS LEADERS TO MEET AND PONDER NEW NRA

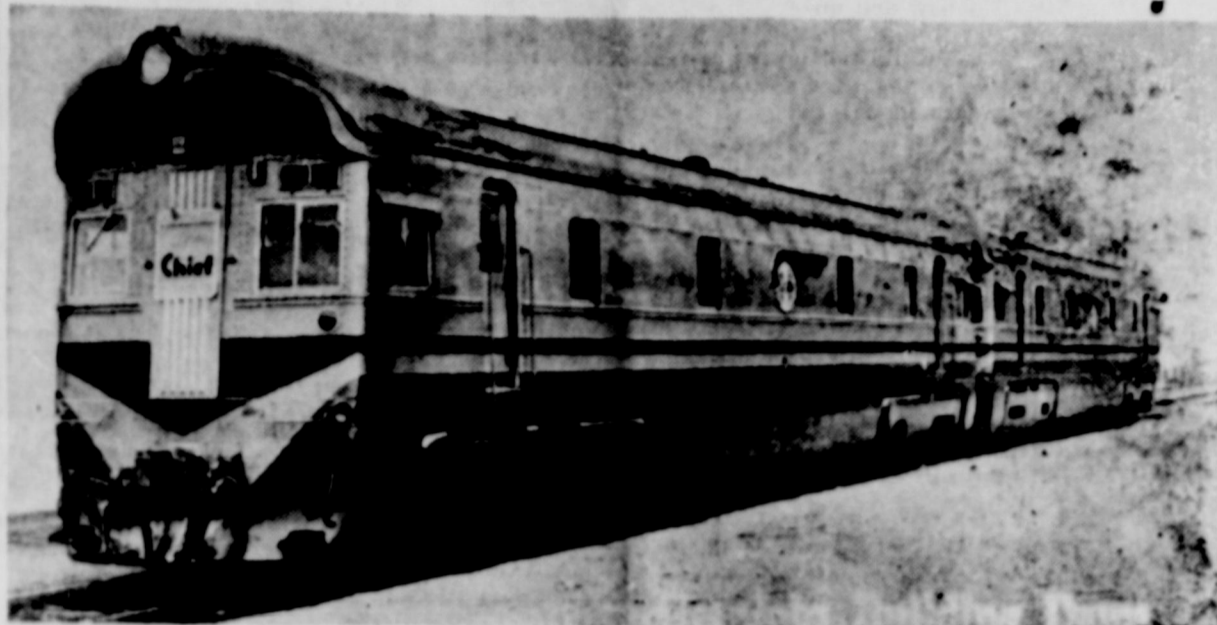

### Double Diesel Locomotive for "The Chief"



This giant Diesel locomotive built for the Santa Fe railway on tests pulled the road's fier, "The Chief," fast enough to warrant the expectation that the time of that train between Chicago and Los Angeles could be reduced by 12 hours. The engine consists of two identical units which can be operated singly or coupled together. It has an operator's cab and control station at each end. Motive power of each unit is supplied by two V-type, 12-cylinder, high-compression, two-cycle oil engines. The two units provide a total of 3,000 horsepower. It attained a speed of 111 miles an hour.

Huntsville.—Dave Nelson of Orange became general manager of the Texas prison system Friday and succeeded Lee Simmons, who resigned in September.

"I am going to have to investigate all my personnel to see if they can do what I ask them," said Nelson. He conferred more than an hour with J. H. B. Holdery, prison board member from Fort Worth, while job-seekers, expecting a shakeup, waited in his office.

"Then there is the matter of equipment, sick and diseased prisoners and many other matters demanding immediate attention, such as the over-crowded condition at Huntsville. I intend to follow the policies of the prison board and will have to confer with them before citing my immediate objectives."

### Contract for Bridge Extension At Lozier Canyon

### President Will Visit Centennial June Next Year

Hyde Park, N. Y., Nov. 5.—They have for a trip next June by President Roosevelt to the Texas Centennial at Dallas, home state of Vice President Garner, were known here tonight coincident with announcement of a visit to the annual meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation next month in Chicago. The Texas trip on the eve of the national convention led to a speculation of Mr. Roosevelt's favor toward renomination of "Cactus Jack" Garner as vice president, but there was no authoritative discussion of this here. Word of the president's plans was given out by Stephen T. Earle, secretary, as Mr. Roosevelt is preparing to listen to election returns. The president voted today with members of his family. It was stated that the visit to Texas would be in response to a promise made to Vice President Garner by the president.

