Contracts Let For Work on U. S. 90 In Three Counties

At a meeting held last week in Austin the State Highway Commission let several contracts for work to be done on U. S. Highway 90 in this section. Projects let included work in Terrell, Jeff Davis and Presidio counties.

The project for this county is for 1.1 miles of work in the western part of the county, and includes cutting down a hill and reconstructing base course. T. M. Brown & Son of Lubbock were awarded the contract for \$9,182.

Ernest Loyd, Fort Worth, was low bidder on topping 21-7 miles from Valentine east to Conejo, in Jeff Davis and Presidio counties, on Highway 90. The bid was \$183,931.

The contract for topping an 18-mile strip west of Valentine was let some time ago.

Approval of these projects by the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads will be needed before work can be started.

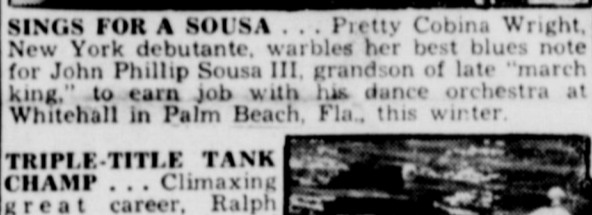

County Agent for Reeves and Ward Inspects Terracing

Ted Johnston, county agent of Reeves and Ward counties, accompanied by two ranchers from Pecos, visited several of the terracing projects in the Mitchell and Big Canyon country Tuesday with Ernest Williams, county agent for Terrell county.

Mr. Johnston stated that none of this work was done in his two counties last year, but they were anxious to try it under the 1938 range program. They were very much interested in the terraces constructed with the double plow and will use a similar machine there. One of the ranchers with Mr. Johnston poisoned pack-rats on 144 sections of his ranch.

Dick McDonald is Asking Election as Commissioner

He is a native Texan and has long been identified with public life. Prior to coming to Sanderson he held the office of County Treasurer of Sutton county, resigning the office to come here to make his home and to engage in the ranch business. He has served as a member of the local school board.

In making his announcement to the voters Mr. Hardgrave states that if elected he will look after the duties connected with the office to the best of his ability and will appreciate the support of the voters at the coming primary election of July 23.

Sale of Christmas Seals Net County Tidy Sum of \$106

Total receipts from the 1937 Tuberculosis Christmas Seal sale in Terrell county amounted to \$187.50, and more than \$106.00 of this amount will be retained in the county to promote the health program here. Since "no home is safe until all home are safe," let us all put our shoulder to the wheel and do the necessary thing to stamp out the dread disease—tuberculosis. In our school this month students are being given the opportunity to take the tuberculin test, which shows whether or not a boy or girl has picked up germs of tuberculosis.

If the test shows that germs are present, X-ray pictures help to reveal whether or not these germs have done any damage.

In the schools where it is convenient, mothers are invited to be present when the test is made. It is important that all parents should more fully understand how the early discovery of tuberculosis and proper treatment may prevent further danger.

The tuberculin test is in no sense a preventive, or a cure. When followed by X-ray pictures that show trouble is brewing, it points the way to modern, scientific treatment of the patient.

In the United States great progress has been made in fighting tuberculosis. But there are still five hundred thousand persons sick with this disease. Efforts in fighting this enemy should be increased until it has disappeared like other life-destroying plagues which have been conquered by modern science.

Sims Wilkinson is Candidate. Office Of County Judge

Voting Strength Of County Shows 200 More Than '37

A total of 707 poll tax receipts were issued from the tax collector's office at the close of the last day, Monday, January 31. With 25 exemptions issued to those who became of age after January 1, this year, there will be a total of 732 voters in the county this year. Adding those over age, who are not required to obtain a poll tax receipt, there will be approximately 750 who will be eligible to vote in election held in 1938.

Last year there were 511 poll tax receipts and 3 exemption certificates issued.

Progress Items Taken From Our Exchanges

McCAMEY—

A meeting of the directors of the McCamey chamber of commerce and oil operators in the McCamey district was held last Thursday night for the purpose of perfecting an organization to attempt to raise the proration of the McCamey field which now has a factor of one-half of one per cent, which is said to be the lowest in the State, according to the McCamey News.

FLORESVILLE—

With two days of clear skies and good sunshine, the spinach movement has been resumed in Wilson county, according to the Record-Chronicle. A total of 11 cars were shipped from this place last week.

MARFA—

The Big Bend Sentinel, last week reported one of the largest ranch deals in this country was closed last Thursday, when W. H. Cleveland sold his 42,000-acre ranch and 1500 head of cattle to C. H. Jackson, Jr., of Santa Barbara, California, of the Petan Investment Co. The consideration was said to have been \$350,000, the land selling for approximately \$6.50 an acre.

OZONA—

The Crockett county commissioners will consider at their next regular meeting a proposal from the city of San Angelo that the county share in the service of a police broadcasting station expansion program, now being considered by officials there, the Ozona Stockman reported in its issue of last week.

UVALDE—

Finishing touches are being put on almost 100 head of cattle, sheep, goats and swine by the Uvalde county 4-H Club and the F. F. A. boys, in preparation for the annual Uvalde County Fat Stock Show, to be held Feb. 22, the Leader-News states.

Know Texas

Denton.—Texas sticks to the middle path in the question of marriage laws, with the marriageable ages without consent of parents set at 21 and 18, and with consent, 16 and 14. Nine states in the union who have no certain laws are governed by the old English common law, which allows marriage at the ages of 14 and 12 years for the male and female respectively.

Sixteen states now have laws requiring a five-day notice either before the license is obtained or before the wedding takes place, and Texas is among the three who specify three-day intervals. Wisconsin goes so far as to require both five days notice before and five days delay after the license is issued. The other 29 states allow immediate marriage.

Flag Complications

One would hardly suspect the Texas flag, with all its simplicity, of being a geometrical problem, but so it is. Its width must be equal to two-thirds of its length, and the three stripes must be exact duplicates of each other in size, with the blue at the side, the white at the top and the red at the bottom. The diameter of the circle passing through the 5-points of the star is equal to three-fourth of the width of the blue stripe upon which it is placed.

WEEKLY Health Letter

FOR SANITARY RESTROOMS

Austin.—Filthy restrooms used by the public at Texas cafes, taverns, filling stations and retail establishments are a menace to the health of the community and the state and cannot be further tolerated, it was announced this week by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

Dr. Cox added that "The State Health Department at this time serves warning to all concerned that public restrooms must be maintained in a sanitary manner, under penalty of violation of the State Food and Drug Law, Article 695, which carries a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100."

"Disease breeds in such places when they are allowed to become filthy, and the disease is spread from one person to another under such conditions. Facilities should be available for washing the hands; toilets must be sanitary and kept that way. The rest room that does not meet adequate sanitary requirements is a reflection on the establishment which it serves and should be so interpreted. We ask the citizenship of Texas to join us in this campaign to clean up restrooms."
