Bitterweed, most persistent menace to the ranching industry, was the topic for discussion when AAA representatives, county committeemen, county agents and interested men in the industry from 18 West Texas counties met for a conference in Sonora Wednesday morning.

## TERRELL COUNTY OIL NEWS

Among those visiting Terrell County oil well sites this week was W. E. Keeney of Pecos County and R. C. Dickenson of the Sinclair-Prairie Oil Co.

A geophysical survey crew (magnetometer) have been working in the north end of the county for the past few weeks for the Phillips Petroleum Company.

One of the largest oil wells yet brought in, in Crockett County, was reported tested at the rate of 10,000 barrels per day this week.

Sides and White Bassett Mineral Trust and Landon Rose No. 1, southwest corner of section 15, Block 148, T. and St. L. Shut down awaiting the repair of a broken drill stem. Drilling probably resumed today at 175 feet.

State Consolidated Oil Co. No. 1 Holmes, northeast corner of section 14, block A-2. Drilling at 700 feet after losing several days when a crevice was struck and it was necessary to re-drill a part of the hole of straighten it. Passed the crevice and going on down.

Chas. E. Detweiler et al. No. 1 Sam Bell. Remains shut down pending plans to deepen.

### WITH OUR NEIGHBORS

Ozona Stockman—Approval of the proposed creation of what is to be known as the Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 for the purpose of acquiring the local water and sewer systems and operating the systems under the water district plan, was given by the Board of Water Engineers of the state following a hearing in Austin Monday of this week.

Fort Stockton Pioneer—An addition to the village of Imperial, Pecos Valley farming town near the recent discovery of deep oil in Northern Pecos County, is being laid off this week, with a 40-acre tract being grubbed of brush, and streets being graded.

McCamey News—Upton County's \$294,000 road bond issue to build a road from Rankin to the Midland county line was voted down in McCamey last Monday, when McCamey taxpayers went to the polls and cast 317 votes with only 40 being cast for the issue.

In Rankin 206 votes were cast

with only seven being cast against the issue.

Monahans News—Construction of a new \$3,000 warehouse for the "use of the public under the supervision of the Commissioners" was approved by the Commissioners' Court meeting in a special session last Saturday.

The new building will be 100 feet by 60 feet by 30 feet high. It will be built on the lots adjacent to the State Highway warehouse just south of the city limits of Monahans and it was understood yesterday that work would be started immediately.

Big Bend Sentinel—Engineers are completing work of surveying in detail a Marfa area one and one-half miles square, including the present airport, which may become an airport recognized and approved as a part of the national airport program.

Hudspeth County News—The Medina Mining Company is shipping ore from their Eagle Mountain properties to the El Paso smelter this week. Buster Hillin is doing the hauling. The ore runs silver and lead.

## NEW BOOKS FOR SCHOOL LIBRARY ARE PURCHASED

Six volumes of poetry have been purchased for the high school library. The books are "The Best Loved Poems of the Hazel Felleman who was editor of the Queries and Answers page of the New York Times Book Review over a period of 15 years. During this time Miss Felleman learned something of the poetry preferences of the American people because the majority of inquiries that she received were for favorite poems. She used the knowledge gained in this position rather than her own personal liking in the selection of poems in this volume. "Poems of Today" by Alice Cooper is a group of 20th century poems compiled to show how poetry is a reflection of this period; "Recent Poetry" by French is a group of poems which interpret the life of our country. The group includes poems by Edna St. Vincent Millay, Amy Lowell, Carl Sandburg, Karl Wilson Baker, Joyce Kilmer, Robert Frost, Edwin Markham and others.

"It Can Be Done" collected by Joseph Morris and St. Clair Adams are poems of inspiration; "Pieces That Have Won Prizes" by McHale consists of both prize winning prose and poetry selections; and "Modern Lyrics" by Kate Dickinson contains poems by representative modern poets designed to develop an interest in modern poetry. ### Guard Against Pneumonia Warns Health Officer

Austin—From now on until after March, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State health officer, states that every one must be on guard against pneumonia. Last year 3,551 Texans died of this disease, and it is believed that many of these deaths could have been prevented had the patient called a physician early.

The onset of lobar pneumonia is usually sudden and is characterized by chills, fever, severe pains in chest, and coughing up of rust-colored sputum.

A person who has suffered an attack of pneumonia does not need to be told how swiftly it attacks. One can be feeling simply chilly and languid. During the next day or two these disagreeable sensations continue and the average person pays little attention to them. If one has been coughing for several days, he attributes everything to the cold. Then comes a chill, and with it comes pain—not a stitch, but a stab a continued rhythmic stabbing with every catching breath.

New treatments for pneumonia have been perfected, but to give any of these methods a fair chance of accomplishing a cure, a diagnosis must be made early, preferably before the first chill or at least soon after its appearance.

Pneumonia is spread by contact, but this type of germ does not live long outside the human body. There are thirty types of this germ. Many persons do not realize that pneumonia is a catching disease. Relatives and friends will visit freely the person convalescing from pneumonia, although they would not think of sitting in the sickroom of a smallpox patient. Both are communicable and dangerous diseases. Having a physician early when any of the symptoms appear is the best method of stopping this needless loss of life.
