## Dryden Airport Facilities too Limited for Gov'l. Use

Following is a letter which was received by the Hon. R. E. Thomson in reply to his inquiry as to the facilities of the Dryden airport and the possibility of its being used by the government in their training and national defense program:

"Honorable R. E. Thomson, House of Representatives, My Dear Mr. Thomson:

Supplementing letter from this office on July 17 in acknowledgment of your inquiry dated June 21 as to the plans of the War Department for further utility of airport facilities in Dryden, Texas, you are advised that after a very thorough and careful investigation, the conclusion has been reached by the War Department that airdrome facilities at Dryden are not susceptible to improvements necessary to accommodate modern aircraft unless an unusually large amount of money is spent thereon. Considerable difficulty has been experienced in the past relative to the supply of electric power and water. The population of Dryden, as well of Sanderson, Texas, is relatively small and can not accommodate any sizeable military garrison within the communities. Under the current augmentation program for Air Corps units, funds are not made available for the construction of officers or non-commissioned officers quarters which necessitates full utilization of civilian dwellings.

In view of the existence of more suitable localities elsewhere in the State of Texas, the decision has been reached to devote available funds to the improvement of airdromes more nearly approximately Class 3 or Class 4 specifications at the present time. Your personal interest in these matters of importance to our National Defense is appreciated. Yours very respectfully, E. S. ADAMS, The Adjutant General."

## TERRELL COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS TO OPEN SEPTEMBER SECOND

### HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS TO ENROLL AUG. 30-31; NEW TEACHERS NAMED

All Terrell County public schools are scheduled to open for the 1940-'41 session on Monday, September 2, according to a statement by Superintendent R. D. Holt. On the morning of September 2, a brief patriotic program will be held in the high school auditorium in Sanderson. There have been four resigna-

tions of teachers from last year's staff. Paul Patterson has resigned recently as principal of the grammar school and is to teach Spanish in the Crane high school. This position has not been filled as yet.

Miss Lillian Wiemers, a graduate of the State Teachers College at San Marcos, is to teach girls' physical education. She takes the place of Miss Mildred Rankin who resigned at the end of the last school term. Miss Margaret Lattimore has resigned her position in the Dryden school in order to attend the University of Texas. This position has not been filled. A. M. Epps, who taught in the Mexican school last year, has also resigned to enter business in Corpus Christi.

It is expected that all vacancies in the Terrell County schools will be filled within a short time.

All high school pupils are urged to enroll for their courses before Monday, September 2. Duane E. Smith, principal of the Sanderson high school, will be on hand during the week preceding the opening of school to enroll high school pupils for the courses they desire. Parents are invited to accompany their children to the school so as to assist in planning the best course for the future welfare of the pupil. Thirty-one units of affiliation are now held by the Sanderson high school. This wide range of subjects offered enables the pupil to choose the field of his interests. August 30 and 31 are set for registration of pupils.

According to figures in the office of County Judge R. S. Wilkinson, Ex-officio County Superintendent, the number of scholastics in Terrell County for 1940-'41 is 723. This is an increase of eleven over the past year. The number of boys exceeds the number of girls by 15, with 370 boys and 355 girls.

The schools last year adopted the twelve grade plan. Pupils who started in school in September 1939 and later are to attend twelve years. This is in keeping with most of the other schools of Texas and other states. During the coming year all grade numbers above the second grade will be pushed up one year. For example, the eleventh grade will be called the twelfth grade.

According to the budget report now being compiled the schools of Terrell County are ending their financial year in good shape. A small balance is being carried over after all accounts have been paid. Twenty-four teachers were employed in 1939-40, their salaries being the largest item of expense and totaling approximately \$25,000. Other principal items of expense are fuel, lights, water, insurance, transportation, and janitor's pay. A total of approximately \$20,000 was received from local taxes during the past school year, this being the principal source of revenue. The receipts from the Terrell County school lands in Gaines County amounted to \$3,000 and the state per capita apportionment for the county amounted to \$14,952. The state apportionment is to be \$22.50 per pupil for this year.

### Drivers Won't Hit What They Can See



No single factor contributes more to the traffic accident problem than the pedestrian's invisibility at night, according to "Smash Hits of the Year," tenth annual booklet published by The Travelers Insurance Company in the interests of highway safety.

Few pedestrians, and especially those who are not drivers themselves, realize how difficult it is for approaching drivers to see them during dusk and darkness, the booklet asserts. If the walker is wearing dark clothing, less than five per cent of the light which falls on him is reflected back to the driver's eyes. Rain, wet pavements and glaring headlights make matters even worse.

When wearing dark clothing the pedestrian is all but invisible at a mere 100 feet away, it is shown. If he wears something white, or carries a handkerchief or newspaper, he can be seen fairly easily at that distance.

