## THIS WEEK IN Texas History

Week of February 16

1865—Robert LaSalle led the first European emigrants to Texas. They landed on the west side near the entrance to Matagorda Bay on Feb. 18.

1846—Texas became a part of the Union Feb. 16. J. Pinckney Henderson was the first governor of Texas.

1846—On Feb. 19 the U. S. laws and postal service became effective in Texas.

1846—Gen. Sam Houston and Gen. Thomas J. Rusk were elected Senators in the Congress of the U. S. on the 21st of Feb.

1861—The Secession committee prepared a declaration of the causes which impelled the State of Texas to secede from the Federal Union.

The capital was moved to Austin from Houston in 1839, was removed back to Houston in 1842, due to fear of an attack on Austin; then to Washington (on the Brazos), and in 1845 back to Austin.

## Dates are Set for Cowboy Reunion at Stamford, Tex.

Stamford.—Dates for the 7th annual session of the Texas Cowboy Reunion have been officially set by the directors as July 2, 3 and 4, Thursday, Friday and Saturday. The reunion this year will be part of the Texas Centennial observance, being known as the Texas Cowboy Reunion Celebration of the Texas Centennial.

The Texas Cowboy Reunion, recognized as one of the most authentic survivals of the Old West and the rapidly vanishing cattle empire, will prove instructive as well as entertaining to Centennial visitors both from within and without the state. The annual in Stamford brings together the pioneer cowboys and cattlemen who replaced the buffalo with longhorns, as well as the bronzed cowboys of today who punch the white-faced cattle on the comparatively few remaining large ranches of the Southwest.

Texas Centennial year is expected to bring to Stamford for the reunion crowds exceeding the record attendance of 60,000 at the 3-day celebration last year. Plan are under way for permanent improvements, for convenience of those taking part in the reunion, and to care for the increased attendance each year.

## Junking Program Of Chevrolet to Enhance Safety

Thousands of old automobiles so decrepit that they potentially a danger to users of the highway have been smashed since Jan. 1, under a nation wide "junking" plan instituted by Chevrolet Motor company in January and continued in February, according to W. E. Holler, vice president and general sales manager. Full reports for the period to date have not been compiled.

"The operation of the junking plan is bound to reduce the hazards of the highway," Mr. Holler pointed out. "Literally thousands of cars whose further operation on the highways would be a menace to their owners and to others will be retired permanently, and the probabilities are that the total will run ever higher."

"The removal of the cars already scrapped from the streets and highways will definitely reduce the traffic hazard, for next to the driver himself, the most important factor in highway safety is the condition of the vehicle."

Mr. Holler explained the plan under which Chevrolet and its dealers are carrying out the junking program. The Chevrolet Motor company pays the dealer for each old car, taken in trade on a new Chevrolet, that is scrapped. The actual junking is supervised by the Chevrolet district manager who certifies that the car was destroyed in accordance with the terms of the agreement.

### HOME TO RECUPERATE

Miss Mattierue Newton, who recently underwent an operation in San Antonio, was able to return to her home here Tuesday.

Owing to tick infestations and scabbies infections, recently discovered in Texas along the Mexican border, where the country has been free from ticks and scabbies for a long time, the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas has seen fit to place all of the country along the border of Mexico under quarantine. This quarantine will have as its northern boundary the Southern Pacific R. R. right-of-way fence, on the south side of the railroad, between El Paso and Del Rio.

This will, in some places, take in more country than the commission desired to take in, but the Southern Pacific railroad right-of-way fence is the only established line which can be used in this area.

L. J. Watts of Marfa will be in charge of the district between El Paso and Val Verde county, and for the present will have five men under his supervision. Walter Edwards will be stationed at Sierra Blanca, Hussie Galloway at Marathon, J. B. Currie at Sanderson, and Cal Ory and Henry Glascock in the southern part of Brewster county, where tick eradication is now being conducted.

All movements of livestock from this quarantined area must undergo an inspection by one of these inspectors, and if found free from ticks or scabbies, the inspector will issue the owner or shipper a certificate, which must accompany the livestock before they can be shipped or trailed out of this area.

Mr. Watts stated he is very grateful for the cooperation that has been extended him so far by everyone concerned, and earnestly desires that all livestock owners, shippers and railroad agents in his district will continue to help carry out this very important work of the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas.

