San Antonio Parties Lease 8,766 Acres Pakenham Estate; 5 Locations

to Start Within Months According Representative

Covering some 8,766 acres in Terrell County, the lease was made by the administrator of the Pakenham estate, to Lou V. Shirley of San Antonio, Calif.

It is understood that a representative of the parties leasing the land has stated that the lease covers five locations and that drilling will be started in the next six months. It was also stated that the lease covers five locations made within six months of the previous well being drilled, or that all five wells would be drilled within six months.

The lease is located in Blocks 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 in the northern part of Terrell County. No reports have been made on the Bell well in the eastern part of the county, though it is understood that it is still under way.

Twenty-Four Ranchers Have Used Allotment; Others Contracting

Reports on one hundred four ranches under the 1938 Range Program were taken to College Station on July 7, by Ernest Williams, Terrell County Agent. Twenty-four ranchers have already used their entire allotment for 1938. Many other jobs are under way and many contracts for the near future. Work completed, measured, and approved to date comes to \$25,329.18. This figure covers concrete or rubble masonry dams, earthen tanks and reservoirs, terracing, wells and eradication of pear and lechuguilla.

According to data in the county agent's office, there are to be thirteen earthen tanks; eight terracing jobs, thirteen wells; 17.85 acres of pear and 10,560 acres of lechuguilla to be eradicated; and the development of five natural watering places; all to be completed in the future. A rough estimate of work to be constructed under the 1938 Range Program will come to around \$85,000.00.

County Records Are Audited; Show Decrease In Tax Collections

County Auditor, Whitfield Oglesby was in Sanderson last week auditing the records and books of the County of Terrell. In his report to the Commissioner's Court Mr. Oglesby stated that all books were in excellent condition and showed Terrell County to be in good financial standing and on a sound basis.

Mr. Oglesby stated that during the period of this audit records showed a collection of taxes amounting to \$64,027.33 as compared to \$64,540.60 for the same period last year. This is a decrease of \$513.60. Cash on deposit as of June 30 this year was \$22,864.36, as compared to \$22,816.53 last year, showing an increase of \$47.83.

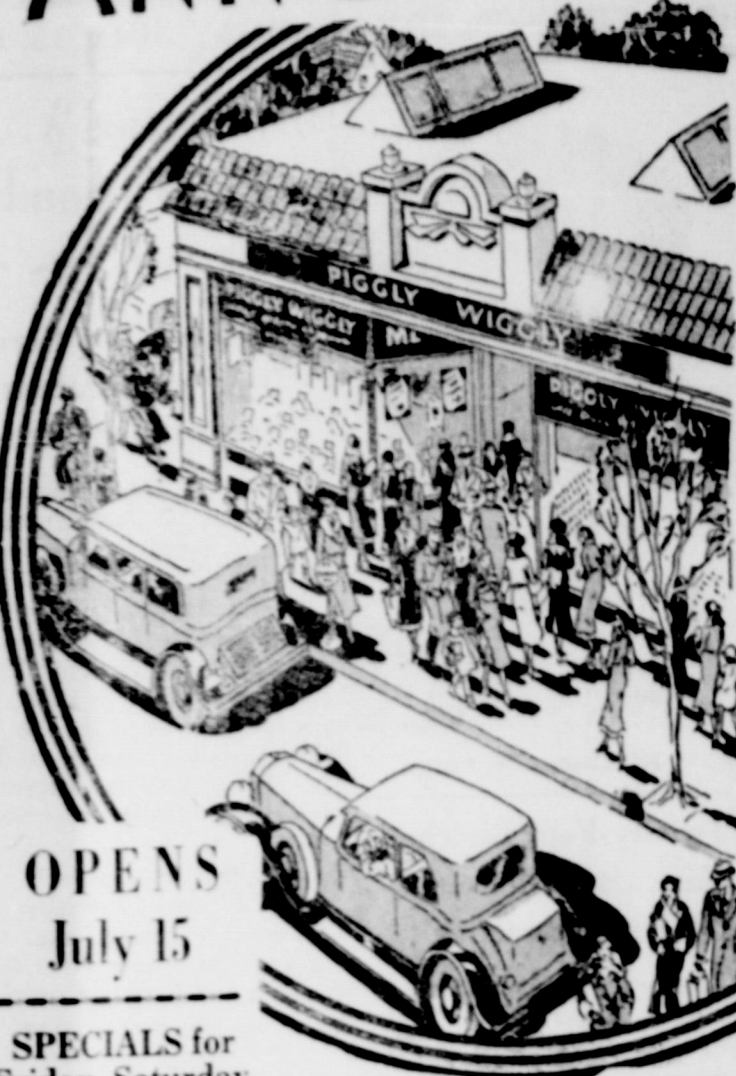
