In each of hese eras, the Spanish and Mexican period, the era of the Revolution and Republic, the years before the Civil War, during that war and after, new forts were constructed at the changing vantage points

At present there are nine forts in use which, with the exception of a few old timers, date from the post Civil War period or World War days. These are located at Galveston, Bolivar Peninsular, Galveston Island and Brownsville on the coastline; on the border at El Paso, Brackettville, Laredo and Rio Grande City; and at San Antonio, which is the only fort in

SENATE PASSES APPROPRIATION FOR BIG BEND NATIONAL PARK

A telegram received by the Times Tuesday afternoon stated that an appropriation of three-quarters of a million dollars had been okayed by the Texas senate, mainly through the recommendation of H. L. Winfield, of this senatorial district, as a nucleus of a fund for the creation of a National Park in the Big Bend area. Senator Winfield has taken the lead in securing favorable legislation for the project since his election, and has succeeded in presenting arguments favoring the park to his colleagues that support of the project in the senate is practically unanimous.

Sanderson Times:

Just succeeded in passing appropriation in the senate for \$750,000 for Big Bend Park. This amount not what we asked for, but consider it will go a long way toward the ultimate end.