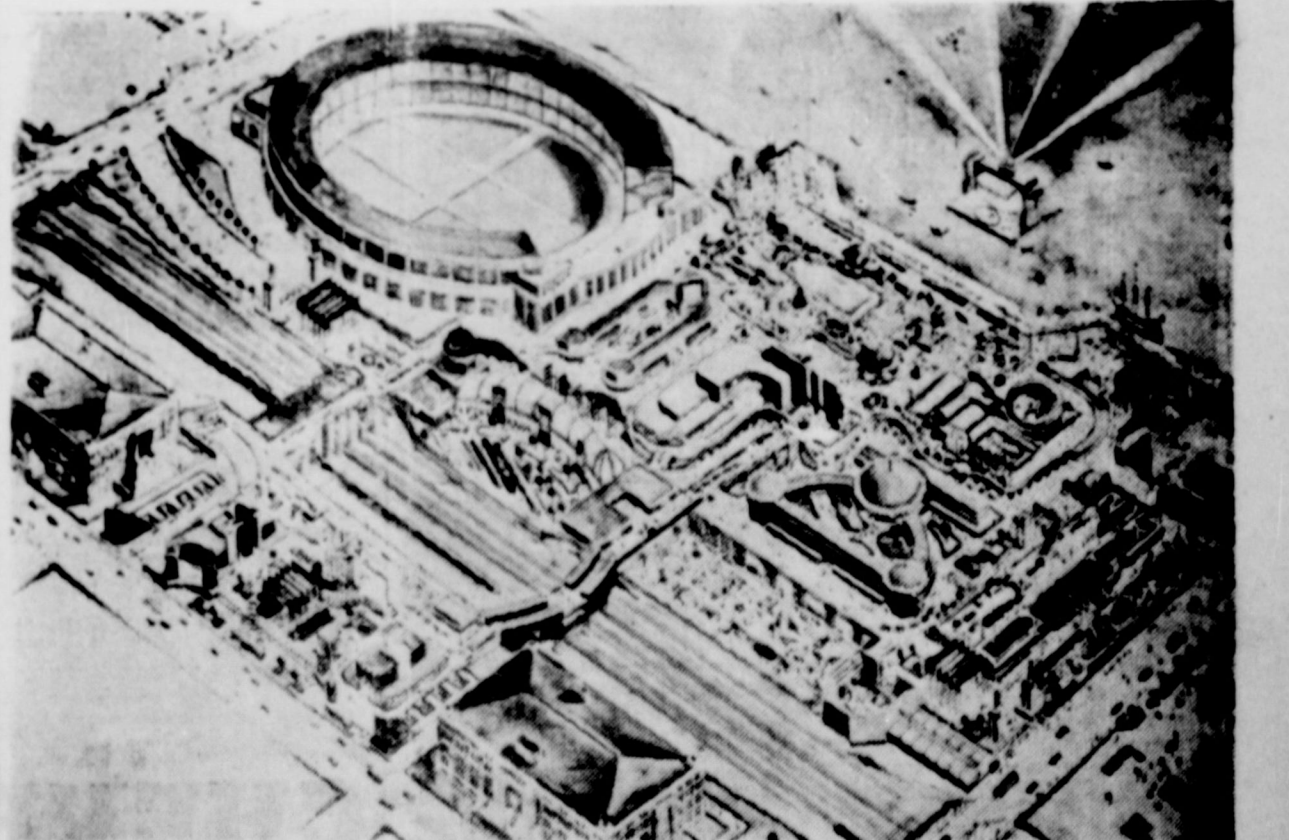

## NOBODY'S BUSINESS

Austin.—To state auditor Orville S. Carpenter, who became director of the old age assistance commission on Feb. 14, when the pension law became officially effective, and his group of about 25 office assistants should go the thanks of the aged of Texas this week. Working for two months without pay, Carpenter and his staff organized their office, set up a statewide organization, drafted application blanks for pension seekers, carried out every preliminary detail necessary to begin taking applications for pensions on the first day the law became effective. On the last night tired but gratified at a job well done, Carpenter, the board's attorney, stenographers and clerks shed their coats and packed shipments of application blanks to a few nearby county seats. As a result, blanks were available at every county seat, and at convenient places in other towns from one end of Texas to the other on the first day. They could not receive a penny of pay until Feb. 14, and their office didn't even have a stamp to answer correspondence.

The licensed sale of liquor in 40 all wet and 60-odd partly wet Texas counties, at the end of two months operation of the new control law, had yielded the states \$1,206,709 in liquor taxes, and \$321,351 in license fees. One-fourth goes to the school fund, the remainder to the old-age pension fund, less operating expenses. In Kennedy county, completely wet by local option, there is not a single licensed liquor outlet, however, County Clerk A. J. Turcotte reported. Wichita county, the home of dry Governor J. V. Allred, voted wet in a local option last Saturday by a substantial majority. Evidence that the new law is being substantially obeyed came from two sources. Rep. J. D. Young of Cuero, and Rep. Emmett Morse of Houston, joint authors of the sale-by-drink bill which was defeated, toured South Texas and reported enforcement conditions good. Mexican night spots across the border were reported re-opening, after a depression that set in when liquor sale was legalized in Texas.

