

IT'S OUR TOWN-LET'S PROTECT IT

(EDITORIAL)

People who go to make up the population of Sanderson and who are its citizens are proud of our town. They realize that it isn't so large-that we don't have a lot of things that other places have-but they like to live in our town and they like to see it grow and prosper.

If this were not true we would not see the new homes going up that have been built in the past year-the new business houses that have been added and the new school house and improvements. It takes progressive citizens to keep a town moving forward at all times and such a town will not suffer the awful slumps that are experienced by boom towns.

Sanderson is the county seat of Terrell County. is located in one of the principal ranching districts of the state. is a railroad terminal, and means a lot to citizens residing anywhere in the county and in the edges of nearby counties. If we thought there was some enemy across the border preparing to come over and destroy this town we would all be up in arms to protect it. We would fight that enemy with every weapon and means that we could devise.

Then why do we sit so calmly by and give so little thought to the only real enemy that Sanderson does havean enemy that could wipe out our entire business section, destroy our homes, maybe take the lives of our loved ones, in a very few minutes. An enemy that could destroy in a few hours all that has been built in the many years past. That enemy is FIRE. One that we are all afraid of, yet one that we seldom prepare for as carefully as we should.

Sanderson needs fire protection badly. She needs to bring her citizens to life so that they will realize the dangers of fire should one start in our town on a day when there is a strong wind to fan the flames from building to building. Her citizens should get together and work for adequate protection for their own homes, for their household goods, and for their own protection. And the citizens will have an opportunity to discuss this matter Tuesday evening. October 17, at the courthouse. We sincerely hope that each and every person who has even a spark of civic pride will be present at that meeting and help promote the fire-fighting equipment that we are so badly in need of. Our town is growing each day, and each time a new house is added or a new business firm, that means just one more building that should be protected from fire-man's most dreaded enemy.
