to the Muleshoe Rotary club
his past week, Below are excerpts from his talk.

erpts from his talk.

"In the midst of today's information explosion, The state of Texas has adopted the theme "Library Excellence, Today's Necessity".

At the present time Texas ranks 37th in the states in the gring of public library service to its cittzens.

Twenty eight counties have no public library and 10% of the total population is affected.

Texas have 342 public libraries; 126 have less than 10,000 books on the shelves. These 342 cillbraries offer to the people in Texas less than no book per person. Actually it figures out to be .75% of one book.

It figures out to be .72% of one book.

Texas spends 5.84 per person annually for public library service. The national average is \$1.50. The American Library Association recommend \$3.50 per person. At the present time Muleshoe is spending \$38 per citizen in Balley county. Comparison — Illinois spends \$1.57, Oklahoma spends \$.61, Ohio spends \$2.70. In Texas there are 700,000 ashool children without central library service. Whatever, the

Now that the school is closing and school libraries will be out of action for 3 months the Muleshoe Public Area Library and the High Plains Bookmobile Library are Library and the High Plains is expected to reach 500 children.

In the year 1965 the Muleshoe Area Public Library and the High Plains Bookmobile handled approximately 17,000 check-outs.

As we look forward to the continued service of the Bookmobile in 1967 which on January list will become the soul responsibility of Balley, Cochran, Lamb and Parmer counties with a total population of \$2,252 up against the operating cost of \$14,000 it cost each citizen only \$3,75 to maintain the service for the year.
On the local scene the Muleshoe Area Fublic Library for the year 1966 - 1967, has a budget of \$4,085,36. Of the amount the city of Muleshoe carries in its budget \$3,258 and Balley county carries \$32,36. In Texas it cost \$5,100 to send a student through 12 grades. In the 50 years beyond high school \$42,00 is spent on the person for library service not per year but for the 50 years. Actually more is spent on the person in the 1st \$5 weeks of the 1st grade than is spent on him for jubile library services for the rest of his spent on him for jubile library services for the rest of his library service to its citizens. Muleshoe is seeking to render one best service possible.

Man, Machinery Chemicals to War Cotton Insects

LUBBOCK - Boll weevils and other cotton insects in the area from the Caprock east through the Rolling Plains will meet head-on this season with a mass of men, machines and programs all designed to reduce the economic threat of the pests in the region.

There probably has never been an area where cotton in-sects will face so many control efforts, says Entomologist Don Rummell, of the ExtensionSer-

Rummell, of the ExtensionService staff here.
Starting June 1, Rummell will supervise 16 teams monitoring insects in the eight-county zone where the Massive Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program has been waged for the past two years.

Ten similar teams, sponsored in part by the Rolling Plains
Cotton Growers Association and
supervised by Extension Entomologist Emory Boring of
Vernon, will be working in 31
other Rolling Plains counties
through the summer to learn
more about weevil infestations
there.

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

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
