DO TRY DEL RIO OUSTER CASE HERE

Panel on Both Sides Agree to Change Exhausting Two Panels Many Whom Had Fixed Opinions

(An Evening News)
The city oyster suit was set for trial March 21 in Sanderson by Judge Montague last Thursday after an agreement between defense attorneys and Attorney Julian LaCrosse reached that a change should be granted. An agreement was reached after a panel of 42 jurors was selected Wednesday afternoon by nine prospective jurors qualified and after an agreement was reached after a panel had been summoned for jury duty Thursday.

Outline Reasons

Registration of Cars Moves Slow In This County

Registration of motor vehicles in Terrell county has been slow, according to advices from the tax collector's office on Wednesday of this week. Up to that date only 66 cars had been registered, 19 commercial cars and 29 farm trucks. Motorists have until April 1 to secure licenses for 1938. After that date a heavy penalty will be assessed, and motorists will be subject to fines if cars are driven on the highway without a 1938 license plate.

Filed Year Ago

Against H. (Mike) Avila, Otto Koog, city commissioner, filed nearly a year ago in district court and seeks to have the offices they occupy vacated. Judge Montague ruled in favor of the city in the case, but LaCrosse appealed it to the court of Civil Appeals. It was remanded. New recipes and new ideas in meal planning and preparation will be presented at Katie Kilowatt's Free Cooking School, to be held in the banquet hall at the Masonic building Monday and Tuesday, March 21 and 22, at 2:30 p. m., under the sponsorship of the Community Public Service Company, according to Mr. Clyde Morris, local manager. All home makers of Sanderson and Terrell county are invited to attend. Ruth Clark, graduate home economist, will be in charge of the program which will contain a host of helpful suggestions for the homemaker who aspires to keep abreast of modern methods in the kitchen. National Officer To Lecture at Sul Ross March 29th

Alpine—(Spcl)—Plans have been completed by which Mrs. Charles E. Roe, national field secretary of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, Washington, D. WEEKLY Health Letter

SHOULD REGISTER BIRTHS

Austin.—If unexpectedly faced with the necessity of legally establishing the date of their births and their age, and American citizenship, thousands of Texans would not know whether or not their births were registered with the proper authorities. Great embarrassment, inconvenience, even serious property loss could conceivably result from either an absence of registration or an error in filing it with the State.

The law requires the births of all Texas babies to be registered with the local registrar, who is the Justice of the Peace in rural areas, and City Secretary in incorporated towns within five days after the blessed event takes place, and forms are furnished physicians and midwives for this purpose. A copy of the registration is returned for permanent filing. These records are "vital" not only to the individual from a legal standpoint, Dr. Cox, state health officer said, but to the State as well.

"We must know how many babies are born, how many die, and from what causes mortality occurs if we are to accomplish the best results from a public health standpoint. Such a program obviously needs the interested support of every Texan. Our Bureau of Vital Statistics is only too glad to cooperate in 'getting the record straight!'"

