## Howell Johnson Pioneer West Texan Dies Away at Hospital in Pecos

The following clipping taken from the May 27th issue of the Pecos Pioneer will be of interest to the many pioneer citizens of Sanderson and Terrell County.

Howell Hardin Johnson, a Fort Stockton citizen for more than half a century, and his attorney for more than half a century, died Saturday morning at 5:15 o'clock in a hospital where he had been suffering from a general run-down condition.

Johnson, who would have been 77 years old had he lived, became Pecos attorney the day following his arrival here on February 15, 1912 until Jan. 1, 1929. In Jefferson, Marion counties, on July 13, 1863, Judge Johnson was educated in schools in Kansas and studied law in Kansas law offices. He was admitted to the bar in Bowie prior to his 21st birthday.

Young lawyer, just beginning practice, he came west to Pecos City, and stayed a few months before going to the frontier post of Fort Stockton and had served for about a year as county attorney of Jeff when he learned that the county attorney of Pecos was to be vacated by one who lived in Pecos and was not eligible to serve the partitioning of Reeves from Pecos County in 1886.

His arrival in Fort Stockton was in 1886, and he lived in Fort Stockton for months at the time, and became life-long friends. Williams recalls that the government abandoned its post here in 1886, the following Judge Johnson's appointment, and the Judge Johnson's mother, who had here to make a home for her, received appointment as stress Judge Johnson, with her, lived at that time in Fort building which Judge Johnson recently bought modeled as a home.

Johnson represented absentee property owners in Pecos County in his capacity attorney, and has friends in the nation. He was widely known among the attorneys of the section.

In the course of his residence in Pecos he was active in civic and in the development of Pecos County. He was active as county judge at the oil fields first began developed in Pecos County in 1905.

Johnson was reared in a home, but joined the Presbyterian church as a young boy. He was a regular attendant at the Christian church in Fort Stockton.

Johnson was a member of the Fort Stockton Lions Club until the time of his death.

On March 31, 1897, Miss Violet Eudaly of Grandfalls became the bride of the Pecos County attorney. She preceded him in death on Feb. 8, 1931. To them were born four sons, Hart, Fort Stockton attorney, Ralph, Pecos County ranchman; Gordon, oil man at Mission; and Dwight, who has made his home here with his father.

Other survivors include two sisters, Mrs. Mattie Odom, Fort Stockton, and Mrs. Clara Boren, Fort Worth.

The remains were brought from Pecos Saturday by a Clarke-Harwell-Owen ambulance, and the body lay in state until Sunday afternoon at the mortuary chapel. Funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon at the Baptist Church, with the Rev. G. M. Eastman, Christian pastor, delivering the funeral sermon, assisted by the Rev. S. F. Marsh, Baptist pastor.

Special music was given by a mixed chorus from various churches of the town. Miss Lorene Nagel, granddaughter of the early day county judge, F. W. Young, who presided over the county court when Judge Johnson began his work here as county attorney, sang a solo.

The Rev. G. M. Eastman paid tribute to Judge Johnson as a great and good man, a living exponent of the Golden Rule who went out of his way to help the poor and needy, and who was always faithful to his friends and to the church of his choice.

Burial was in Easthill Cemetery, beside the grave of the late Mrs. Johnson. Pallbearers were as follows: Hart, Ralph, Gordon and Dwight Johnson, his sons; and Garland and Clifford Odom, nephews.

