Signs of the times in a motor age—these highway markers tell the story of a two-year, 100,000-mile truck test run recently completed by Chevrolet. In Canada, Mexico and every state of the Union, the truck operated on all types of highways and under every conceivable weather hazard, setting a new world mark for sustained and certified automotive operation, under the sanction and official observation of the American Automobile Association. The unit carried a 4,590-pound "payload." An average of 15.1 miles per gallon of fuel was maintained throughout the 100,000 miles, at an average operating speed of 33.07 miles per hour. Oil mileage was correspondingly high—1,072 miles per quart.

O. Henry Story Hits Screen As Range Thriller

O. Henry wrote it as "A Double-Dyed Deceiver," one of the greatest stories ever to come from the master-author's pen. Now it's on the screen as "The Llano Kid," the Paramount action drama opening tonight at the Princess Theatre, with a big cast headed by Tito Guizar, Gale Sondergaard, Alan Mowbray and Jane Clayton, an El Paso girl.

The plot of "The Llano Kid" contains the familiar O. Henry ingredients of suspense, rapid action, half-wicked, half-lovable characters and surprise. It tells a thrill-paced story of a daring young bandit who doubles for the long lost son of a wealthy Mexican family and comes face-to-face with an insoluble problem when he falls in love with the family's adopted daughter and becomes intensely devoted to his new-found "mother."

Guizar, who has ridden to radio and screen fame on his guitar, is starred for the first time, as the hunted outlaw whose sentimental streak upsets his most carefully laid plans. Opposite him, as the beautiful daughter, is Miss Clayton, familiar to outdoor action fans as the leading lady of several

"Hopalong Cassidy" thrillers. Miss Sondergaard and Mowbray have sinister roles as the conspirators who induce Guizar to attempt the masquerade.

Action sequences in the best tradition of outdoor dramas pace the plot. Among the more spectacular are the Kid's one-man hold-up of a heavily-armed Wells Fargo stage coach in a frontier dance hall and a battle to the death between ranchers and outlaws in the wild Mexico cattle country.

Account has been taken of Guizar's reputation as a singer of love songs and player of the guitar, and five new numbers have been written especially for the production by some of Hollywood's best songsmiths. The tunes are: "El Capotin," "Lullaby," "Starry Eyes," "A Happy Bachelor" and "El Huapango."

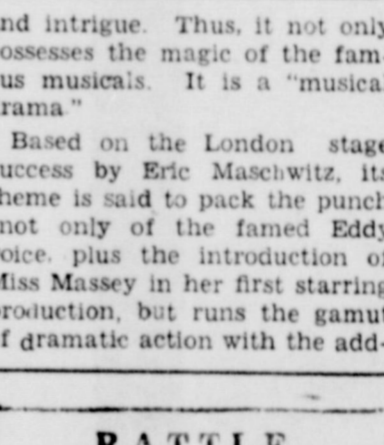
