Deadline Nears For Registration **Motor Vehicles**

Registration of motor vehicles has been a little orisk here this week, yet there is a large number yet to be registered before the deadline, Wednesday, March 31. In a ruling received the first of the week by the tax collector from the state highway depart-

ment, the registration of motor vehicles or trailers which are owned by residents of other counties may not be registered in this county, as it is in strict violation of the state laws.

The state highway department has also ruled that owners, who have obtained their license plates by purchasing them in counties other than the county of their residence, are operating with illegal license plates, and are subject to arrest and fine for operation of such motor vehicles improperly registered and, furthermore, that they are subject, upon apprehension to re-registration in the county of their residence.



By repeated experiment and mixing he finally evolved an effervescent wine that, unlike the still wine then known, sparkled and bubbled when uncorked.

After suitable aging, Dom Perigoon allowed the other monks to sample his new invention. To his pleasant surprise, the popping of corks soon became a familiar sound in the dining hall, e

News of the wine soon spread to he townspeople nearby, and within s year, the Marquis de Sillery had ntroduced it in court circles where it immediately became the rage.

Wife of President **Issues Challenge American Youth**

Denton, March 18 .- Issuing challenge to youth to face life's problems, Mrs. F. D. Roosevelt, wife of the President, pointed out that the necessity of earning a living is the first great problem for most young people today. Speaking before a capacity crowd at Texas State College for Women Tuesday morning, the First Lady further stated that this is a problem to be met with two kinds of preparation, one to earn a living, the other to enjoy living.

Referring to the NYA and CCC setups, she said "Much of their work may prove to be purely an emergency activity but some may be permanent because it not only meets the needs of certain young people, but may be used as laboratories for studying what could be done with larger groups of people elsewhere.