## Summer Session Sul Ross College Opens Next Week

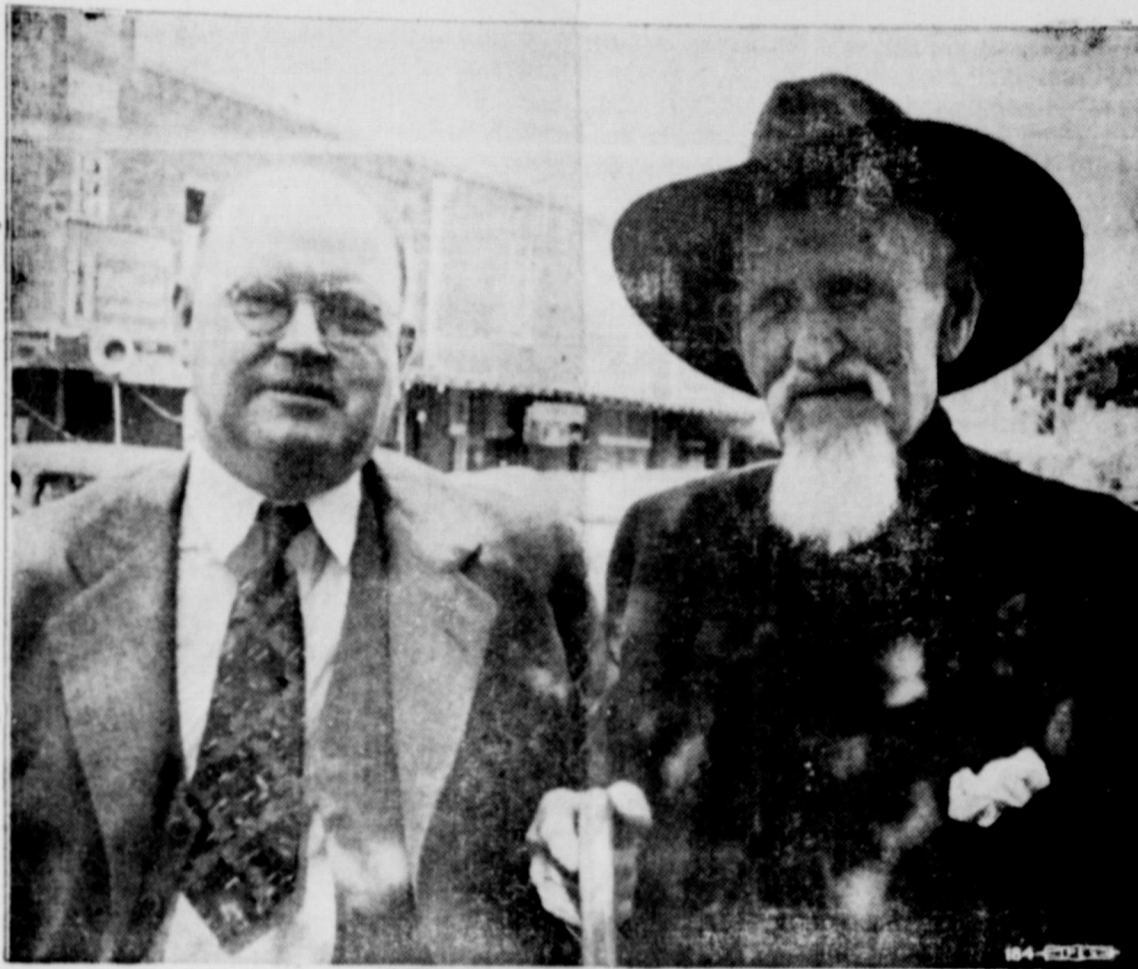

## Albert Cauthorn Seeks Re-Election As Representative

Albert (Allie) Cauthorn of Del Rio was a visitor in Sanderson on Wednesday and at that time authorized the Times to place his announcement before the voters of Terrell County as a candidate for re-election to the office of representative of the 87th legislative district, subject to the action of the Democratic primary, July 23.

Cauthorn was elected representative of this district in February, 1937, at a special election to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Stanford Payne.

Since he has been a member of the Legislature, Cauthorn has sponsored two bills relative to the formation of the national park in the Big Bend country and has been active in creating interest in the park.

"I want to thank the people of this district for the support they have given me and to solicit that support in the coming election," Mr. Cauthorn stated Wednesday. "I feel that the experience I gained in the Legislature since February, 1937, will be of great benefit to me in the event I am re-elected and because of that experience I will be able to serve the people to better advantage," the candidate concluded.

Cauthorn is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Cauthorn of the Del Rio country, was born and reared in that section, and has lived in Del Rio for many years. His experience in the ranching business makes him thoroughly familiar with the problems faced by the ranchmen in this section of the country.

Full time will be devoted to the office in the event he is re-elected, Cauthorn stated.

The 87th legislative district includes the counties of Val Verde, Terrell, Brewster, Kinney and Maverick.

Roger H. Thurmond of Del Rio announced Thursday he is a candidate for the office of district attorney for the 63rd Judicial District of Texas, subject to the action of the voters in the Democratic Primary, July 23.

Thurmond was born in Del Rio on December 8, 1904, a son of Mrs. George M. Thurmond and the late Judge Thurmond, who for many years prior to his death in 1925 was an outstanding member of the bar of West Texas and a former district attorney of this district.