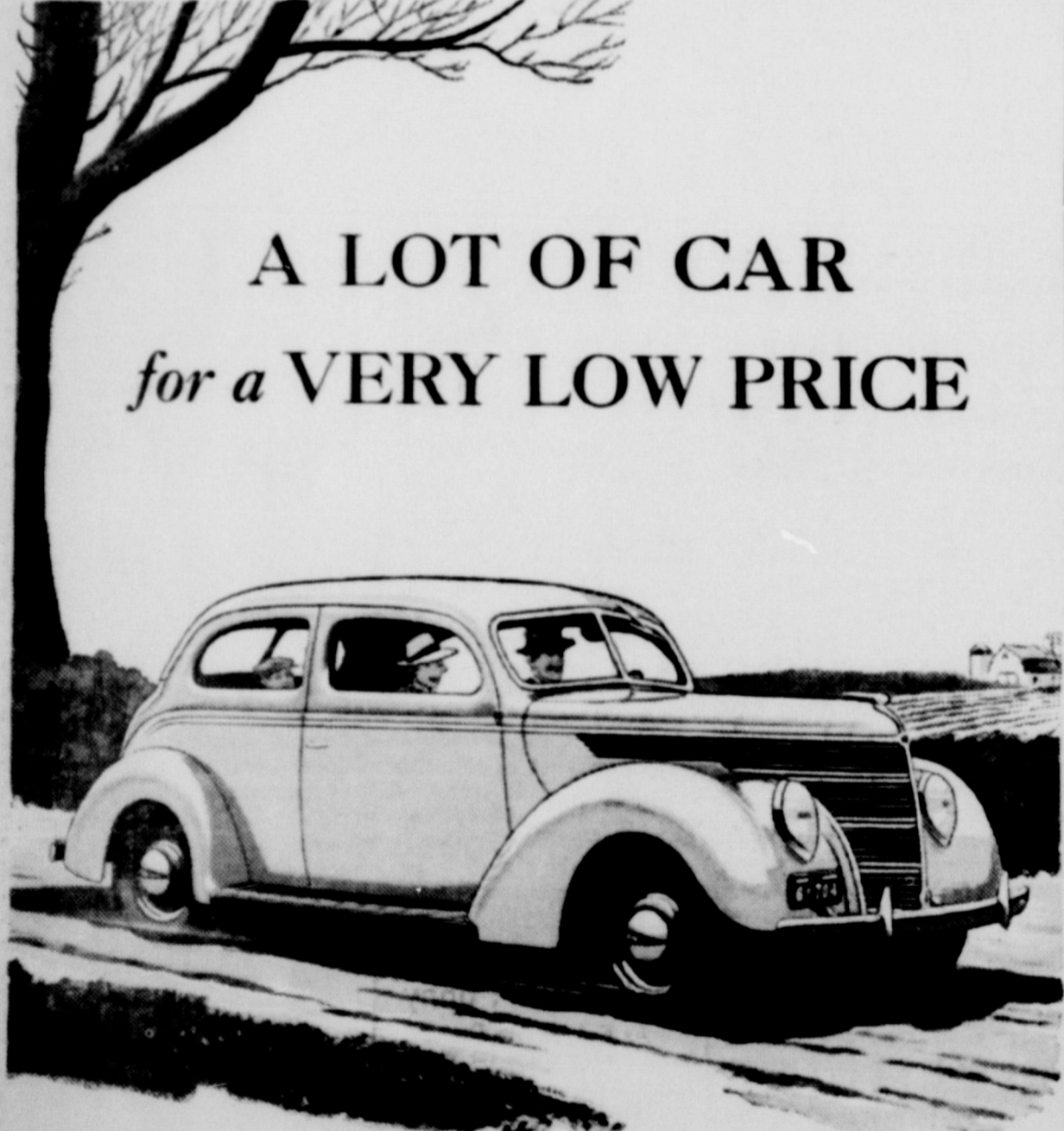

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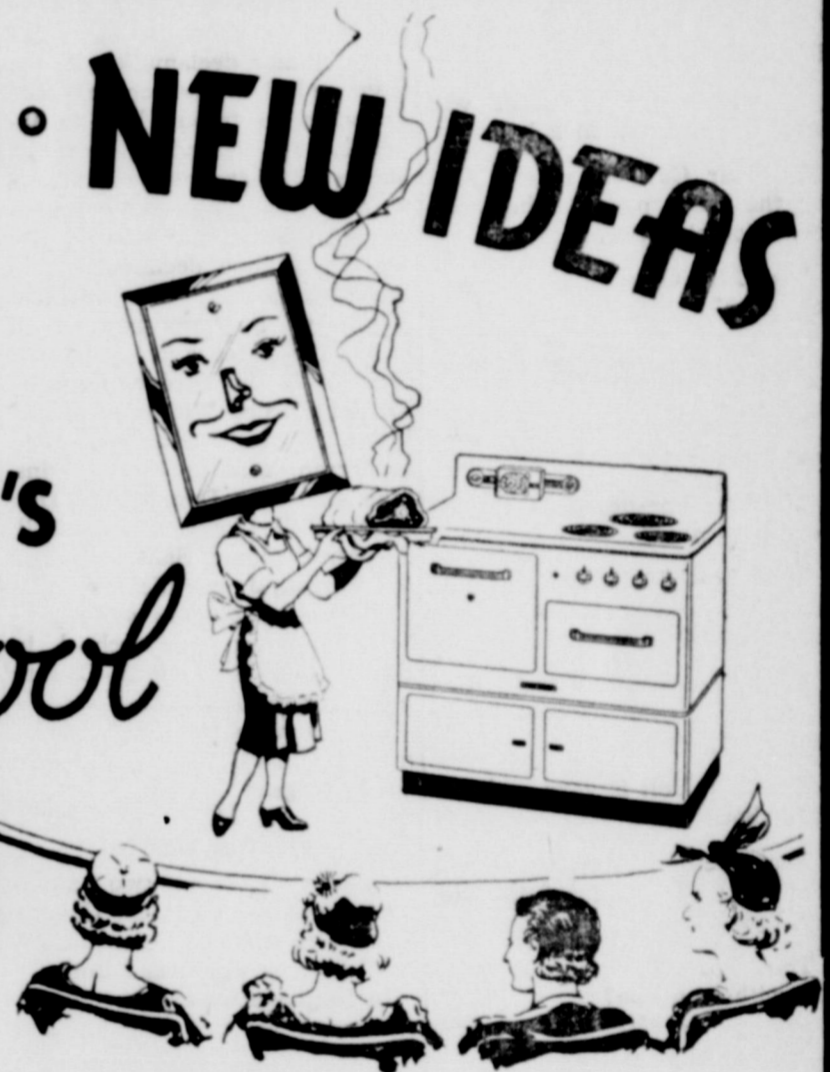
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
