War propaganda is a subject all to itself. It apes objective reporting but is quite different. The intelligent reader, however. will soon learn to detect it, and once it is detected it is harmless. In its more brazen form pro-

paganda is the art of circulating fables and getting them repeated so frequently and through so many and varied media that the reader in time begins to wonder if perhaps they may not be true. From that it is an easy step to being convinced they are true.

This is the Propaganda of Rep. etition and the best means of detecting it is to go back to the original source and thence trace the course followed to the respectable and respected outlet from which one gets it. Sources are important.

Propaganda in a different form comprises taking a document, a situation or an incident and sending out a version of it which shows up in high relief the facts favored by the propagandist while eleminating or subordinating everything favorable to that aspect. Figures are especially unfavorable in this form of propaganda.

Although 3,000 miles distant from its shores, the United States is still the country best informed about war development. A little discrimination on the part of the reader and he will soon be able to appraise correctly that which he reads.

Thanksgiving is just around the corner and this Thanksgiving. with Europe at war; homes being destroyed and families being separated there, we in the United States have much to be thankful for. Let us show these thanks now only in our prayers but by making a contribution to either the American Red Cross or Salvation Army. worthy organizations.

## Notification of **Insurance Benefits to Veterans Retained**

Veterans' Bureau administrators have shown an extraor-1918 soldiers about hidden benefits which accrue to them under obscure amendments of the war risk insurance act.

Comparatively few war risk policy holders for instance, realize that they can collect \$57.50 a month or more. For this double Princess indemnity protection there is a small additional premium, but many veterans are fully able to pay if informed of the possibilities. In addition the amendment provides that if the total disability becomes permanent. they can collect the original 57.50 and also the \$57.50 due them from their regular policy making a total of \$115 a month. The right to the first sum does not abridge their claim resulting from holding a converted policy. So restricted is knowledge of this provision that only 23,000 blocks from home, but that of 600,000 policy holders have taken advantage of it.

The administrators have a plausible explanation however. They insist that they have publicized these benefits in official releases and through such service newspapers as the American Legion Magazine. Unfortunately


