Besides the loss to Mr. Beckett the owners estimated the loss of the home at about \$3,000. Mr. Beckett has the old Ross Roberts ranch leased, which was where the fire occurred.

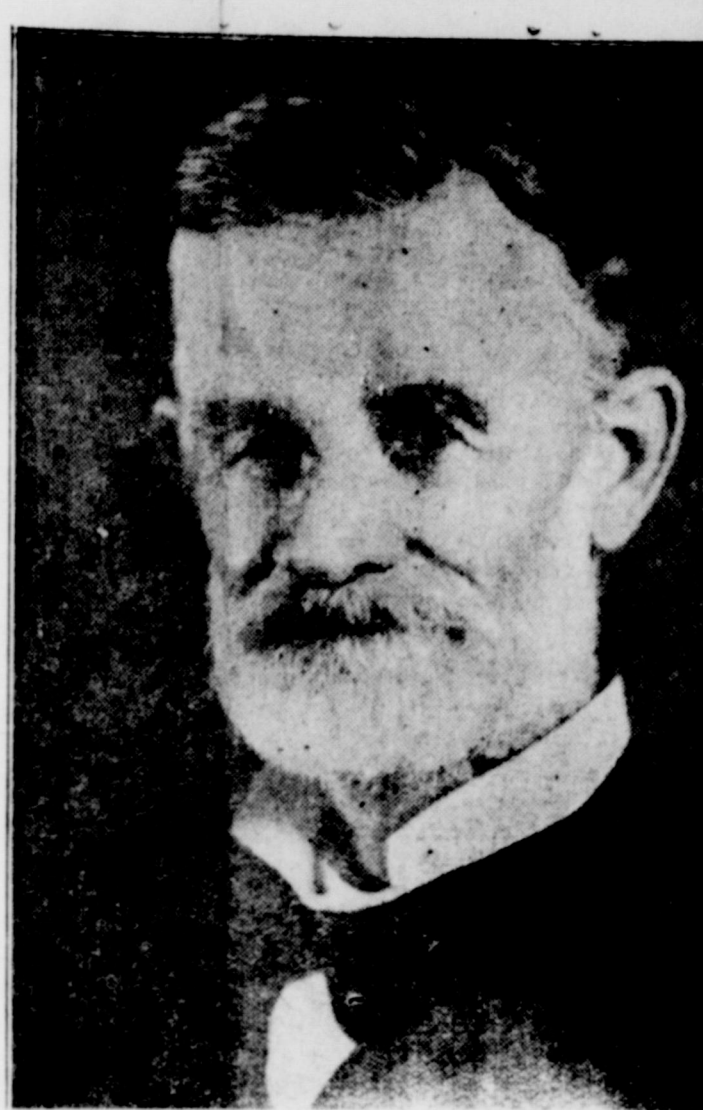
Allen Hardgrave Is Named to Fill Place on Wildcat Band

Mexican Found Dead On Sam Bell Ranch Fri.

Manuel Cruz, 50-year-old Mexican was found dead lying in the front door of the Sam Bell ranch headquarters Friday evening of last week. A .38 calibre pistol was lying near the man's right hand with one shell fired. Indications were that the dead man had inflicted the wound, placing the pistol in the mouth. The bullet ranged up and out of the top of the skull.

Gun with Fired Shell Is Found Nearby; Wound in Head

A negro boy, Arthur Goodloe, 10095 25th Street, Sanderson, was 300 yards from the house heard a shot in that direction at about 6:30 in the afternoon but did not investigate. I. O. Miller arrived at the well about 30 minutes afterward and was told of the shot by the negro boy shortly after which Sam Bell arrived and was told of the incident. Mr. Bell immediately investigated and found the body of the dead man. Proper authorities were notified and an inquest held. A verdict of suicide was returned.

WITH OUR NEIGHBORS

Pecos Enterprise—Pecos property owners straggled to the polls 208 strong Saturday and cast majorities for the issuance of three city bond issues.

Approved by the voters were two issues of \$60,000 and \$25,000 for the city's share in a sewer system and disposal plant; \$35,000 for a municipal auditorium and \$5,000 for street repairs and improvements.

Big Bend Sentinel—Voters in the Marfa Independent school district voted Tuesday 168-15 to issue \$50,000 worth of bonds to

go with a \$40,000 PWA grant for a \$90,000 school building program. Voting was light in all boxes.

McCamey News—McCamey's new "lift-the-receiver" telephone system will be housed in a new building on Burleson Ave. half a block south of the Grand Theatre. H. F. Fox, district manager of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. announced this week. The building will be erected by H. B. Robb, and work probably will start next Monday.

Ozona Stockman—A group of Crockett county ranchers are going to put to the actual test the latest theory for control of the bitterweed problem—that of sowing range lands with Italian or rye, more commonly known as winter grass.

More than 22,000 pounds of seeds of wild rye have been ordered through County Agent C. J. Van Zant by five Crockett county ranch operators for experimentation this winter.

Monahans News—Jerry Sadler, Railroad Commissioner-elect, will be principle speaker at the Ward County Pecos Valley Fair to be held in Monahans Oct. 14 and 15. Mr. Sadler accepted the invitation by letter upon his return from Beaumont where he attended the State Democratic Convention.

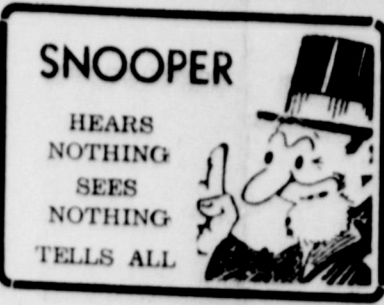
Plans were made for district and regional meets where contest will be held. Those who offered to hold the meet were El Paso, Monahans, Odessa, and Pecos.

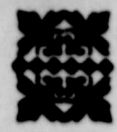
