Yeates Lamb to Heart Tuesday

Rites Read at Presbyterian Wednesday

Services were held at Wednesday afternoon in Presbyterian Church Yeates, 39, who succumbed to a heart attack Tuesday morning, about two hours after the attack. The Rev. V. McCall, pastor of Presbyterian Church of Sanderson, conducted the service at the home of the Rev. D. C. McCall, pastor of the local Baptist Church, and the Rev. J. Y. McCall, pastor of the local Presbyterian Church, in 1933.

Yeates was born in Brackley, Texas, April 15, 1899, and lived at his home during the latter part of his life. From there he moved with his parents to San Antonio, in 1918, moving to Sanderson, where he has since lived in the barber business. He died October 15, 1932, he was 33 years of age. Miss Mabel Litton of this union were born to him, four of whom survive—daughters, Joyce, Ruth, and Betty Sue, and son, Charles Edward.

Yeates served as county clerk and collector from 1928 and had served as peace officer for the past several years. He was appointed to the position after the resignation of Jessup.

Sales Tax To Be Interscholastic Debate Question for 1938-39

AUSTIN—Preliminary outline of available material on the sales tax question has been prepared by the University of Texas Interscholastic League and is available free of charge for high school students who wish to do some summer reading on the question that will be debated in the League debates during the 1938-39 school year.

"Many ambitious students wish to do summer reading on the League debate question so that they may enter the study of the question in the fall with a richer background," Roy Bedichek, director of the League, explained.

"The regular debate handbook of 250 pages will not be ready for distribution before schools open in the fall. In the meantime, the bibliography will furnish the student an intelligent guide for summer reading. The bibliography is sent free on request addressed to the Interscholastic League, Austin, Texas."

General Rain Over County Gives Relief to Ranchers

1 1/2 Inches Falls in Sanderson; More Fall Reported in Sections

General rains which fell in this part of West Texas and Terrell County the latter part of last week were of untold value to ranchmen. Grazing lands are already much greener and prospects are much brighter than in some time.

Light showers fell in Sanderson Thursday afternoon, starting at about six o'clock and continued at intervals all during the night and Friday. Heaviest rains fell Saturday afternoon around the middle of the afternoon. Total rain for the three days amounted to 1 1/2-4 inches.

Other sections of the county reported heavier rains than that received in Sanderson, heaviest reported at Dryden. Good rains in the western and southern part of the county were also reported.

This was the first rain that this section had received since January and ranchmen were suffering from the continued drought.

6-Man Football To Be Introduced into Smaller Public Schools

AUSTIN—Proposal of the Texas Interscholastic League to organize 6-man football districts in meeting with approval among smaller schools of the State, according to R. J. Kidd, athletic director of the University of Texas League office.

Demonstrations in 6-man football are being given in the summer physical education courses of the following institutions: North Texas State Teachers College, Stephen F. Austin State Teachers College, Texas Technological College, and at The University of Texas, Kidd said.

"We are confident that at least one hundred small high schools will experiment with this game as a fall sport this year," Mr. Kidd predicted. "It is hoped that the sport will prove worthwhile for schools that do not have enough boys to play 11-man football, and still have a sufficient number of boys of the football type to make up a six-man squad. It has the additional advantage of being a relatively inexpensive sport."

Terrell County Still Short of Quota Set for Big Bend Park Fund

Committee Anxious To Complete Appropriation; Asks Citizens Aid

The Big Bend National Park fund, which was originally planned to be subscribed at \$1.00 per person, under the sponsorship of the Sanderson Rotary Club and the Sanderson Culture Club, collected a total of \$262. This method over the state as a whole netted the fund some \$50,000, which was far short of the required amount, so a plan then suggested by the State Commission of Parks was put into force where by each county was given a quota based on population. This system seemed to be the best and fairest

methods of obtaining results. Gov. Allred presided at a meeting at Austin the latter part of May with representatives from different counties in attendance, which put this meeting into effect. Joe Kerr, chairman of the Big Bend National Park Committee of Terrell county, was in attendance in the interest of this county.

Mr. Kerr, as chairman of the committee, Al Creigh as secretary, and O. H. McAdams and C. V. McKnight, members of the committee, mailed out general letters to citizens of the county requesting their aid in raising the balance of the quota. Since the mailing of these letters some \$110.00 has been contributed. This, with the \$262 collected under the previous system, leaves a balance of \$160 to be collected yet. Many who had already contributed received letters which did not mean that they were asked for a double donation, but simply that all citizens of the county were to be given equal opportunity to do their share in raising the quota.

With many counties having already turned in their quotas, the committee is putting forth every effort to reach the required sum in Terrell county and asks the support of all who have any desire to see so worthy a cause as the Big Bend Park completed to do their share.

