Real Park Planned On Highway 90

Junction With 67 to
Be Improved by
Structures, Plants

Blueprint plans are complete
for what will be the most preten-
tious roadside park so far on West
Texas highways, which is to be
constructed eight miles east of
Alpine at the junction of state
highways U. S. 67 and U. S. 90.
Bids will be opened September 7
for the construction of the park.
The estimated cost is \$12,000.

The park will be constructed in
the "Y" at the junction. The plans
call for grading and planting, with
one thousand feet of attractive ap-
proach on both sides of 90, each
way from the "Y", and three hun-
dred feet on 67 from the "Y."

Rudolph Riefkogel, roadside de-
veloper or landscape planner for
the state highway department in
this division, was in Fort Davis
a few days ago in consultation
with Laurence E. Wood, resident
engineer in this section of the de-
partment, regarding the develop-
ment.

It was stated that the plantings
in the triangular area would con-
sist of huasaca, a smaller type of
tree; senisa, bird of paradise shrub,
the brittle willow, acotillo, Spanish
dagger, and the scarlet trumpet
vine. Appropriately set among
these, and near the historical
marker already on the site, will be
two cedar arbors, with tables and
seats and a fireplace. The arbors
will have pole roofs and will af-
ford ample shade and shelter for
the traveling public. Much of the
work, it is anticipated, will be
done this autumn and winter.—
Alpine Avalanche.

Gulf of Mexico Might Be Circled By 4,000 Mile Highway

A highway 4,000 miles in length,
encircling the Gulf of Mexico is
pictured by E. W. James of the
Bureau of Public Roads as a dream
of today that may be a reality to-
morrow. The opening of the Ove-
rseas Highway from the Flori-
da mainland to Key West leaves
only a few links to complete such
a highway.

From Key West to Havana, a
distance of 100 miles, the tourist
would go by ferry. Thence he
would traverse about one-fifth the
length of Cuba to again ferry a
distance of 180 miles to the Yuca-
tan Peninsula in Mexico. Through
roads do not exist in Yucatan but
there are no serious obstacles to
road construction. A road through
Yucatan connecting with the im-
proved Mexican highway system
near Vera Cruz would close the
only big gap in the route encir-
cling the Gulf. About 600 miles
of new road would have to be built.
From Vera Cruz there already are
modern roads to Mexico City and
the United States, and along the
Gulf coast to where the route be-
gins.

Ten Commandments for Safer Driving Are Guide to Your Skill, Say State Police

Austin, Aug. 17.—State police
traffic experts have devised a
questionnaire from which drivers
may determine their individual
qualifications for operating vehi-
cles in a safe manner.

Ten questions relating to basic
causes for most accidents on streets
and highways were listed by traf-
fic research officers so that driv-
ers may correct their errors. Each
question counts 10 points if an-
swered in the affirmative, with 10
points discount for negative an-
swers. If your grade is between
90 and 100 you may consider your-
self an excellent driver. A grade
between 80-90 classes you as a
"fairly good" driver, but if your
grade is below 80 you are a men-
ace to traffic safety and should
correct your faults, state police
warned.

The questions are:
1. Do you use proper arm signals
when turning or stopping?

REPORT MADE BY TERRELL COUNTY BRAND INSPECTOR

Buster Edwards, Terrell County
Brand Inspector for the Terrell
