## TEXAS OUT-O'-DOORS

### Javelinas Are Increasing

Javelinas, also called Collard Peccary, the only native north American wild hog, are increasing in Texas reports of some game managers to the executive secretary of the State Game, Fish and Oyster Commission indicate.

The increase is largely due to the protection given this game animal by a state law which went into effect last year. It is now unlawful to shoot Peccaries except during the opening season of Nov. 15 to Dec. 31. It is permissible to kill two during a season.

Javelinas are more common in Southwest Texas counties. They formerly ranged in far more areas than they do now, but the killing of them for meat, for their hides and for their bristles threatened the extinction of these animals.

Judging from requests for in-

formation concerning javelina hunting received by the Game Department, a large number of hunters from other states will invade Texas seeking Javelinas during the open season. Their heads are regarded by many sportsmen as a finer trophy than deer heads.

### Doe Battles Coyote

A battle between a doe deer, seeking to protect her young fawn, and a coyote, was witnessed by a cowboy on the McAllen ranch in northern Hidalgo County recently it is reported to the Game Department by Argyle Allen, owner of the ranch.

The cowhand came upon the doe and coyote while the battle for the life of the fawn was in progress. Every time the coyote made a rush for the young deer, the doe struck out sharply with its hoofs and the fur flew from the coyote. The battle was interrupted when the cowhand made his presence known. The coyote ran into the brush, but the doe and her fawn took their time about leaving the scene of the skirmish. The doe was bleeding slightly.

### Prolific Pair of Doves

The most prolific pair of mourning doves yet reported in Texas raised six pair of young in a rose arbor in the yard of H. A. Stuermer of Cuero last year and at the last report had raised three pair this year and were on the job with a fourth, according to a report from the Cuero Standard.

### Storm Hit Muskrats

A recent storm in Southeast Texas did considerable damage to muskrats and the extent of the damage is being studied by the Texas Game Department game manager of that region. Muskrats provide the livelihood for many trappers in the Lone Star State.

### A Big Fish

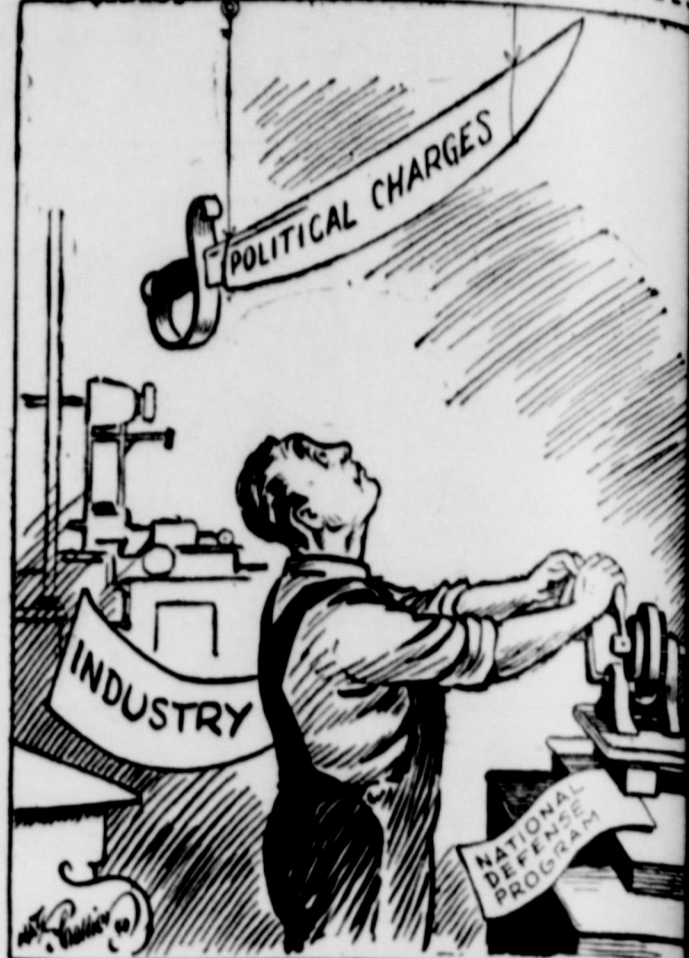

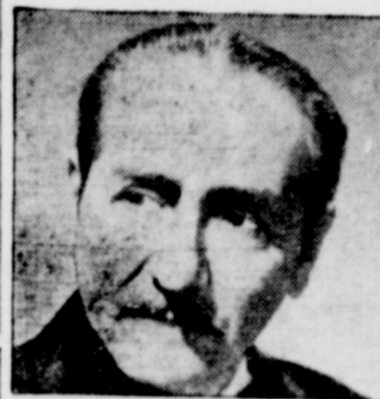

In this connection, some legis-  
lators have been brought sud-  
denly up against the realization  
that they are now passing their  
tenth tax bill in the last nine  
years. As one of them put it,  
"we've been following a let's-tax-  
this-tax-that theory until we  
don't know what we are taxing."

