





## Social Security Now Available

Wage earners who have lost their social security account number cards may now obtain duplicates from the El Paso office of First National Bildg., it was announced this week by David S. Pruitt, manager of the office.

Formerly, duplicates of account number cards issued in connection with the Federal Old Age Insurance program, could be obtained only from Washington. Local officers are now authorized to issue duplicates upon the proper indentification to workers who have lost their cards.

This service to workers who have lost their cards has been extended to help them obtain employment. Reports from this area indicate, Pruitt explained, that employers are giving preference to job applicants having account number cards. This may be due to the fact that if an employe fails to obtain an account number, the employer must, under Federal Treasury regulations. apply for a number for this particular worker. The employer is required to include both the name of the worker and his account number in periodic reports of the worker's wages which he files with the Treasury.

Pruitt said he had been instructed to obtain the home address and the name and address of the employer of persons requesting duplicate cards.
