Highland Fair Scheduled for October 6-7-8

To Feature Sale Registered Cattle for First Time

Marfa—The 11th annual High-
land Fair to be held in Marfa Oct-
ober 6-7-8 will feature for the first
time in its history a registered
cattle sale. This sale has at-
tracted a number of registered
cattle breeders in the Southwest
and a choice lot of registered
bulls and cows will be offered for
sale October 6.

The Highland Feeder sale,
most famous Herford feeder sale
in the world, will start promptly
at 12:30 October 7. Feeders from
California, Virginia and twenty-
four states in between have sig-
nified their intention of attend-
ing the sale.

In addition to the cattle sales
the fair will feature a \$2,000
prize money rodeo which prom-
ises to be the best ever held at a
Highland Fair and one of the
best to be held in the Southwest
this year.

A dance will be held every
night starting Wednesday and
will continue through Saturday.
Sui Ross will battle John
Tarleton in a football game at
Martin Field Saturday after-
noon.

The usual exhibits from farm
and ranch will be shown. Special
exhibits from the army post at
Marfa and a number of indus-
trial displays will be shown.

One feature of this fair is
that it will have no carnival.
Special fight cards have been
arranged for Thursday and
Friday of the fair.

Joseph Wolff Dies Suddenly Mon. Evening

A stroke Monday afternoon
took the life of Joseph Wolff, 72,
pioneer resident of the Pecos
region and of Sanderson.

Joseph Wolff was married to
Miss Mary Jane Burdwell Janu-
ary 10, 1893, at DeHans, Texas.
They moved to this section of the
country in 1897, and to Sanderson
in 1905, where they have
made their home since that time.
They moved into town so as to
be able to send their children to
the public schools.

A big celebration has been
planned in Marfa for this occa-
sion at which visitors along the
route from El Paso to Houston
will attend.

The \$10,000 fund of the new
highway has been assured to ad-
vertise the new all paved route
which follows the border and the
gulf and which is the southern
most route from coast to coast.
Bill boards and folder advertising
is being contracted for at once
and the campaign will open im-
mediately.

The new Border Highway is the
most direct route from either
east or west to the new Big Bend
State Park which will soon be a
National Park. It is thought it
is also the most direct route to
join the Mexico City highway. It
is the closest route from the east
coast to Southern California and
also to the Gulf fishing and bath-
ing facilities.

The highway which will be
open about the middle of October
is being used most of the 75 miles
of the strip which separates
Marfa and Van Horn now, with
only some 25 miles still under
construction. Even the portion
under construction is passable
except during rain since the de-
tours are bad.

U. S. Highway 90 is a full 34
foot highway which is of newer
type paving on the new strip now
being paved. It is a straight-
away and is said by highway of-
ficials to be one of the safest
roads constructed by the depart-
ment.

The Border Highway goes
through picturesque country in-
cluding the famous sheep, goat
and cattle raising sections. The
sites of old Spanish forts, of
Indian raids and of early day
settlements will continue to in-
tertrige the tourists from other
states as they drive along this
new road. Scenery unexcelled is
promised for many miles of the
route with markers leading to
places of interest just off the
highway.

Cities and towns alike are
making every effort to offer
better accommodations to the
tourists who drive the new route
which runs through the great
open spaces and which leads
through the heart of the real
"Old West".

SANDERSON EAGLES DOWN McCAMEY B TEAM SATURDAY

The 1938 Sanderson Eagles de-
feated McCamey B team at
Sanderson Saturday 17th, 14-0.

The first touchdown came in
the first play when the Eagles
took the ball from the McCamey
team on a fumble after the kick
off. Lochausen on a play thru
center ran 30 yards for a touch-
down standing up. Lochausen
made the extra point on the
same play.

The second kick-off, Lochau-
sen kicking, McCamey received
but lost the ball on downs. On
the first play for Sanderson,
Glenn passed to Litton for a 35
yard gain and a touchdown.
Glenn made the extra point on
a line plunge.

Two touchdowns were called
back by the officials because of
the backfield being in motion
and off side. These two mark-
ers were made from passing by
Glenn to Litton and Lito Fierro.

Sanderson tried 16 passes com-
pleting 4 for an average of 120
yards and had one pass inter-
cepted. They made 10 first
downs, and had 21 players suited
out. McCamey tried 7 passes,
completing 3 for an average of
22 yards and had one pass in-
tercepted. They made 1 first
down and had 25 boys suited
out.

The Eagles punted 4 times and
McCamey punted on the first
and second downs. Every San-
derson substitute played in this
game.

