## Grant Obtained for Mexican School Building; Other Improvements

### Approved for \$20,475 Without Deduction; \$25,000 Bonds Sold to Alleviate Concern With \$250 Bonus

The grant was received here Saturday for the approval of a PWA for \$20,475 which will supplement the \$25,000 bonds voted at the CAC last week for the construction of a new school building for the Latin-American children. In addition to the present gymnasium at Sanderson High School, the grant will purchase new equipment and remodeling of the grammar school building. The grant was accepted without deduction.

Renovations will also be made in the present grammar school building with the walls, floors, and stairways being refinished. It is also probable that there will be sidewalks added and some needed equipment.

The \$25,000 worth of bonds were sold last week to Rauscher-Pierce Co. of Dallas, and will draw interest at the rate of 3 1/2 per cent. The bonds were sold at par with a bonus of \$250.

Bids for construction will be received by the Terrell County School Board up to and including Thursday, December 29.

Terrell County residents feel that much of the credit for obtaining the grant goes to Senators Morris Sheppard and Tom Connally and to Congressman R. E. Thomason, and extend to them their thanks and gratitude for their untiring efforts. The work and the influence of these men was exerted both upon the Fort Worth office of the PWA and at Washington.

Local men who were instrumental in obtaining the grant are members of the school board: W. H. Savage, R. H. Murrah and R. N. Allen; A. E. Creigh Jr., Judge G. J. Henshaw, Joe Kerr, L. M. Baze, Clyde Griffith, and others.

## Sheep and Goat Raisers' Office Opened in Del Rio

G. W. Cunningham, secretary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, who opened the headquarters office of the organization in the Roswell Hotel here Monday, announced that since 1936 the membership in the association has risen from around 1,100 to a total of 7,270 during 1938.

Cunningham who moved the office from Fort Stockton where it has been located during the time J. T. Baker served as president, gave as the reason for the increase a change in the method of collecting membership dues.

"Dues in the association are now collected through wool and mohair warehouses over the state," he said. "Warehouse officials collect from all growers, deducting 10 cents on each bag of wool and mohair."

If there is any complaint on the part of the grower, his money is refunded by the association, he said. Last year less than 1 per cent of the dues collected in this manner were refunded.

When the office was moved to Del Rio at the beginning of 1936, membership in the association totaled around 400. Cunningham said, rising to 1,100 at the close of the year. Since then it has increased to more than 7,000.

A complete program for the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association will be worked out within the next few days by Cunningham and C. B. (Dutch) Wardlaw, newly elected president of the organization.

Cunningham arrived in Del Rio from Fort Stockton last Friday, accompanied by Mrs. Cunningham and daughter, Jan. —Del Rio Evening News.

## Sanderson Team Wins in Life Saving Contest Dec. 15

### Locals Take Win From Six Other Teams Entered

The local Highway Department team was winner of the life saving contest which was held Thursday of last week at Pecos with seven different teams entered.

Towns represented besides Sanderson were Fort Stockton, two teams, Monahans, Odessa, Pecos and Balmorhea. The life saving contests are sponsored this year by the Highway Department for the first time, and the courses taught the employees are approved by the Red Cross.

The local boys received their instructions from Hauk Stephenson of Fort Stockton and there will be other courses to follow. When instructions on the first courses were completed, each member of the department had to take an examination given by the Red Cross and there were no failures among the Sanderson boys.

Those who compose the team which won the laurels at Pecos are: B. R. Farley, captain, Griffin Lattimore, Dick Sullivan, R. V. Winn, Nelson Billings, and Jesse McDonald, alternate. Their score was 378 points out of a possible 400.

As soon as other districts have played off their contests the winners from one district will be matched with winners of other districts, and so on until the winning team stands at the top without competition. The locals will probably go to El Paso about January 15 where they will compete with winning teams of other districts.

It is understood that more than 9,000 employees have received instruction in life saving and it is expected that approximately 1,000 men will participate in the contests before the state winner is chosen. The courses are being taught in the state by 140 lay instructors.

Scores of other teams entered in the competition last week were: Pecos 374; Balmorhea, 335; Fort Stockton 361 and 363; Monahans, 374, and Odessa, 348.

### Equalization of Freight Rates Sought By WTCC

#### Organize Federation to Carry On Work to Cover Nation

Abilene—The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has launched a nationwide movement for equalization of freight rates.

Directors of the regional organization at a district meeting in Amrillo Monday voted to form the National Freight Rate Equality Federation. Local Chambers of Commerce, producers and consumers groups, women's clubs and other organizations are being invited to join in the campaign to remove unequal freight rate zones.

