PRACTICAL COOKERY

By the Home Economics Dept. Texas State College for Women

Denton.—New suggestions for any meal are welcomed, but perhaps most important are those for the lunches carried to school by the children.

A cold lunch of sandwiches, cookies, and perhaps some fruit, may become very monotonous and lacking in proper nourishment unless carefully considered.

The sandwich is indeed the most important item since it is easy to pack, easy to eat, and stands up well for a few hours when properly made and well-packed.

Creamy Cheese Sandwich For a soft, well-flavored cheese sandwich, so much more appetizing than the dry plain one, make a white sauce of 2 tablespoons of shortening, 2 1/2 tablespoons flour, 1-3 teaspoon salt, 1 cup milk.

Ground Meat Sandwich The richness of corned beef, minced ham, or cooked liver may be improved as well as increased when mixed with a thick boiled dressing of 2 eggs, 1/2 cup water, 1/2 cup vinegar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 1/2 tablespoons flour, and 1 cup of ground meat.

Carrot-Raisin Sandwich 1 cup finely ground carrots, 1/2 cup ground raisins, 4 tablespoons peanut butter. Combine ingredients and spread on whole wheat bread.

Cottage Cheese Sandwiches 1 cup cottage cheese, 1/2 cup of ground raisins or cooked prunes. Mix ingredients together in a paste and spread on whole wheat bread.

Liver Butter Sandwiches Grind left-over cooked liver or cook raw liver by simmering in a little water. Put through food chopper, discarding all stringy portions. Rub to a paste in a mixing bowl. To each cup of the liver paste add 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon celery salt, 1 tablespoon of melted butter, 3 tablespoons catsup or chili sauce, and 1 teaspoon onion juice.

Ice Box Cookies 1 1/4 cup shortening, 1 cup brown sugar, 1 cup granulated sugar, 3 eggs, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 4 1/2 cups flour, 1 1/2 teaspoon soda, 1 cup nut meats.