First Quarter
Sanderson kicked off to Mc-
Camey. McCamey fumbled on
the 35 yard line and the ball was
recovered for Sanderson by Ken-
neth Litton. On the first play
Sanderson put over a touchdown
with Lochausen carrying the
ball through center for a 35 yard
run. Lochausen made the ex-
tra point on the same play as
before Sanderson kicked off the
second time to McCamey, who
ran two plays, being stopped on
one for an eight yard loss by Bas-
sett. On the third down Mc-
Camey kicked. Lito Fierro re-
turning the ball to the place
from where it was kicked. A
pass from Glenn to Litton on
the first down resulted in the
second touchdown for Sanderson.
Glenn went through the
center of the line for the ex-
tra point.

Sanderson kicked off the third
time to McCamey and McCamey
tried one running play to the
left but was stopped by Hicks
Canon for no gain. On the sec-
ond down they kicked. Dishman
ran the ball back and on the
next two plays the Eagles made
a first down. On the first down
McCamey intercepted a pass
meant for Litton. Lito Fierro and
Glenn made the tackle. Mc-
Camey then lost the ball on
downs.

Second Quarter
The Eagles made three run-
ning plays and Lochausen kicked
on the fourth for 40 yards. Mc-
Camey then kicked back on the
first down and Sanderson came
back to make two first downs.
The ball was on the McCamey
5-yard line at the end of the
quarter.

Third Quarter
McCamey kicked, Litton re-
turning the ball for 20 yards.
First down Glenn passed to Lito
for 35 yards and a touchdown
but was called back because of
off sides. A pass from Glenn to
Litton resulted in a gain of 35
yards and a fumble on the third
down gave McCamey the ball.
They kicked on the first down
and Dishman returned the ball
for fifteen yards. Lochausen was
forced to leave the game because
of a bad ankle with Len Haynes
taking his place. After 4 downs,
all passes, the ball went to Mc-
Camey on their own ten yard
line.

Fourth Quarter
McCamey kicked on the sec-
ond down with Dishman return-
ing the ball 12 yards. A pass
from Glenn to Litton netted 30
yards for a touchdown but was
called back because of Sanderson
being off side. A pass from
Glenn to Lito gained 30 yards
after which Sanderson lost the

PWA Grant Sought by School Board

\$20,000 Asked to Supplement Bonds Voted Recently

The trustees of the Terrell
County Common School District
No. 1, in a called meeting on
Tuesday afternoon, September
21, made the first steps in an
application for a Public Works
Administration grant for the
purpose of improving the school
buildings of Sanderson. W. H.

Savage and R. N. Allen, members
of the school board met with
C. V. Head, representative of the
Hedrick Architectural and Engi-
neering firm of Fort Worth and
decided upon plans for construct-
ing a building to be used as an
elementary school for the Mex-
ican scholastics, the erection and
equipping of shower rooms for the
school gymnasium, the renova-
tion of the present American and
Mexican school elementary
buildings and additional im-
provements.

The application is to be filed
with Geo. M. Bull, Regional
Director of Public Works Admin-
istration, Fort Worth, Texas.
The application calls for a grant
of some \$20,000 which is to be a
supplement to the bond issue of
\$25,000 recently voted by the tax
payers of Terrell County. This is
an outright grant and carries no
obligation to repay.

The Hedrick Company, em-
ployed as architects for the
proposed school improvements,
have under construction a
dormitory on the campus of Sul-
Ross College and have construct-
ed such buildings as the South-
ern Pacific Passenger Station in
Houston, Post Offices at Pecos
and Midland, thirteen buildings
in Lubbock principally for Texas
Tech, and numerous school
buildings over the state.

**Dies While
Driving Auto
on Highway
Car Is Found at
Comstock Saturday**

Henry Bridge, 57, city police-
man since April, 1938, and chief
of police from 1928 to 1933, was
found dead of a heart attack
Saturday morning about two
and a half miles west of Com-
stock near the Pandale road
intersection on Highway 90.
Bridge, who had been to Langtry,
was enroute to Del Rio. His car
was driven off the road near a
fence and the lights were still
burning when it was found.

Mrs. Bridge and her daughter-
in-law, Mrs. Joe R. Bridge, be-
came alarmed when he failed to
return to Del Rio Saturday
morning and drove out on the
highway looking for him, leaving
Del Rio about 10 o'clock. They
discovered the car shortly before
noon and Mrs. Bridge notified
authorities.

At first she believed the car
was wrecked because the radius
rod was bent but examination
showed that it had been driven
off the highway without mishap.
Sheriff A. E. Steinmetz, Chief of
Police Cole Y. Blackwell and
Justice of the Peace J. P. Ader-
hold left Del Rio about 12:15
o'clock Saturday afternoon for
the scene of the tragedy. The
coroner's inquest returned a
verdict of death from a heart
attack.

Survivors include his widow,
Mrs. Liza Bridge; his mother,
Mrs. Lena Bridge of Sonora; a son,
Joe R. Bridge of Del Rio, three
sisters and a brother. The brother
is Texas Ranger Joe H. Bridge
of Hebronville; the sisters in-

of Sanderson, Mrs. Marion M.
Stokes of Sonora and Mrs. Sam
Green.