From virtually every county courthouse in Texas letters, written by the county judges and commissioners were pouring in this week to Texas congressmen in Washington, urging them to back up the plea of President Garrett and Secy. Nelson of the State County Judges and Commissioners association, who are in Washington to seek relaxation of labor regulations on WPA jobs, and continuance of federal appropriations for highway construction. There are probably 50,000 heads of families in Texas who have managed to keep off relief rools so far; they need work desperately, and they cannot understand why they must go hungry, while those on relief are given the work, thus penalizing them for their initiative. They have turned the heat on their local county judges and commissioners who, in turn, with campaigns for re-election facing them, have sent their representatives to Washington to complain. In some counties WPA jobs are actually being held up for lack of available relief labor, while hundreds of unemployed, never on relief, anxious to work, are denied a chance. The judges contend that road and highway projects free of suspicion of "boondoggling" and productive of useful permanent improvements, are the best way to spend public money to create employment—but they unanimously agreed that red tape restrictions of the WPA are handicapping the program fearfully in Texas.

## PROGRESS MARCHES ON

Items of Interest From Towns in the Southwest

BRACKETVILLE—Futures in lambs in this section have been contracted at \$5 a head. Goats in the hair jumped 50c recently, it was reported. Mohair, it was stated, has a bright outlook, and experts predict it will reach, in 1936, high levels ranging from 70c to 80c. Advance contracts offering 31c for wool have been refused by the raisers.

FORT STOCKTON—A complete and modern refinery is being constructed by a Corsicana firm at Baldrige, near this city. All crude from a nearby pool has been contracted for by the refiners at posted market prices. A new project in the city, and under WPA, employing many workers, will start soon. It is a triple program calling for roads in Block 1, a paved highway to the famous Comanche Springs, and an airport—Estimated cost \$50,000.

OZONA—Contractors, an office force and a crew of workers arrived here last week for initial work on 9.1 miles of pavement on Highway 27. The contract was awarded to R. W. Briggs of Pharr, Texas. Caliche pits have been opened up, employing about fifteen men. When actual construction gets under way about forty men will be employed. The road in question is west of Ozona, a link to Sheffield, Fort Stockton, and Pecos.

SABINAL—The annual fat stock show will be held here Feb. 24 and 25. Entries up to last week totaled 33 animals, tops in their respective classes. After the exhibit here these animals will be sent to San Antonio for competition in the first annual fat stock show to be held in that city—Feb. 26 to 28, where cash prizes totaling \$1000 and many premiums will be awarded.

ALPINE—A new picture show house will be opened in this city in the near future, to be known as The Texas. Sol J. Davidson of San Antonio will head the new enterprise. Good roads enthusiasts in Alpine are now advocating a campaign which will include construction of new roads and re-routing of others and, if

## REQUIREMENTS FOR OLD AGE ASSISTANCE

This is No. 2 of a series of explanatory articles, which persons intending to apply for the Old Age Assistance should read carefully. Compliance with the rules laid down will expedite matters considerably.—Editor

Austin.—Applicants should be able to prove their yearly income because the old-age assistance law provides that \$360 yearly for single persons and \$720 yearly for married couples must be the total of revenues received by applicants from all sources including the State aid, according to Orville S. Carpenter, executive director-designate of the Old-Age Assistance, indissolving the new law.

"Applicants should be prepared to make full and complete statement of all earnings for the two years immediately preceding application," Mr. Carpenter said. "The cash or security clause in the new law necessitates that applicants be able to tell the exact amount of money they have in

the bank. They should be prepared to give a description of all securities owned, serial numbers, from whom purchased, etc." he explained. "If securities were sold, the name of the purchaser must be known. Full details of all securities handled, bought, or sold during the last two years must be provided. "Not only does the requirement concern earned income, but aid from any source must be listed," Carpenter stated.

Section 7, sub-section (e) of the new law reads that the application shall contain the following information: If receiving aid from any source the amount received and from whom, or if such aid is not in cash money, then a description of such aid tendered, together with the name of the source of such aid and from whom; the amount received from the U. S. Government, the State or County, public or private charitable organizations, corporations, or private individuals.

Applicants will be able to get blanks in their own locality on Feb. 14. These forms may be filed as soon as filled out by applicants.
