### FATHER MRS. P. C. COATES DIES WED.

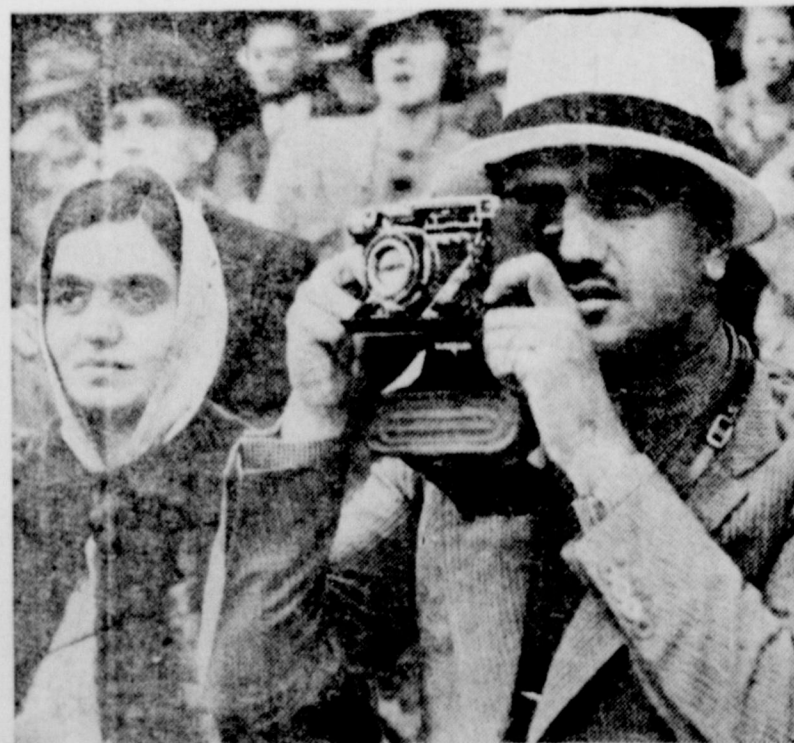
Tom Cox, Teague, father of Mrs. P. C. Coates of Sanderson died there Wednesday, according to word received here.

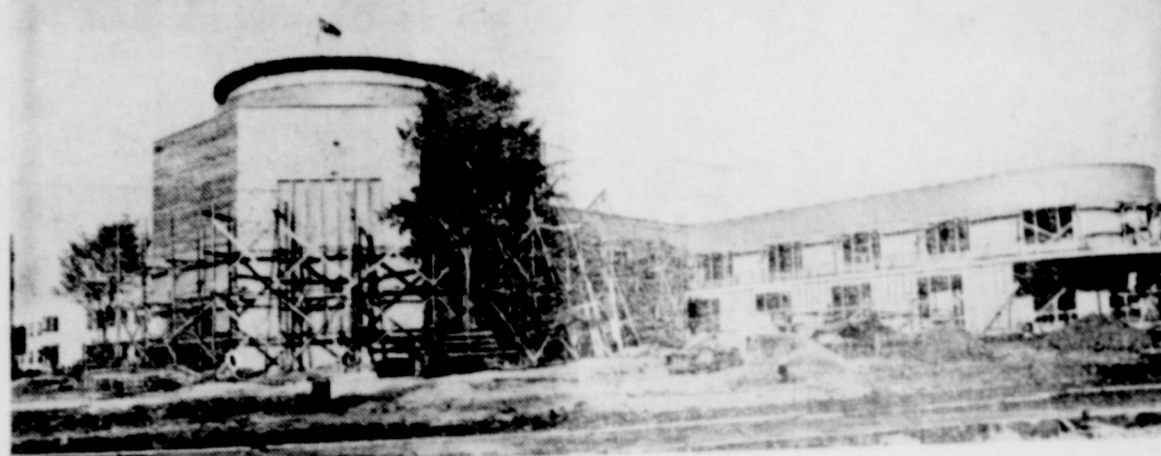
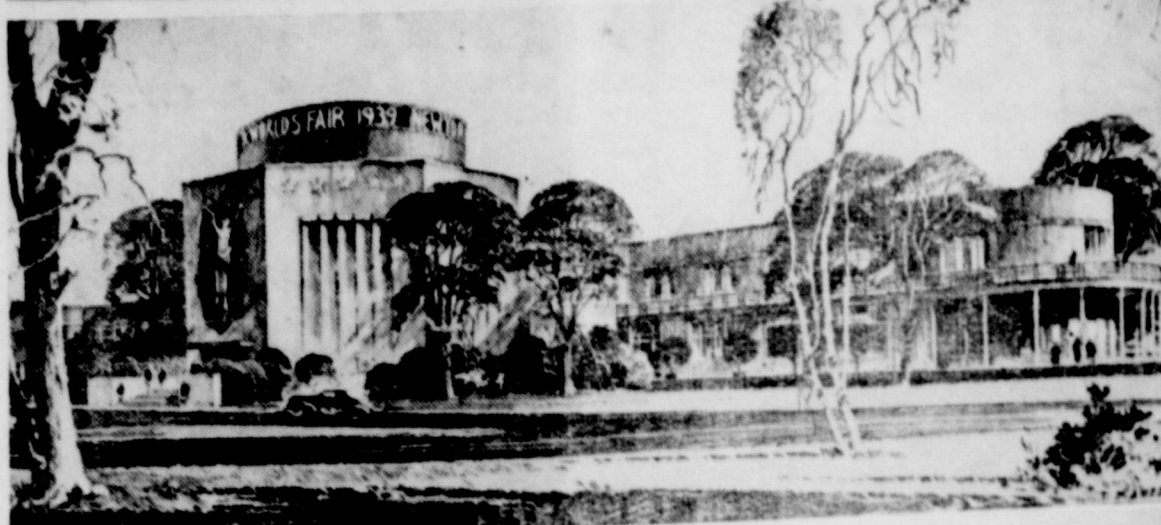

## NEW YORK FAIR 1939 IN CONSTRUCTION STAGE



**NEW YORK (Special)**—The \$900,000 Administration Building of the New York Fair is under roof some 22 months in advance of the exposition's opening date and in August will be ready for occupancy by the hundreds of specialist workers who conduct the business of the "industry" and advance development of the \$125,000,000 world event. The cornerstone of this first major Fair building was laid April 27 in the presence of many notable figures in national life.

The Administration building, shown as progressing in actuality and by an artist's sketch, is the Fair Corporation's workshop and showroom. While the 1216 1/2-acre site of the exposition is today the scene of much and varied activity, with several exhibit pavilions going up this year, the majority of the 300 buildings necessary to housing the exposition are scheduled for construction in 1938. By midsummer of next year, it is estimated, fully 15,000 persons will be employed in building activities where only a year ago there was nothing but waste land.
