Under U. C. Act

Austin, March. 31.-Contribuions under the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act are being made by two employers in Terrell county, Chairman-Director Orville S. Carpenter announ-

Contributions from these employers will set up unemployment benefits for 25 workers in Terrell county, it was stated.

The commission's activities in Terrell county are under the direction of District Fieldman C. B. Hahn, who has headquarters at the El Paso chamber of commerce. All employers having any problems arising under the TUCA are requested to call on Mr. Hahn for assistance, Carpenter stated.

The Texas Unemployment Compensation commission was established by an act of the Texas legislature, signed by Governor Allred October 27, 1936. In five months of operation it has collected approximately \$7,000,000 from 11,707 Texas employers. All money collected from employers will be used to establish benefit accounts for more than 600,000 workers, while all operating expenses of the commission are paid by the federal security board, Mr. Carpenter pointed out.

The next payment to the Texas commission will be due April 25, when Texas employers who are subject to the act must pay a tax of one and eight-tenths per cent on their total payrolls for the months of February and March.

Carrizo Springs was settled in the late sixties and this tragedy had occured in 1836. I made up my mind that if it were true that these people and their carts had mysteriously disappeared while enroute from Del Rio to San Patricio, that those people and their carts were in the Espantosa Lake. The lake is almost on a line from Del Rio to San Patricio. It is very narrow and deep. It was a place that would suggest to the Indians, if they had killed those pepole near that lake, to dump their carts inand forever cover up the evidence. And they could go on