Each cooperating group will name three delegates to attend a meeting which will be called at an early date to perfect the organization. The West Texas Chamber of Commerce is serving as the initiating body and will act as a clearing house for the work until permanent organization of the federation, the first thing of its kind in the nation is completed.

"The problem of freight rate discriminations in various degrees affects 85 per cent of the territory of the United States, but West Texas, when judged by population and production, stands at the very peak of the discriminations." D. A. Bandoen, WTCC manager states.

The campaign broadening the freight rate equality movement to other states and territories affected will be started immediately. H. S. Hilburn, Plainview, WTCC President said. Other District WTCC meetings also probably will be held soon, he added.

A legislative mandate to the Interstate Commerce Commission requiring equality of rates as between zones is recommended as the remedy to the situation by the WTCC traffic board in its recently issued freight rate report. This course has been endorsed by scores of newspapers throughout the state and by the newly formed federation.

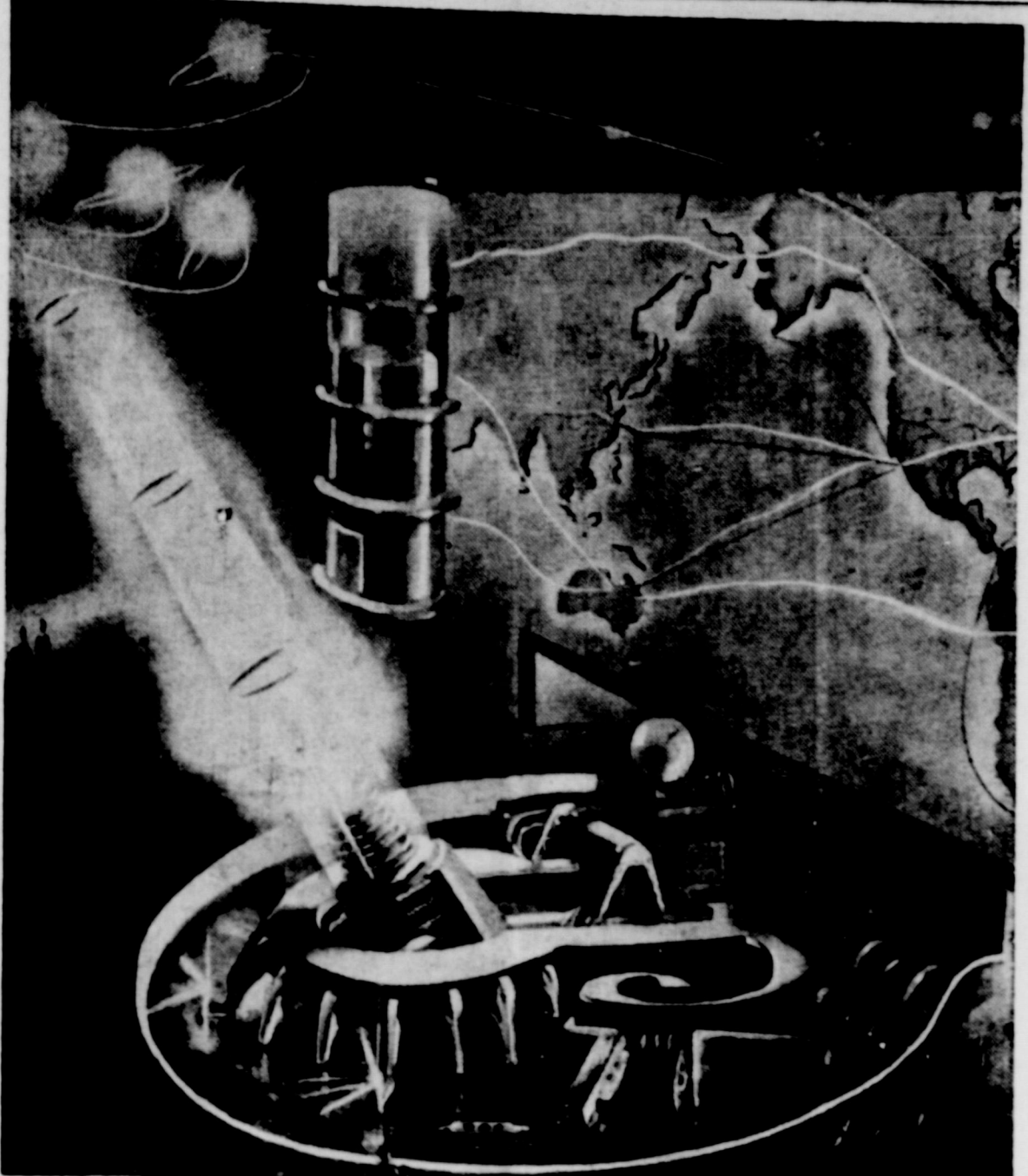

### The Rocketship Soars—At New York World's Fair



**NEW YORK — (Special)**—The dream of the mechanical age and perhaps the commonplace event of the World of Tomorrow—a trip to Mars in a rocketship—will be produced in tangible form in steel and glass when a model working rocketport is placed into operation at the New York World's Fair 1939.  
 Now being constructed by Raymond Loewy, industrial designer, the operating planet-line will be part of a free, focal exhibit in the transportation section of the Fair.  
 More than a thousand visitors will be able to see the show at one time. After an interesting, activated display of transportation from the day of the cave man to the present, illumination in the auditorium will be shifted to spotlight the rocketport.  
 Airplanes, liners, railroad trains and taxicabs of futuristic design will bring passengers and twinkling elevators will begin loading the rocketship's cargo. When the time comes for departure, sirens will sound, machinery will hum, a giant crane will lift the rocketship and place it in the breach of the gun and a brilliant flash and an explosion will indicate that the world-folk are off on a visit to another planet.  
 By means of an ingenious invention resembling the shutter of a camera, placed in the sky-ceiling, the audience will seem to see the rocketship vanish into the vast reaches of space.

### Girls Suffer From Tooth Decay More Than Boys Says Doctor

Chicago—A discovery in dental hygiene revealing that girls between the ages of 6 and 15 are more susceptible to tooth decay than boys of the same age is reported in the December issue of the Journal of the American Dental Association by Drs. John W. Knutson, Henry Klein and Carroll E. Palmer of Washington, D. C.  
 The triumvirate of dentists arrived at that conclusion after studying reports on a survey of the teeth of approximately 5,000 school children in an eastern city.  