Roger Thurmond received his primary education in the public school of Del Rio, later attending Texas A. & M. College and the University of Texas. He obtained his legal education in the School of Law at the latter institution and in 1929 was admitted to the bar. Since that time Thurmond has been engaged in the practice of both civil and criminal law in Del Rio.

Thurmond was elected representative of the 87th legislative district in 1928, while he was a student in the University of Texas, and served during the 41st Legislature until December, 1929. At that time he resigned to accept appointment to the office of county judge of Val Verde county, the office he held until January 1, 1935.

During his tenure as county judge the tax rate of Val Verde county was reduced annually from a rate of 91 cents when Thurmond assumed office to 20c when he retired from office. The latter figure was the lowest of any county in the state.

Thurmond married Miss Day Hamilton in Del Rio in 1930, and they are the parents of two sons, George and Roger Thurmond, Jr.

On January 1, 1935, Thurmond entered the law firm of Wallace and Thurmond of Del Rio and since then has been actively engaged in private practice.

A thorough canvass of the entire judicial district, which includes Val Verde, Maverick, Edwards, Kinney, and Terrell counties, is promised by Thurmond between now and the primaries, in the course of which he hopes to have the opportunity of meeting all of the voters of the district personally.

If elected to the office he seeks, he stated, he will discharge the duties of the office to the best of his capacity and ability.

## Highway Group To Meet and Plan Publicity for Road

Del Rio, Texas, May 31.—A meeting of the Highway 90 Association will be held during the second week in June, probably in San Antonio, a message from S. M. Swearingen of Marfa, president of the organization, to Sam H. Walk, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce highway committee, disclosed Tuesday.

Swearingen stated that directors have been appointed and have accepted service in the major portion of the cities and towns along Highway 90, between San Antonio and El Paso.

The El Paso Chamber of Commerce has promised and is giving its full support to the Highway 90 Association, it was indicated.

Tentative plans are for the association to organize permanently at the June meeting and to arrange for literature and publicity for distribution on or about November 1 on completion of the Marfa-Van Horn 75-mile sector.

Highway 90 is paved from Jacksonville, Fla., west, and with the completion of the stretch under construction between Marfa and Van Horn, the entire highway will be paved.

With state and nationwide activity for the development of the Big Bend Park, the Highway 90 Association has an opportunity for publicizing the highway throughout the nation, it has been pointed out. In addition to the development of the park, there are many other interesting features along the highway, including the Garner Park near Uvalde, the San Felipe Springs at Del Rio, the crossings of Devils River and the Pecos River, the McDonald Observatory at Fort Davis and others. Sheep, goat and cattle country is also of interest to tourists, and will be properly publicized in the literature prepared by the association.

## Engineer Inspects Soil Conservation Work on Ranches

M. R. Bentley, agricultural engineer for the Extension Service, was a Sanderson visitor last Thursday, and while here he visited several ranches where terracing and ridging was done last year. He was accompanied on the trip by Ernest Williams, county agent.

Bentley stated that the small terraces or ridges, such as those constructed on Kerr, Higgins and Brown ranches, were more practical than the larger terraces, and that even if half the ridge part washed away the remaining part with the ridge and level ditch would justify their cost. These ridging jobs represent an investment of from fifty cents to one dollar per acre.

A recent hard rain made many breaks in the ridges on the Prosser and Martin ranch, also on the big terraces constructed on the Mitchell ranch.

Surrounding towns will be visited within the next few weeks by a motorcade of local people accompanying the Fort Stockton High School Band, at which time formal invitations to attend the water Carnival will be extended.

The Texas Kidd shows were booked last week for the entire week of the Carnival, and in addition to all kinds of rides and entertainment features, this show will feature a free rodeo each day.