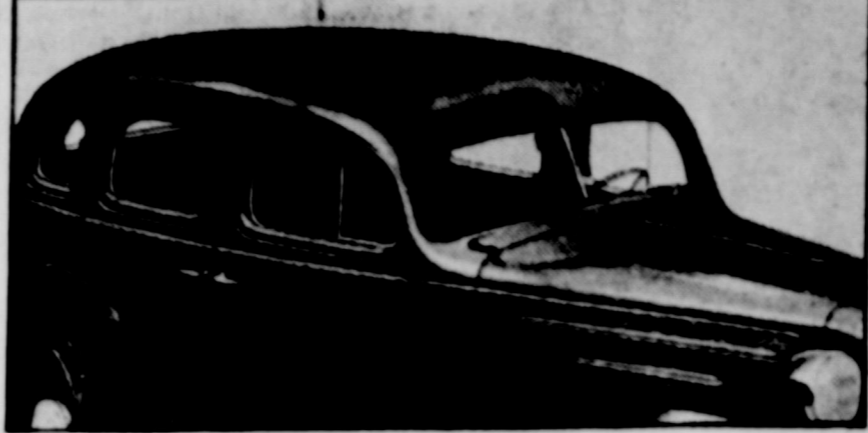
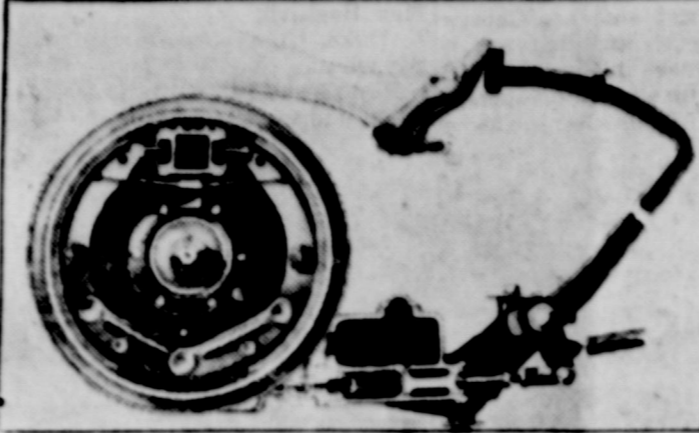

