> If Hitler can control Norway he will have an economical and tactical advantage over the Allies. Norway will supply Germany with much needed iron ore and a small amount of food stuff. Denmark has in the past supplied Great Britian with food stuff; however, this will be diverted to Germany for consump tion.

> It is reasonable to believe that Hitler and Mussolini conversed on the Scandinavian expedition. Italy has called up five additional classes numbering 650,000, to the colors for possible spring developments as Mussolini puts it. Could it be that coming events casts their shadows? It is my belief that Italy will soon cast their lot in the war and with Germany.

> The prospects of the situation logically concern Italy. Her interests in the Balkans are direct and important. She has seen Ger many and Russia expand, and she has received nothing in exchange for her policy of nonbeligerency. It is altogether probable that at their celebrated meeting at Brenner Pass Hitler informed Mussolini of his plane relative to Scandinavia, since it was immediately after that conference that German troops were trained in landing exercises. Sharp trader as he is. Mussolini must have demanded compensation, and this reasoning leads to the expectation that his plans include a step which will enable him to extend "protection" to his neighbor.

The interests of the United Sates necessarily are involved in all this manuevering. We are more greatly concerned over Greenland than was the case before the airplane became a safe and swift mode of transporta-