Abjondro Marquez, driving in his car behind the truck found him lying in the road about 11 p. m. and rushed him to Sanderson. Death came a few miles before he reached here, at about 4 p. m.

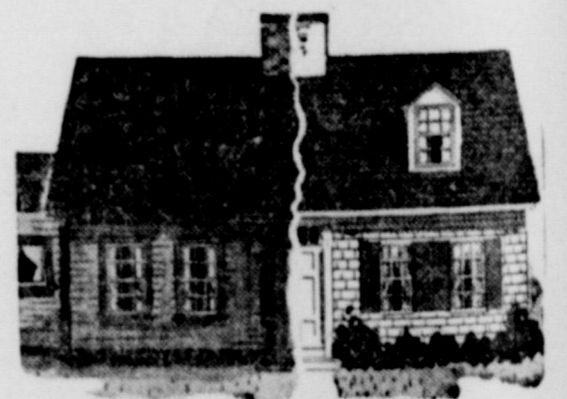

Progress Items Taken From Our Exchanges

The Fort Stockton Pioneer—A double facing neon sign, visible from both directions on the OST at its intersection with Main Street and the Santa Fe railway, is being erected to direct tourists to the downtown business area and to Comanche Spring.

The Ozona Stockman—Delivery of 550,000 pounds of 12 months wool, representing clips from between thirty and forty Crockett county growers was made during the past week from the local house of the Ozona Wool and Mohair Co. The price ranged from 19 to 19½ cents.

Fort Davis Dispatch—An election was held Saturday in Fort Davis to vote for a law against something that, so far as the records show, does not exist. Thirty-one votes were cast. Twenty-one were for and ten against the proposal to make it unlawful for hogs to run at large.

Thus, at a cost of approximately \$1.40 per person, 21 voters outvoted 10 and from now on the prigrination range of Jeff Davis county hogs will be limited. That is, if there are any hogs in the county. The tax collector's records show that several years ago a widely known ranchman listed for taxation one hog. That was a good while ago, however, and that hog probably has been in hog heaven long enough to have his last citizenship papers. And it being unlikely that any one would have hogs without listing them with the assessor, and none being so listed since that one lonesome pucker was put on record, the question that arises in some minds with queer quirks is: If hogs ain't, they can't run at large. And if they can't run at large, why assume that they can and vote that they can't—at \$1.40 a vote?

The Pecos Enterprise—The Public Works Administration granted approval and allocated funds this week for a \$100,000 sewer project for Pecos, assuring realization of years-old dreams for the greatly-needed improvement.

The government will grant \$45,000 of the necessary amount and lend the remaining \$55,000. Mayor B. A. Toliver said the city would start action soon toward calling a bond election for the city's share.

Val Verde County Herald—S. M. Boughton, 72-year-old retired Western Union operator who is visiting in Del Rio from Kalamazoo, Mich., has samples of wild corn in red, white or blue grains.

Boughton tells an interesting story of where the original corn came from and how his friend, E. F. O'Brien, planted it, propagated and crossed it to obtain the three distinct colors of grain.

During a Winter in Kalamazoo, Boughton related, a nearby lake had frozen around the edges and only a small area in the middle remained free of ice. A wild goose flew down and came to rest on the water. O'Brien shot the goose and found a full ear of wild corn in its craw. He planted the corn and it developed regular sized ears, the kernels of dull red and each grain wrapped in a shuck-like covering in addition to the regular outer shuck.

By crossing the "wild goose" corn, O'Brien developed red, blue or white kernels as he desired.

Boughton has samples of the various kinds of corn his friend developed and grows them as curiosities.

For the first time a producer has evinced the daring to bring to the screen a fairy tale in the spirit in which it was written and beloved. "Snow White" has been visualized magically in more than 7,000 feet of film.

Compared with "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," the "Silly Symphonies" produced by Disney are a little short of chapters of stories instead of the entire tales. And the producer now feels that the public will welcome a full-length feature from his studio.

"Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" is made in its entirety of drawings animated into living action, but the drawings are infinitely different from those of Disney's short length output. In the first place, with the exception of the seven funny little dwarfs, there is scant caricature in the picture. "Snow White" herself is a charming little lady with "skin white as snow, lips red as

a rose and hair black as ebony." And she has a charming singing voice with which to deliver four of the eight songs in the picture.

Further, unlike the funny "Mickey" and "Sillys," "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" has several emotional ingredients besides humor. These include high drama, pathos, excitement and suspense. And, of course, there is an abundance of comedy, particularly in the scenes devoted to the dwarfs.