 Their study shows, too, that the first molars, the most important teeth in the mouth, are less resistant to decay than other members of the dental arch.  
 The Knutson-Klein-Palmer report substantiates the known dental fact that some people are more susceptible to decay than others, and it points out also that while the first succumb most quickly to decay, the lower front teeth are most resistant to the ravages of tooth-destroying mouth acids.  
 Declaring that dental caries (decay) is cumulative, the Knutson-Klein-Palmer paper states that the number of teeth infected increases between the ages of 6 and 15. It makes note of the apparent fact that "Age 15 represents that age when the number of carious teeth in each jaw is about equal. Up to the age of 15 more teeth of the lower jaw are carious than upper jaw teeth, and it is postulated that after the age of 15 more upper teeth are carious than lower."

### Nature's Mysteries Lend Interest to Big Bend Park

A new and fascinating mystery of nature has been brought to light by scientists who have studied the flora in the area of the proposed Big Bend National park of Texas.  
 Trees and shrubs are growing in abundance there which are to be found nowhere else for thousands of miles.  
 There is the weeping juniper, for example, a species of the so-called American cedar. It is a beautiful evergreen tree, growing to about 20 feet high, with long, drooping branches on the order of the weeping willow.  
 According to scientists, this variety is native to Brazil, and is found in the United States only in the Chisos Mountains in the heart of the proposed park area.  
 How it got there is a mystery on which naturalists like to speculate, but which they never expect to solve.  
 Complicating the puzzle, but adding to the charm of the area, is the fact that beside the weeping juniper may be seen the stately Douglas fir, a native of the Canadian Rockies, and a species of the oak which is found no nearer than Virginia.  
 Enough of trees and shrubs in the area are of the evergreen variety that the park, even in the dead of winter, will be colorful, and the prevailing weather in Southwest Texas will permit it to remain open the entire year. Practically all other national parks are operated only during the summer.  
 Spanish dagger grows in abundance in the area, as well as innumerable varieties of grasses. Bluebonnets abound in the Spring.

### Don't Let A Cold Catch You Advises Health Physician

Austin—Prefacing some reasonable advice on common sense ways of avoiding colds, with the remark that it is a mistake to say you "catch" a cold, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, added "As a matter of fact the cold catches you when you are not up to the mark physically. Therefore:

1—Keep yourself as physically fit as possible. Eat nourishing food. Have your meals at regular times. Avoid rich, indigestible combinations. Include plenty of milk, other dairy products and fruit in your diet. Remember to drink plenty of water—several glasses during the day, every day.

