## Miss Mildred Hurst Receives Highest Honors for Work

Miss Mildred Hurst, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Hurst of this city, and a member of the senior class of Brigham Young University, Provo, Utah, is among those listed in the 1939-1940 issue of Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges. This book will be issued in January or February.

The publication is compiled through the cooperation of over 500 American universities and colleges. It is the only means of national recognition for college students which is devoid of fees, politics, and dues, and is the highest honor that a student can achieve while in college. This honor signifies excellence not only in scholarship, as does the Phi Beta Kappa key, but as a leader in all phases of college activity. Biographies of a limited number of outstanding leaders on the campus of each of the 500 colleges and universities represented are contained in the book.

The purpose of Who's Who is to serve as an incentive for students to get the most out of their college careers, as a means of compensation to students for what they have already done; as a recommendation to the business world; and as a standard of measurement for students comparable to such agencies as Phi Beta Kappa and the Rhodes Scholarship Award. Copies of these books are placed in the hands of leading companies and employers who annually recruit outstanding students for employment.

Miss Hurst is a member of Tau Kappa Alpha, national honorary forensics fraternity; Phi Chi Theta, national honorary commercial fraternity for women; and White Key, honorary service and scholastic society. During her freshman year, she was a member of the Junior Varsity debating team, and during her sophomore year she participated on the Varsity debating team. Miss Hurst has served as corresponding secretary and historian of Phi Chi Theta and at present is secretary of Tau Kappa Alpha. She is also secretary of the physical education athletic departments at the university.

Miss Hurst was graduated from Sanderson High School in 1937, being salutatorian of her class. During her high school career, she was active on the debating team and represented her school in shorthand at the state interscholastic league meet in Austin.

## FUNERAL RITES FOR MRS. M. T. CARTER ARE HELD SUNDAY

The body of Mrs. Margaret Tennessee (J. E.) Carter, whose death occurred at Bowie, Texas, after an illness of six days, was brought to the home of her daughter, Mrs. Clyde Higgins, Saturday, November 30th, and was laid to rest in the Sanderson Cemetery by the side of her husband J. E. Carter, on Sunday, December 1, 1940. Mr. Carter died August 18, 1921.

Mrs. Carter had lived near her oldest daughter, Mrs. W. W. Philley, since 1927 after selling the Carter ranch twenty miles north of Sanderson to Joe Brown and Bud Holmes. For the past several years she has gradually declined in vigor and for the past two years her daughter, Mrs. Philley, has spent practically all of her time, day and night, by the side of her mother who has been exceedingly feeble for that length of time. The devotions and attentions shown by her children to Mrs. Carter has been outstanding; and for the past few years they often gathered in her home fearing each time might be the last.

Margaret Tennessee was born on a farm near Cleburne, Texas, on October 18, 1857, the youngest of a very large family. Her parents were Patsy Jane and Andrew W. O'Hara. Her twin brother died soon after birth.

On August 8th, 1880 she was married to James Elihu Carter of Bowling Green, Ky., at her father's home near Cleburne; going to Bowling Green to live. After living only a short time in Kentucky the couple moved to Arkansas where their eldest children, Lawrence and Ida were born. They soon moved to Clay County, Texas, establishing themselves on a farm. Here, Elsie, Stella and Quinton were born and they suffered their first loss in the death of Stella, a charming two year old baby girl.

In 1891 the family moved to Haskell County where they lived very industriously and frugally in order to acquire a farm for their enlarging family. Here, Bertha, Myrtle, and Grace were born. (Continued to back page)

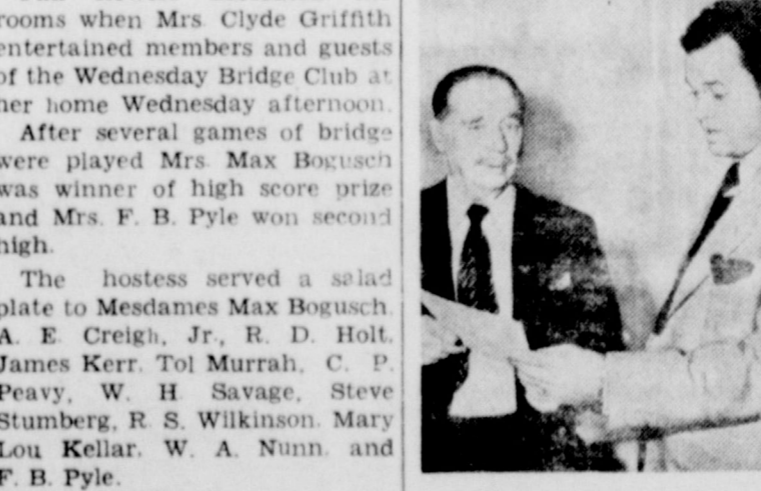
Postmaster Clyde Griffith said today that Christmas Seals were beginning to appear on Christmas mail in increasing numbers.