And for the first time in any Disney feature, a character meets death in this Disney picture. For "Snow White's" wicked Queen is chased to her death by the seven dwarfs after she has persuaded the heroine to bite into the poisoned apple. But "Snow White" only lies in a stupor as a result, and her Prince Charming comes along and arouses her with a kiss.

"Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" was in the mind of Walt Disney for more than three years, and the actual work on the picture in Technicolor covered nearly all of that time. But through the experience and added facilities gained in making this feature the producer is certain that the next full-length picture he makes he will be able to cut this period in half.

"Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" comes to the Princess Theatre for 4 days—Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday.

Newspaper Ads Prove Effective in Large Scale Advertising Program

DALLAS, June 30—(Special)—The quickly-proved success of a newspaper advertising campaign by the state of Mississippi on its new north-south paved highway, says a report of the All-South Development Council, contains a valuable tip for Texas in its cultivation of the highly-remunerative tourist industry.

An expenditure of \$6,199 last December and January by the Mississippi Advertising commission, state-owned and state-operated, was returned 80-fold by increase in gasoline tax receipts alone, the commission reported. These receipts for the first quarter of 1938 were \$473,070 above those for the same period of 1937.

That the benefits were not confined to the actual state coffers alone is indicated in the fact that hotels along the new highway reported a 30 per cent increase in tourist registrations; restaurants had a 25 per cent gain in transient trade, and communities throughout the state noticed increased tourist traffic.

Texas, which "discovered" the profits of tourism in an impressive way in 1936 and 1937, when the Centennial and Pan-American expositions formed the basis for abundant advertising of the state, still has attractions worthy of as vigorous exploitation as those of any of the many states which are premanently in the tourist business, the report points out. The Lone Star state got a tempting picture of tourism profits when her 1936 retail gasoline tax receipts showed a \$4,000,000 jump, more than writing off the state's official \$3,000,000 investment in the Centennial.

In a state as larger and as varied as Texas, stimulation of tourist traffic could profitably be carried on within the state as well as by attracting outside visitors, the report noted. Undoubtedly there will be some carry-over of tourist interest in the state, by work-of-mouth advertising, but with competition among the states growing more intense each year for

this business, as well as for new industrial location, a program designed to publicize Texas' tourist lures is needed to keep this "new" money flowing into the State.

Records of development of such states as Florida, California and Colorado which have carried on long-continued tourist advertising campaigns show that, in addition to tourist revenues, the states have benefited from acquisitions of new permanent residents and new business establishments as a result of this merchandising their attractions.

That Mississippi is "sold" on the idea after its brief and modest—but profitable—trial is shown in the fact that the commission has upped its budget from \$6,199 to \$5,000 for this year.

One form of advertising which would be somewhat indirect but "automatic" in its effect on tourist interest in Texas would be successful consumption of the movement to raise a million dollars for purchase of some 800,000 acres in the Big Bend area for creation of a national park. For the incidental advertising value alone that would attend the creation of the proposed park, the movement deserves the support of all the people of the State, the report says. At a conservative estimate, Big Bend park would add easily a million dollars a year to Texas' tourist trade income.

July 4th Motorists Urged to Use Caution in Automobile Driving

Austin—It would be a glorious Fourth of July if no accidents occurred to mar the joy of celebrating our one-hundred and sixty-second anniversary of independence, declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. It is most unfortunate that a day of joy and celebration leaves in its wake one of sadness and sorrow in many homes.

It is not alone the wounds received from explosives that increase our death toll. Injuries from automobile accidents, splinters, nails, and other penetrating wounds in which dirt may be carried into the skin, heighten the hazard of tetanus, or lockjaw as the disease is commonly called.

Tetanus is fatal in a large proportion of cases. Fortunately we have tetanus antitoxin as a means of preventing the disease. Antitoxin must be administered promptly following the accident. Treatment after the disease develops is rarely successful. Preventive measures include: the avoidance of such wounds and proper medical treatment.

A few don'ts for the 4th of July celebration would not be amiss.

1. Don't look into firecrackers which have failed to explode.
2. Don't drive recklessly and at excess speeds.
3. Don't overdo in swimming, especially in water of unknown depth.
4. Last and most important: Don't fail to get prompt medical attention if a wound is suffered.

New Automobile Registrations Show Decrease from Last Yr.

AUSTIN, Texas, June 30—New automobile registrations in Texas during May declined only slightly from the preceding month but the drop from May last year was decidedly abrupt, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research has announced. Reports from fifteen representative Texas counties show a decline in registrations of 1 per cent from April and 34.9 per cent from May last year.

Registrations in these fifteen counties during the first five months of the year totalled 19,827 cars, a decline of 30.6 per cent from the corresponding period last year.

"Sales in all of the four price brackets shared in the decline, but the percentage drop was greatest in the lower-intermediate price group," the Bureau's statement said.
