Pastor Reviews 7-Year Pastorate With Local Church

Report Discloses that Church Has Enviably Financial Record

Sunday being the beginning of the eighth year of his pastorate with the Sanderson Presbyterian church, Rev. J. V. McCall reviewed some causes for gratitude during the past seven years, taking as the basis for his remarks the text, "Ebenezer—Hitherto hath the Lord Helped Us." After calling attention to the meaning and the value of memorials, he summed up the past seven years as follows:

The church has received 32 members during that time, the present membership numbering 59—just about the same as it was seven years ago. The membership has lost heavily by removals and the death of J. W. McKee and one or two others.

The church has done well in finances, having raised \$8680 for local work, and \$3358 for benevolences, or an average per year of \$1240 for current expenses, and \$479 for the benevolences.

Last year the pastor and Mr. R. S. Wilkinson represented this church at the General Assembly held at Montreat, N. C., and in December Melven Pollard went as a representative to the Youth Convention at Atlanta. Every summer the church has one or more delegates to the young people's conference at Kerrville.

In 1933 this congregation entertained the fall meeting of the Western Texas Presbytery.

The following ministers have held special meeting here: Rev. Drs. L. E. Selfridge, W. A. McLeod, Robert Gribble, Francis Davis, and W. Bristow Gray, and last September Dr. Egbert W. Smith gave a series of five missionary addresses.

The church building was repainted inside and out in 1936, and the congregation has helped with three union vacation Bible schools.

Dr. McCall paid high tribute to the Woman's Auxiliary as a most important factor in every line of work, and thanked the officers for their willingness to share a part in the public worship.

While the above are matter for thankfulness, the pastor reminded the flock that "there remaineth yet much to be possessed," and named many needs. He urged all the members to "advance on our knees," as "it is not by might, nor by power, but by my spirit, saith the Lord of Hosts."

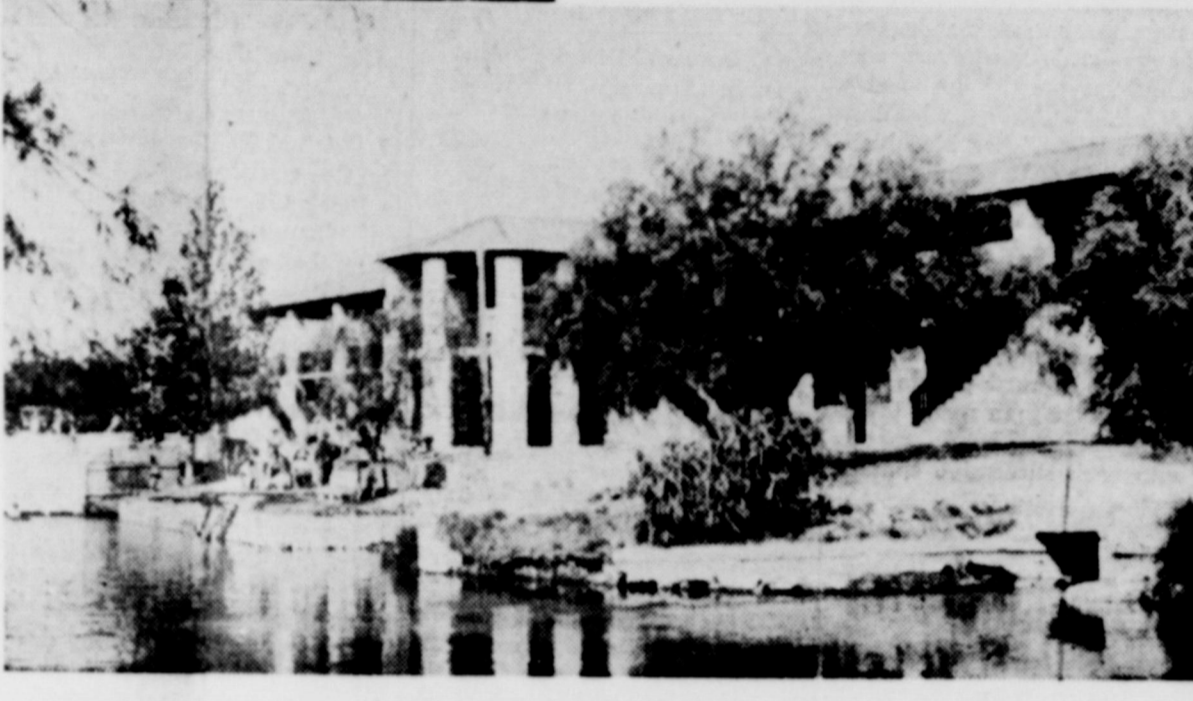
FATHER DIES

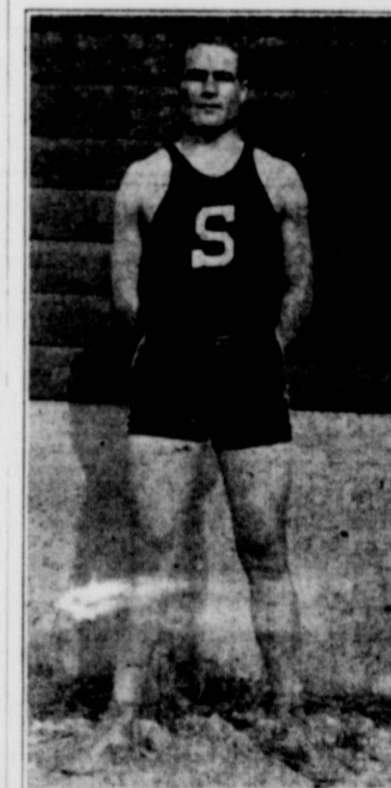
HERE FOR REUNION

U. of T. Team Will Give Exhibition; Bathing Revue, Rodeo

Fort Stockton, June 8— With splendid response from neighboring towns for the Bathing Beauty Revue, the amateur swimming and diving contests and the golf tournament, the 1938 Fort Stockton Water Carnival will become a reality for thousands of West Texans in another week.

The parade on Friday morning at 10 o'clock will open the program, which will provide amusing diversion from that time on until the end of the golf tournament on Sunday.

The University of Texas swimming team, with outstanding stars in every type of water sports, will give two exhibitions daily on both Friday and Saturday, and the University boys will also assist as judges in amateur events on the two afternoons.

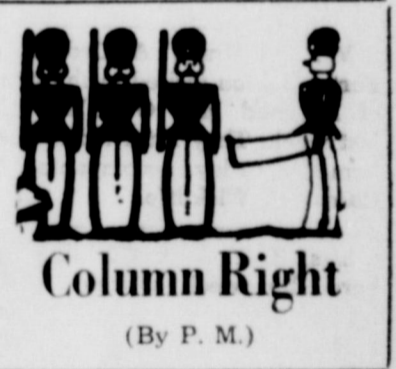
Saturday morning will be devoted to firemen's races and water fights between the departments of this entire section. Dances will be given each night following the bathing revues.