Many letters asking for information concerning oil interest in Terrell County have been received in the past few weeks, and efforts are being made to furnish a weekly report of this news through the columns of the Times.

Little news has been carried heretofore, but there was little activity in the county previously. Quoting one of the present oil operators in Terrell County: "It takes money and a lot of it to make news in the oil business". It is hoped that this activity is now under way and that it will be possible to continue this weekly column of information.

A discovery of oil near Sanderson would be the greatest benefit toward the completion of the proposed Big Bend National Park and the securing of a paved road to the north that can just be imagined at this time.

Wells were reported this week as follows:

Sides and White Bassett Mineral Trust and Landon Rose No. 1, southwest corner of section 15, Block 148, T. and St. L. Drilling below 125 feet where they have lost several days time due to the encountering of crevices in hard lime.

State Consolidated Oil Co. No. 1 Holmes, northeast corner of section 14, block A-2. Drilling at 600 feet.

Briggs et al. No. 1 Kerr, section 18, block D-4. Preparing to resume drilling.

Chas. E. Detweiler et al. No. 1 Sam Bell. Remains shut down pending plans to deepen.

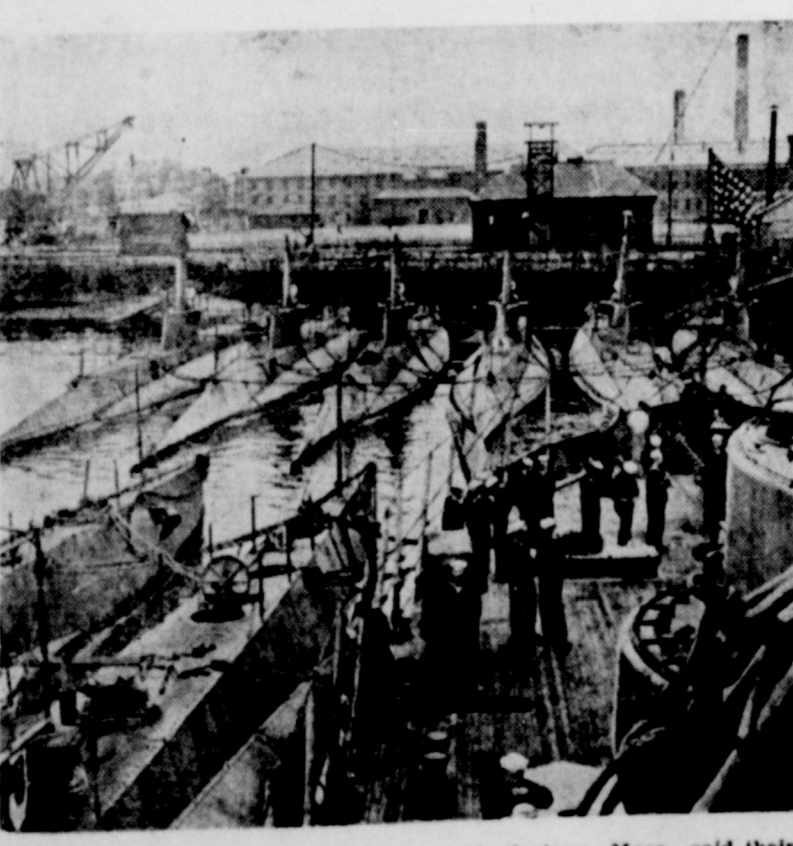

## Sanderson Cagers Win San Felipe Second Game

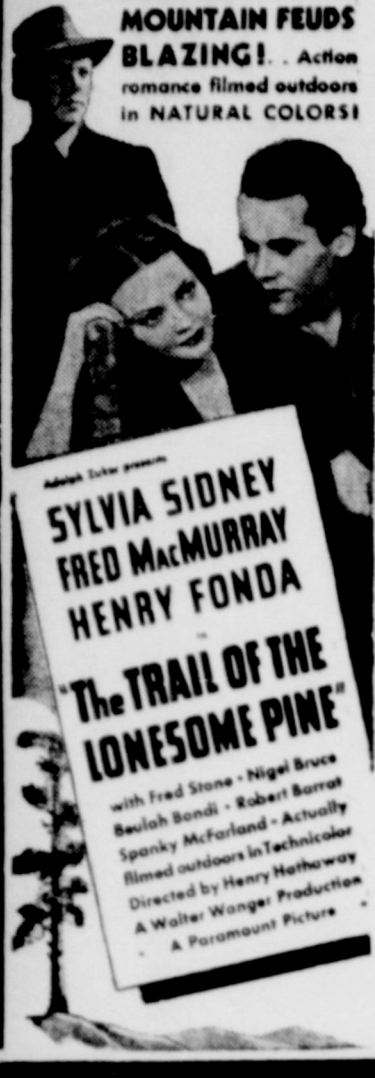

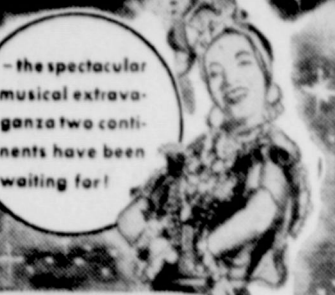

born and Lawrence Ida, and Elsie were married. This family was considered early settlers of Haskell County.

In 1907 they bought the "Burnt Ranch" and the White Ranch near Carrizo Springs and moved the family, household goods, etc., overland by way of hack and wagons—a sixteen day sojourn—to cover about three hundred and fifty miles. The family lived in Carrizo Springs until 1913 when they traded ranches and belongings for the Patterson ranch twenty miles north of Sanderson. Mrs. Carter considered the years-lived on the Terrell County ranch the happiest of her life, until her husband died in August 1921. She never gave up thinking of Sanderson as her home; nor did she ever withdraw her membership from the Sanderson Methodist Church to which she contributed regularly and generously. Because of her interest in this church the members and pastors have considered her a beloved benefactor.