He points out that out of these  
ten tax bills, eight have been  
passed as late as June and only  
two earlier in the year. That  
means that industries which  
would like in December to plan  
their activities and program for  
the next full year can't do so  
because they won't find out un-  
til later what taxes they will  
have to pay for the year.

Incidentally, newspapermen  
who follow tax legislation are  
usually pretty sound judges of  
the wisdom of tax bills. In a  
recent press gallery discussion,  
a group of them suggested an am-  
endment to the so-called "ex-  
cess profits" bill. It was this:  
Strike out everything and insert:  
"Excess profits is stuff that if  
the government says you got  
any, whether you understand it  
or not, it will tax 'em—and  
heavy."

The tax bill may be big (at  
last count it was 105 pages) but  
the defense job is bigger. In a  
recent address, H. W. Prentiss Jr.,  
president of the National Associ-  
ation of Manufacturers, empha-  
sized this. He reminded that  
building a two-ocean navy is a  
tremendous job because it means  
increasing the size of the navy  
100 percent. But the army is to  
be increased 1,000 percent.

In addition, he said, the origi-  
nal 100 percent has to be  
modified to meet modern war-  
fare requirements. He said too,  
that another example of the size  
of the job is the fact that in the  
construction of a single Martin  
bomber, 400 to 600 sub-con-  
tractors are involved.

## Washington Snapshots

Flash! Common horse sense  
is beginning to make itself felt  
against emotional hysteria in  
some Congressional quarters!

That's news. It means that if  
the trend away from emotion-  
alism and toward logic contin-  
ues, the nation may yet be able  
to arm itself for satisfactory de-  
fense.

Legislative debate over con-  
scription of men led to pure hys-  
teria in which some solons talk-  
ed unthinkingly of conscripting  
wealth and industry. Now, they  
are beginning to realize that  
conscripting of industry and  
wealth would mean conscription  
of the whole nation.

The sounder thinkers are now  
convinced that only the unwill-  
ing industries and dollars should  
be confiscated. They realize that  
if "wealth" is conscripted it  
means forcing everybody to buy  
government bonds even if they  
have to borrow the money to do  
it. And they say, they can get  
the unwilling dollars through  
taxation.

Thus charges that industry  
is "sabotaging" national defense  
are boomeranging against the  
accusers. The President, the  
National Defense Advisory Com-  
mission, the Secretary of War,  
Secretary of Navy, and so on  
down the line, insist that indus-  
try is doing its part. That should  
satisfy the most violent critics.

As a matter of fact, an in-  
creasing number of legislators  
is becoming convinced that the  
hurling of such charges against  
industry in itself amounts to  
sabotage. Because it simply cre-  
ates doubt and uncertainty in  
industry at a time when it

### Lamb Chops Ideal for an Informal Meal



Lamb chops are truly a matter of "good taste." We see them here, broiled to a deep-golden bronze, served with broiled tomato halves and mushrooms wrapped with bacon. Easy to prepare and to serve, full and rich in flavor—nothing could be more satisfying for an informal meal, according to Inez S. Willson, home economist.

Loin, rib or shoulder chops of lamb are suited to broiling or pan-broiling. Broiling is the ideal method of preparing delicious lamb chops but, if you have no broiling facilities, a dry-heat method for the top of the range, panbroiling, will give excellent results.

Chops for broiling are best when at least an inch thick, although they can be broiled suc-

cessfully when only three-quarters of an inch. Place the chops on the rack and adjust so that the top surface of the meat is about two inches from the source of heat or three inches, when broiling chops are two inches thick. This distance gives a slow, even temperature, necessary if we would have the chops as flavorful and juicy as possible, with a minimum amount of shrinking.

Lamb chops one inch thick will take about 12 minutes to broil. Chops need to be turned but once; broil one side until nicely browned, then turn and finish broiling. Turn chops carefully with a fork inserted into the fat. If you puncture the meat you'll lose some of the juices.

If you like, during broiling you can baste the chops with fresh mint sauce or while they're still hot spread with mint jelly.

Panbroiling is a suitable method of cooking lamb chops on top of the stove. Place the chops in a frying-pan and brown first on one side, then on the other. Reduce the temperature and turn the meat as often as necessary to insure even cooking. Don't let the fat remain in the pan but pour it off as it accumulates.

It's hard to state definite times for panbroiling. To test the doneness, cut a small gash close to the bone near the end of the cooking period and note the color of the meat. Lamb is served well-done or nearly well-done, never rare.
