

## PRINCESS Snapshots by JAMES PRESTON

It was a month ago, or a little longer. Adolf Hitler was behind the front lines of the German army that was surging over France like successive banks of grey fog. He had granted one of his interviews to an American newspaper correspondent. And the reporter asked Hitler about the "fifth column."

The "fifth column" is now the classic phrase used to describe the activities of the traitors and saboteurs in European countries who laid the preliminary ground work for the Nazi successes before a single blow was struck on

The phrase was originated by the rebel General Mola during the Spanish War. Mola declared that his troops would capture Madrid because there were four strong columns of soldiery advancing on the city and also a 'fifth column" of fascist sympathizers within the gates.




