Alpine Avalanche—A float designed to publicize the proposed Big Bend International park, will be in the huge parade to be staged at the National American Legion Convention in Chicago next Monday.

Funds for financing the float were raised through the American Legion of the 16th Texas district, every town in the district through the Legion post or some local civic organization. It was stated here this week. The \$500 asked for the fund was over-subscribed.

Fort Stockton Pioneer—Proposals are solicited by the United States Postoffice for a five-year period beginning June 10, 1940, in notices executed Sept. 10 by A. S. Page, postal inspector with headquarters in Fort Worth.

Ozona Stockman—Fifteen men with their families, moved into Ozona during the first of the week to make their home while employed in the drilling of the Ordovician test on the J. S. Todd ranch 15 miles west of Ozona.

Uvalde Leader News—The 1939 hunting season claimed its first victim in this section of the state Monday noon when Kingston Pickford, about 60 years of age, met instant death when a shotgun was accidentally discharged. Pickford was secretary of the Sabinial Chamber of Commerce.

McCamey News—With the site already selected for McCamey's new \$70,000 Federal building and post office, many are wondering when construction will start as the appropriation for the McCamey building has already been approved by Congress.

Hudspeth County News—The Big Four Mine 6 miles west of Sierra Blanca is taking out ore preparatory to making a car

shipment. A recent test shipment to the El Paso smelter ran better than \$30 a ton in lead and silver.

Big Bend Sentinel—Owner of many thousand acres of farm land in the Bloomington Ill. section, Harper Sibley, former president of the United States Chamber of Commerce, will be one of the many visitors in Marfa during Highland Fair Week.



Sportsmen in most region of Texas are taking advantage of a bumper crop of doves this season and early indications are that the Lone Star State's nimble birds who thrill at following a good dog are going to have better quail hunting than in a number of years.

Reports to the Executive Secretary of the Game Department from many sections bear out that statement. As an example, a warden whose headquarters are at Waco reported that he had counted 207 quail in the country roads of his district during a four day period. Practically all of them were grown except one bunch of sixteen. Each bird in that covey was about the size of an English sparrow. Farmers are reporting more quail than in years.

Albinos continue to show up in Texas. The latest is a snow-white skunk which has been seen by several persons in Crockett County, the State Game Warden for that region reports. Several persons have been within two yards of the animal and they believe it does not boast of a single black hair. As yet no one has been venturesome enough to catch the unusual little animal.

Dame nature has many ways of protecting her children but one of the most unique is reported by the Game Department chief aquatic biologist. The alligator snapping turtle gets part of its food through subterfuge. It sinks to the bottom of a stream or lake and while remaining perfectly quiet, extends its tongue, which has an appendage closely resembling both in size and color an earthworm. Fish swim along, spot the "worm" and seize it, being in turn grabbed by the turtle, which makes a meal of it.

The squirrel trapping project being carried on by the Game Department in Bastrop State Park near Bastrop is providing biologists of the game department some valuable information. They hope to determine, among many other things, how far squirrels travel, so that they may be able to decide whether it will be profitable to stock certain areas of the state which have become depleted of squirrels. No squirrel stocking projects will be considered until complete data on the habits of squirrels is amassed.

Squirrels, generally considered by hunters to be rather shrewd little animals, showed little fear of the traps in Bastrop State Park. They are not injured in trapping and are marked with small ear clips. One male is venturesome enough to have been caught ten times.

TEXAS OUT-O'-DOORS Despit the drouth which reduced the range, deer are going to be plentiful and in good shape when the hunting season rolls around November 16, early reports to the Executive Secretary of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission indicate. Deer are increasing annually in the Lone Star State. In fact, their numbers are so large in some sections that there would have been a shortage of food for them even had there been no drouth. This condition has existed over a period of several years and Game Department biologists, after considerable research, have reached the conclusion that the deficiency of

food has brought about smaller deer. Many persons had expressed the belief that inbreeding was the cause. Deer are afflicted with several diseases and are victims of ticks, but investigations being carried out by the Game Department biologists indicate that malnutrition is the cause of most of the deaths to Texas deer although it was believed by many that ticks were the direct cause of fatalities. All in all, and in spite of the drouth, deer appear to be in excellent condition this fall and are spreading into several counties in the state which had not raised them for many years. Out-of-state hunters who purchase on a \$2 resident hunting licenses during the last two years are the object of a quiet investigation started by the Texas Game Fish and Oyster Commission recently. The campaign to save Texas Game for Texans or force out-of-state sportsmen to pay in proportion for the game they get through the purchasing of a \$25 license as the law directs is beginning to bear fruit according to the executive secretary of the Game Department. "We have known this unfair practice has been going on several years," the executive secretary said, "but until we have been able to work out a fool-proof plan of execution.
