Range Program Allotment \$57,474.59 For Terrell County

According to data in the County Agent's office, work under the 1938 Range Program totals \$57,474.59. This total represents the allotment on fifty-eight ranches. To date there has been \$13,000 more work completed than there was in 1937. Ranches in Terrell County have been improved by adding 43 tanks and 15 wells. Terraces, ridges, and spreader dams have been constructed on ten ranches. Ten thousand sixty-one acres of pear and lechuguilla have been eradicated.

There is an allotment of \$44,000 to Terrell County which will have to be used in the next three and one-half months or it reverts to the U. S. Treasury.

They were reported to have driven into the service station between 9:30 and 10 o'clock and ordered their car serviced with gasoline and oil. After this was done one of the men drew a gun and refused to pay for the gasoline and oil and drove away. When ordered to stop by Sheriff Nance and Deputy Anderson they complied without argument although they were armed with pistols. They were brought on to Sanderson and lodged in jail where they remained until Sheriff A. E. Steinmetz of Del Rio arrived to take them to Del Rio.

Horses Should Be Vaccinated for Sleeping Sickness

Inquiries of Dr. S. E. Bunton, veterinarian with the Livestock Sanitary Commission in Del Rio on what might be done by Terrell County ranchers for prevention of "sleeping sickness" in horses, brought the following suggestions, according to Ernest Williams.

"There is very little that can be done in preventing the disease except for vaccination," stated Dr. Bunton.

"I would suggest that ranchers be very careful about bringing horses into the county. When they do I would suggest their isolating them for about thirty days. If a case is found, isolate him at once, vaccinate the rest and notify me at once.

The vaccination that is now used for immunization is a Chick Vaccine which is quite an improvement over the old Bran Tissue Vaccination and costs about three dollars per head.

"In treatment of the cases, the Encephalomyelitis serum alone in doses of 100 c.c.'s is used. No other product is of any value whatsoever. Large amounts of water and a mild laxative is good for the animal."

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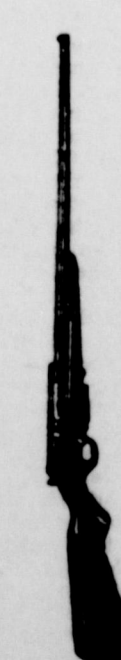
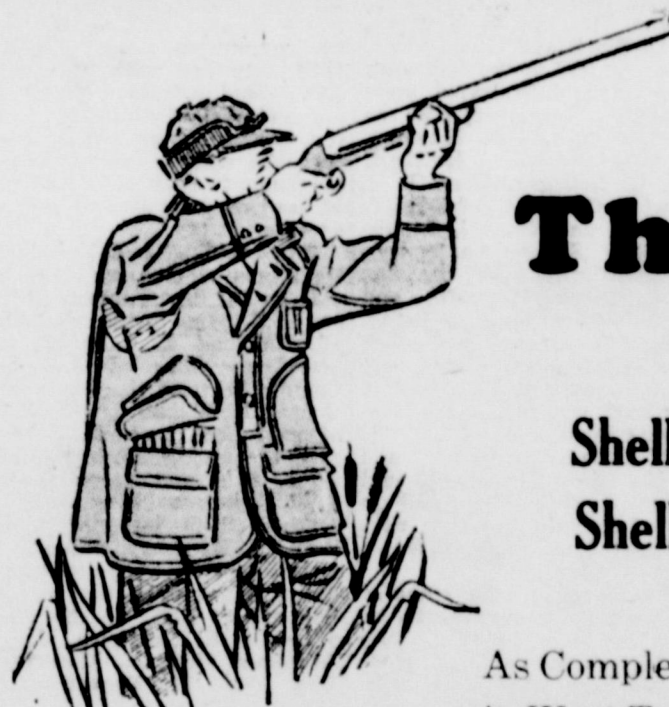
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