Wherever Mrs. Carter has lived her doors were left open to friends, strangers, and to her children's friends. The children could not eat too much of the abundance of good food she prepared; laugh too loud, make too much jolly noise or play too hard to suit her. She had great patience with and an understanding of children and other guests her family had gathered together in her home. The long dining table was set two or three times almost every Sunday for dinner. People lost, caught in a storm, or water bound were welcomed and cared for by this good woman. Guests marveled at her ability to house the crowds. She could always pull out another feather bed and quilts to accommodate another guest. Many a hungry traveler remembers Mrs. Carter with gratitude.

Best of all she was a good mother; living a hard but happy sacrificial life regardless of her delicate physique and her frequent sick headaches. She was diligent in seeing her children religiously trained and she often sacrificed for their education. She taught industry by example and leadership. When her body became so weak that she could no longer help others she began to tire of living. Even after she had lost the ability to feed herself she insisted over and over again: "What can I do?"

Mrs. Carter was stricken at about 10 o'clock Friday night, November 22 after asking repeatedly, "Am I tucked in good?" For six days afterwards she was unable to eat, drink, speak or recognize anyone. Five of her children and one granddaughter were in constant attendance on her, doing all the nursing and watching. She passed on at about 7:00 o'clock in the morning of the following Friday.

A simple but impressive service was held for her in the Presbyterian Church at Bowie with the Methodist pastor officiating. Her eldest son, Lawrence, joined by his wife, daughter and son at Spofford, accompanied her body to Sanderson. The many friends who called upon Mrs. Higgins to offer words of sympathy to the family, homes to relatives, food for the bereaved and many other services attest the love and the high esteem many people of Sanderson have for the family.

The Rev. J. Y. Bowman, pastor of the local Methodist Church, officiated at the funeral services held in the Methodist Church and at the cemetery. The Rev. W. E. Rector of Carrizo Springs, a former friend of the family, was present to assist in the services. His remembrances on his associations with the family were very complimentary to the mother, consoling to the bereaved and inspiring to Mrs. Carter's friends and relatives.
