





Report Reveals Third Grade is Interesting Facts

In a survey of the 1936 publication of the Southern Association of American Secondary Schools and Colleges, 11 southern states are represented in this association and 1,182 high schools are members.

Sanderson high school has been a member of the association for six years. Each year reports are made to the central office before a school can hold membership in the organization for another year. The association is composed of schools in the southern states. The object is to establish helpful relationships between the secondary schools and the institutions of

higher education and to consider all subjects that tend to the promotion of their interests. The report of the commission

on secondary schools which met December 1, 1936, gives the following information concerning the member schools:

Of the 1,182 high school members, Texas has 234; eighteen were added last year. The smallest school in Texas on the southern association list is the Radford School, a private institution in El Paso, with an enrollment of only 38; the largest member school in Texas is the Robert Lee Paschal school in Fort Worth, having an enrollment of 2,305 students.

Most of the high schools in this section are members of the association. The last quarterly report gives the enrollment and the date of accrediting of the schools in this section. A part of this report follows: Alpine has fourteen teachers and 124 pupils and was accredited in 1932. Del Rio has 12 teachers and 237 pupils, being accredited in 1928. Eldorado has 140 pupils and was accredited in 1931. Fort Stockton has 10 teach-The results of the district meet were not all victorious, but were 19 teachers, 258 pupils; Marfa has 7 teachers and 110 pupils: Ozona

has 7 teachers and 112 pupils; and Sanderson has 8 teachers and 83 pupils.






