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MAYBE WE DIN'T SAY IT JUST RIGHT

Some of our readers, in reading the editorial which appeared in the December 29 issue of the Times, concerning the \$12,000 allotment which went to Reeves County seemed to get the idea that Terrell County had been handed \$12,000 in cold cash to be spent for the right-of-way or for anything else that might come up in the way of road work.

It was not intended that this impression be created, nor do we believe that if the article is read carefully, will you read it that way. The money was allocated to Terrell County to be used on road improvement between Sanderson and the Terrell County line on the Fort Stockton highway. Nor could the money be spent for anything else other than improvement, and under the direction of the State.

Procuring of the required right-of-way on which the \$12,000 would have been spent was up to Terrell County and Terrell County would have had to pay for it. And this right-of-way would probably have cost almost as much as the State allocated for the improvement.

As stated in the previous article, we know that only \$12,000 worth of improvement on a new right-of-way isn't going to make the best road in the county, but we do believe that if we ever expect to have a paved road between Sanderson and Fort Stockton, Terrell County is going to have to purchase a right-of-way. Had the necessary land been bought for the road, there was no guarantee that we would have a better road at present but it would have been just a step nearer for we know that the State will never pave the highway in its present location.

No matter what Terrell County gets, the people of the county are going to have to pay for it. Our stand was, and is, that a good road to the north will be of much value to Sanderson and Terrell County. Whether it would repay us in the long run to work toward this goal by spending the amount required for the right-of-way is a matter of opinion.

TEXAS OUT-O'-DOORS

More Deer Killed

Despite the unseasonable hot weather which prevailed during most of the hunting season, more deer were killed in Texas during the 1939 hunting period than in 1938. Early reports to the executive secretary of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission indicated that the kill will not reach the estimate of 45,000 by the Game Department prior to the opening of the season, but probably will be approximately 40,000.

Hunting was slow during the early weeks of the season, the deer staying deep in the brush during the hot days. However, the cold wave which marked the closing week of the season brought the best hunting Texas has known in many seasons and highways leading from the counties with heavy populations of deer were filled with motor cars bearing one or two bucks.

Every early report to the executive secretary from game wardens and game managers show their checks on the deer killed indicate as many bucks brought down this year as last and many of the reports show an increase in the kill.

Best of all, however, are indications that the deer crop is in excellent shape and that there are an unusually large number of big bucks still ranging the hills.

Every sign pointed to Texas having one of its greatest hunting seasons, but the warm weather did hurt the deer hunting and the lack of moisture over most of the state prevented good quail hunting. Sportsmen in most sections of the state did not get good bob-white shooting even in the closing days of the season, but in areas where the drouth was not too severe there is an excellent crop of birds remaining for a seed crop for 1940.

Goose hunting improved during the closing days of the season but lack of watering and feeding places sent ducks on south earlier than usual and the duck season was mediocre. Texas enjoyed its best dove season in a decade, but turkeys, hard hit by the drouth were scarce.

Fox Commits "Suicide"
A rare animal in the area surrounding Gonzales, Texas, met an untimely and recently apparent hanging himself in the fork of a tree. The animal was found by E. H. Menking on the Wallace place southeast of Gonzales.

It is believed the fox accidentally caught his neck in the tree fork and could not free himself. The bark on the tree was torn by the claws of Sir Reynard in his frantic efforts to get loose.

Trap 264 Antelope
Antelope trapped in round-ups staged by the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission near Sterling City are faring well in the more than twenty localities in which they were transferred, according to reports to the executive secretary of the department.

Should the majority of the 264 antelope trapped with a loss through injury of less than 3 per cent continue to thrive it will not be many seasons until Texans can have limited open season on the fleet animals, the executive secretary said.

Far Eastern Nation Perhaps these settlements have influenced the Japanese government in its unwillingness to comply with American demands respecting China. Possibly the Ministry will be able to make concessions sufficiently great to satisfy President Roosevelt. The Commercial Treaty with Japan will expire two weeks hence. Whether a *modus vivendi* will take its place will depend upon the offers the Japanese Government will make. It is certain there will be no abatement of American demands.

Here and There: Through ages of human trial and the mystery of man the flesh has known things as bad as we see and worse; but the present crucifixions and mockeries of the spirit are in some ways unexampled. Moscow, more seriously engaged than it foresaw or intended, will postpone conclusions with Rumania and Turkey until Finland is liquidated according to plan. Japan sympathizes with Finland and well may. For it is quite certain that if Moscow's aims were accomplished on the Baltic and Black Sea the old way of the Tsars in the Far East would be resumed towards Port Arthur and Korea. There have been enthusiastic demonstrations for the Finns in Italy, which is anti-Bolshevist to the core. But the Duce will not lift a finger for sentiment. He waits. The use of Italian armaments will be guided eventually by the estimated balance of Italian interests

and by nothing else.

There is an increasing sentiment toward the fortification of Guam. It is possible this Congress will pass the necessary bill to fortify Guam. Japan, last year, when this bill came up in Congress said they would consider such an act as an "act of war." But will Japan say it now?
