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IS SANDERSON JUST A WIDE SPOT IN THE ROAD?

That is not the opinion of the loyal residents of our town but it does seem to be the opinion of some of the tourists and travelers who pass through on their journeys.

During the holidays, one could stand only a short time before he could see someone go through the town in an awful hurry. This, we believe is due to the fact that there are no signs stressing the point that they should go slowly. There are, of course, the regular highway signs and the sign reading "Speed Limit. 20 Miles.

These signs are not enough to cause the traveler who is moving across country in such a hurry to slow up much. If large reflector signs reading "Slow" were placed so that they could be easily seen before the speeding car got into town, they might have some effect.

Some of the dangers might be elimated also if the present blinker type of light was removed from the intersection where they are now "on the blink" and a red and green signal light put up. Few people pay attention to a caution light that is working, and since the Attorney General has ruled that the County officials cannot legally pay for the current used, it might be possible that a signal light could be obtained. We don't know who pays for the current for such lights, but we do know that it is being done in many small towns which are unincorporated, and through which the highway passes.

A signal light, besides slowing down tourists so that they might see the town on their way through, might also avert casualties among our own citizens. There have been several accidents at this intersection within the past two years that would have been eliminated had the car coming onto the highway had to come to a stop. The danger of driving onto main street without coming to a stop has also been demonstrated at several other intersections.

Were it possible to put stop signs on the main streets coming onto the highway and to obtain a signal light at the intersection where the blinker lights are. few. if any, accidents would occur with rigid enforcement. The law can easily be enforced if the proper signs and warnings are placed so the officers will not have trouble in proving the charges. We all know a car is supposed to come to a stop before being driven onto a state highway, but we know that there must be "stop" signs before this can be enforced.

Other than the dangers of improper driving on the street signs should be placed properly around the school so that school children will be better protected. Many of our local citizens do not use the caution that should be used when passing the schools, especially at the noon hour when everyone is in a hurry to get to lunch and back.

And with signs to instruct the motoring public, we people of Sanderson might get into the habit of parking properly on the streets. We might learn that there are better places to turn our automobiles around than in the middle of the street, or we might learn that it isn't safe driving when we back completely across the street when backing away from the curb and go up or down the street in the opposite direction from which we would have gone had we backed out properly.

It's everyone's fault that we drive the way we do in Sanderson, but it would be just as easy to drive properly after we became accustomed to it, and a whole lot safer for ourselves and the fellow coming down the street.