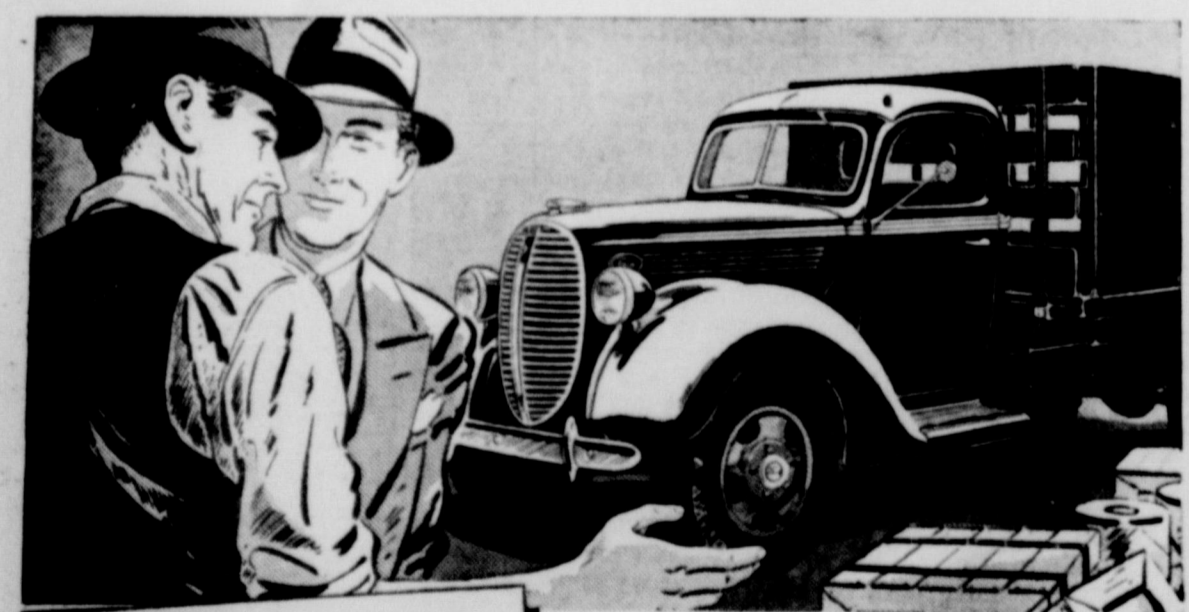

### Health Letter

Austin.—Announcement was made this week in Austin by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, of the inclusion in the Texas Tech College curriculum of a public health course in sanitation to be offered this summer from June 9 to August 25.

This public health course is the first ever to be offered by any Texas college or university and is made possible at Texas Tech in cooperation with the State Department of Health and League of Texas Municipalities.

The course is designed for waterworks operators, sewage plant operators, and sanitarians in the smaller Texas cities who have for some time demanded Texas public health courses offered within the state by men familiar with Texas problems. For the public health personnel of larger cities, the course will offer an opportunity to broaden their knowledge of public health and its trends.

The public health course will consist of training in plumbing, water works and sewage problems, disposal of garbage, rodent control, mosquito control, swimming pool operation, proper handling of milk for distribution, and general sanitation with the inclusion of some field survey work and laboratory exercises.

"We felt that the inclusion of this series of public health courses in the curriculum of the Texas Tech college is a step forward in public health work in this State, because it makes accessible to so many more men an opportunity for study of these problems than if they were forced to go out of the State for the courses. We should like to call attention to this series of courses to smaller cities, particularly so that plumbing inspectors, water plant superintendents, food and drug inspectors and sanitary inspectors may be given a chance to attend this summer with resultant bettered operation and maintenance of the municipal health program.

### New Maps of Highway Ready For Distribution

Corrected to April 1, the new Texas highway maps published by the Highway Department are available free to tourists.

The new maps, like those issued by the department in past years, is folded in booklet form, its covers in color. The front shows a picture of an inviting highway and bears the legend, "1938 Texas Highway Map. Issued by Texas State Highway Department; Robert Lee Bobbitt, commission chairman; Harry Hines, commission member; John Wood, commission member; Julian Montgomery, State Highway engineer."

The back displays a colored picture of the Alamo, labeled "Cradle of Texas Liberty."

United States highways, state highways, pavements, surfaced roads, improved earth roads, earth roads and conditionally designated roads not maintained, are each marked with individual symbols. The fact that there are no toll bridges on the Texas highway system is pointed out and mileage between towns as well as accumulated mileage between designated points is given.

Towns are listed, indexed and their population as of 1930 listed at the sides of the map proper.

City maps, showing routes thru cities and designating points of interest as well as nearby lakes, nearby rivers and adjacent airports, are also printed on the face of the map in the borders above and below the map proper. These city routes are shown for Amarillo, Wichita Falls, Waco, Austin, El Paso, Beaumont, Fort Worth, Galveston, Dallas, San Antonio, Houston, Fort Worth-Dallas inset and Houston-Galveston inset.

The back of the map is decorated with pictures of various points of interest over the state, being mounted on a light background in the shape of the State of Texas.