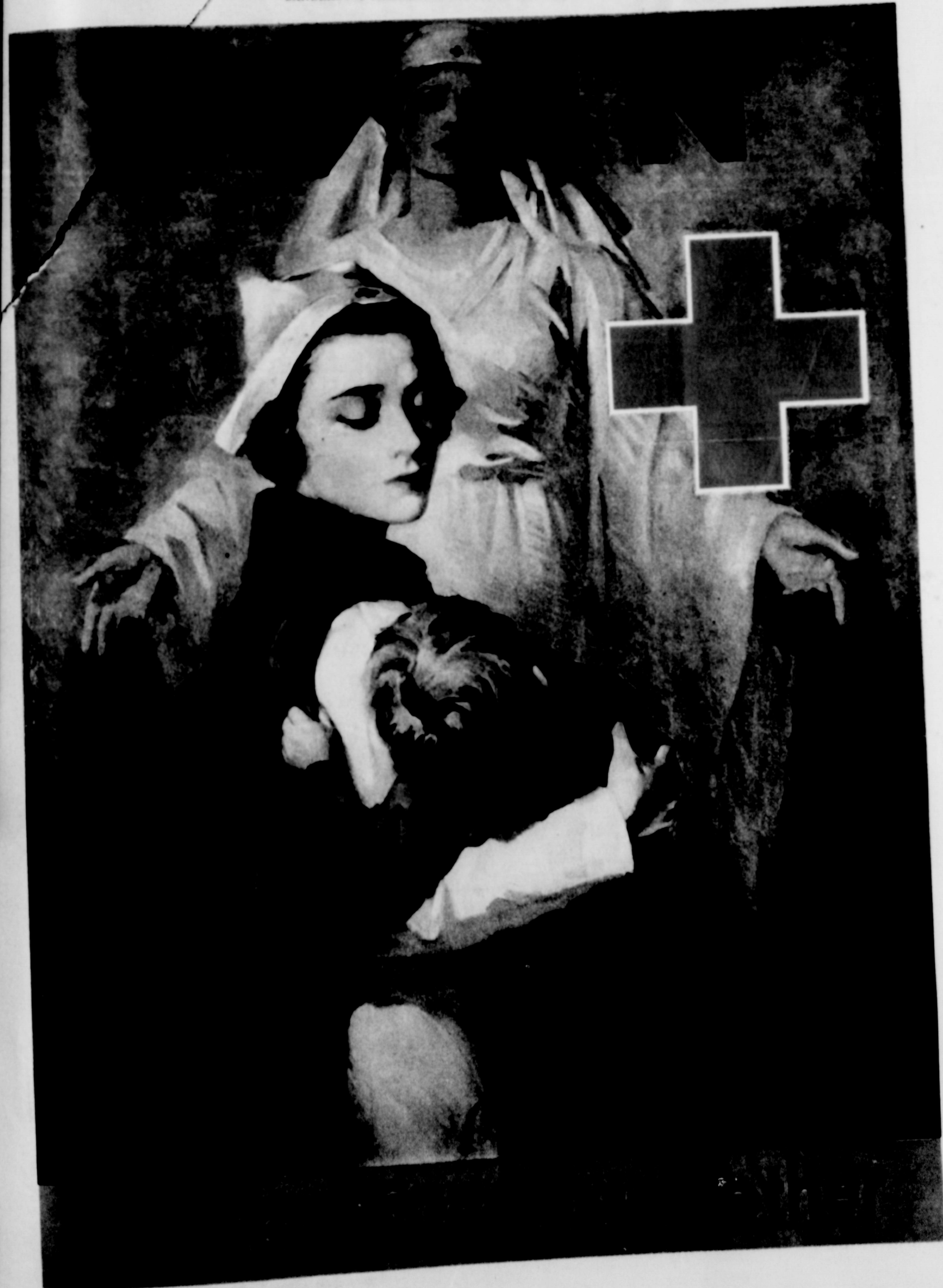

Work of H. E. Class Surveyed

The twenty-one girls enrolled in Vocational Home Economics are divided into a first year section and a second year section. Marked interest is being shown in a probably third year class. We hope this will be a realization by next year. Many school in Texas offer a course in Home Economics to boys and to adults, perhaps we shall realize this in our school some day.

Vocational Home Economics is one of the most practical courses offered to the high school girl. The work is divided into units of study and each unit is divided into projects. Each project bears on real life situations, that is: everything the Home Economics girl learns can be used in her life outside the school. Vocational Home Economics means learning how to live.

The main aims for the first semester's work in the first year section are: To plan and carry out a food and health program; to set up and maintain standards for working with others; to plan, prepare and serve breakfasts and luncheons for an average family; to market, store and care for foods and set up standards of living with others.

The above objectives cover the first unit of study which embraces 70 lessons in Foods and Health. The second unit of study covers 15 lessons in Child Guidance in which the objective are: To study the activities of children and learn how to guide them by learning how to guide a child in its play, selecting toys and teaching a child how to care for toys; selecting and telling stories and songs to children and observing the effect of music on children.

The second year work is divided into three units for this semester. The first unit of study is 50 lessons in Foods in which the girls learn how to preserve and store a surplus of foods at a minimum cost; how to plan and prepare and serve dinners for an average family, and also company dinners and dinners for unexpected guests. In this unit the girls also learn how to conduct themselves in public eating places.

In unit two, which is a study of household equipment in 20 lessons, the following aims are set: To learn how to plan and equip attractive and efficient kitchens for an average family; to learn how to care for such a kitchen, and also how to plan and care for an appropriately furnished dining room. A brief study of labor-saving devices fits into this unit.

Unit three is a short study of Home Nursing in 15 lessons. The girls learn how to arrange a comfortable, sanitary room for the sick in the home, first aid in the common emergencies that arise in an average home. Simple meals for the sick and aged are included in this unit.

Some of the outstanding projects that we have already completed are: Food Preservation; Study of Food Budgets; Breakfast Foods; Public table service. At present the first year is preparing and serving breakfasts for average families, and the second year class is learning how to prepare proper food combinations for family dinners; the preparation of meat was our study the past week.

The second year helps keep the accounts for the department. Both classes try to keep our department clean and in order. We are trying to run it as nearly like a home as possible. Each is doing work in our homes that corresponds to the work being done in class. All of us are members of the Eagles' Homemakers Club. We hope to carry out projects in our club that will add to our class work. We are always glad to welcome visitors to our class. Mr. R. D. Holt has visited us.