"Never depend upon the driver's ability to see you at night," the booklet urges.

proposing an Amendment to Article 8, Section 9, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 9-A; providing that the Commissioners Court of Red River County, after a majority vote of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein, shall have the authority to levy a tax not to exceed Twenty-five (25) Cents on the hundred dollars valuation for a period not exceeding fifteen (15) years for the purpose of refunding the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of the County by the issuance of bonds under the provision of the General Laws regulating the refunding of outstanding debts of the County; providing for the necessary proclamation; and appropriating funds to defray the expenses of the proclamation, publication, and election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 8, Section 9, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto another Section to be known as Section 9-A, which shall read as follows:

"Section 9-A. Upon the vote of a majority of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein so authorizing, the Commissioners Court of Red River County, Texas, may levy an annual tax not to exceed Twenty-five (25) Cents on the one hundred

dollars valuation for a period not to exceed fifteen (15) years for the purpose of refunding all the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County and issue bonds under the provisions of the General Law regulating the issuance of bonds to refund said indebtedness.

"At such election, the Commissioners Court shall submit for adoption the proposition of whether such outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County shall be refunded into bonds, the amount of special tax to be levied, and the number of years said tax is to be levied. The funds raised by such taxes shall not be used for purposes other than those specified in the plan submitted to the voters.

The provisions of this Section 9-A shall apply only to Red River County; and the provisions hereof shall be self-enacting without the necessity of an enabling act of the Legisla-

ture of the State of Texas, but shall become effective immediately after the official canvass of the result has been made and it is determined that this Amendment has been adopted by a majority of the voters of the State."

Sec 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November, 1940 at which election al-

voters favoring such Amendment shall write on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution providing the Commissioners Court of Red River County may, upon levy of a tax and issue bonds to fund the outstanding indebtedness of the Fund of such County," voters opposing such Amendment shall write or have on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution providing the Commissioners Court of Red River County may, upon levy of a tax and issue bonds to fund the outstanding indebtedness of the Fund of such County."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby authorized to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and to have necessary amendments published as by the Constitution and amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication; and which shall be refunded to the State of Texas by Red River County out of its General or any other available funds. Provided that no election shall be held until Red River County shall first deposit with the Treasurer the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to pay such expense of publication.

proposing an amendment to Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas giving the Legislature authority to provide for appeal direct to the Supreme Court in cases involving injunctions granted or denied on the grounds of constitutionality or unconstitutionality of any statute or on validity or invalidity of administrative orders; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and expenses of publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 3-b, which shall read as follows:

"Section 3-b. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law, for an appeal direct to the Supreme Court of this State from an order of any trial court granting or denying an interlocutory or permanent injunction on the grounds of the constitutionality or unconstitutionality of any statute of this State, or on the validity or invalidity of any administrative order issued by any state agency under any statute of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the general election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR APPEALS DIRECT TO THE SUPREME COURT IN INSTANCES INVOLVING THE CONSTITUTIONALITY OF CERTAIN LAWS AND ORDERS."

and those opposed shall write

or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR APPEALS DIRECT TO THE SUPREME COURT IN INSTANCES INVOLVING THE CONSTITUTIONALITY OF CERTAIN LAWS AND ORDERS."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

S. J. R. NO. 6 A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Section 26 of Article IV so as to provide that Notaries Public be appointed by the Secretary of State of the state of Texas; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submission of this amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 26 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 26 (a) The Secretary of State shall appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for each county who shall perform such duties as now are or may be prescribed by law. The qualifications of Notaries Public shall be prescribed by law.

(b) Nothing herein shall affect the terms of office of Notaries Public who have qualified for the present term prior to the taking effect of this amendment.

(c) Should the Legislature enact an enabling law hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a special election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT NOTARIES PUBLIC BE APPOINTED BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS";

and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT NOTARIES PUBLIC BE APPOINTED BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS";

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

H. J. R. NO. 8 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 30b of Article 16; providing that the provisions of Article 16, Section 30, of the Texas Constitution limiting the duration of all offices not fixed by the Constitution to two (2) years, shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipalities that are placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of the Civil Service Law applicable thereto; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment; making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE

LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto a new Section to Article 16 to be known as Section 30b which shall read as follows:

"Section 30b. Wherever by virtue of Statute or charter provisions appointive offices of any municipality are placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service and rules are set up governing appointment to and removal from such offices, the provisions of Article 16, Section 30, of the Texas Constitution limiting the duration of all offices not fixed by the Constitution to two (2) years shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of the Civil Service law or charter provisions applicable thereto."

Sec. 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at the general election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that Article 16, Section 30, of the Constitution shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipality placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service."

Those voters opposing said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to

the State Constitution providing that Article 16, Section 30, of the Constitution shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipality placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast is in favor of the Amendment the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the

State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published, as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.