2—Dress according to the weather. Add a sweater to your outfit, or a heavy coat when the days turn cold. Avoid sudden chilling. Don't expose yourself unnecessarily to draughts. Don't sit around in wet clothing. If you are caught in a drenching down-pour, change to dry clothing as soon as possible.

3—Take some outdoor exercise every day. Be out in the sunlight as much as possible. If you have a job that keeps you indoors most of the day, you will find it pays to spend a few minutes two or three times a day, at an open window, flushing your breathing apparatus with fresh air.

4—Get plenty of sleep. Strike a balance between work and play. Don't fool yourself into thinking you can play around at all hours of the day or night, day after day; snatch a few hours sleep, and be entirely fit, physically, and ready for your profession, your job, or for school or household duties, when morning comes.

5—Colds are spread by the discharges from the nose and throat. Every time the victim of a cold has a coughing spell, germ-laden droplets of mucus are brought to the surface and spread around. Every sneeze throws germ-laden spray into the air. Avoid these hazards. Don't mingle unnecessarily with persons who have colds.

6—The careless cougher or sneezer sprays his germs all around the place and leaves them on everything he touches. Don't use a common drinking cup. Have your own towel and wash cloth. Always wash your hands before eating.

7—If you happen to be overtaken by a cold, show as much consideration for your neighbor as you would like him to show to you. Don't be a transmitter. Don't broadcast your germs. Sneeze or cough into your handkerchief. Use paper handkerchiefs that can be burned or otherwise disposed of. The quickest way to get rid of a cold is to go to bed; eat very lightly and drink plenty of water. At the first indication of fever send for your doctor, and then follow his advice.

### Jackie Merkel to Appear at Princess Theatre

The most unique thing about Jackie is that there doesn't have to be a third person to ask him the questions. You ask him what you want to ask and he answers. He has appeared in New York City, in the theatre and in the home of Mrs. William Randolph Hearst. He has appeared in theatres in Milwaukee, Wis., in Miami Beach, Florida, and at the Kansas City Automobile Show for the past few years. Jackie has rated a full page in the St. Louis Dispatch, featured in the New York Journal, in the New Yorker, and has been interviewed by professors of many colleges, among whom were those at Northwestern University, Professor Simmons at Fordham University, and is endorsed by many including governors, senators and other prominent people.

### Close Contact With Children Warned Against

"Children Not Admitted"

Regulations forbidding young and teen-age children to enter the wards of tuberculosis sanatoria bring in their wake many a heartbreak. A story of one incident is made public today by the Christmas Seal committee to illustrate tuberculosis tragedies that the Seal financed program is trying to prevent.

Outside the sanatorium building, the eyes of a six-year old child were glued on the many windows.

"Which window, daddy?" he asked breathlessly.

"There, there! See, son," said the father pointing up to the second floor. "Wave to Mother."

The mother, whose bed had been pushed close to the window by the nurse, waved back, as she scanned the face of the child. Well she knew the difficulty the father was having in trying to explain why the child couldn't go inside and see his mother. Eager as she was to hold the child, the mother was glad to conform to the sanatorium rules against children visiting in the rooms. She would make any sacrifice in order to protect her child from the threat of tuberculosis.

"Tuberculosis deprives more children of their mothers and fathers than any other disease." It kills 70,000 people annually, most of them young people, but this does not tell the whole story. The tragic thing is what it does to individuals and to families.

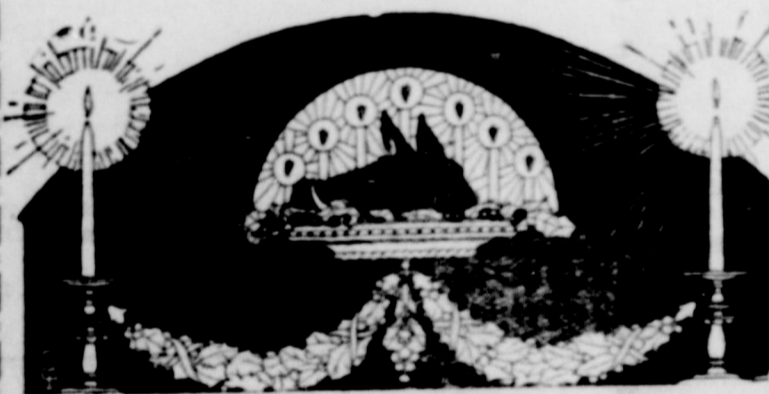
