

Speaking to a sober, reflective. joint session of the Senate and House, and galleries crowded with several thousand people, Governor W. Lee O'Daniel carefully diagnosed the ills of the State in two installment speeches last Thursday and Friday, and as carefully proposed the remedies that would cure them. Not once did a cheer break the silence, and only at the conclusion of the speeches was he applauded. With three radiophones in front of him. the Governor was really speaking to a larger audthe Legislature on trial before the people who had elected

From apparent reactions, the House swallowed both "doses" without winking an eye. but Senators slated theirs generously with adverse criticism. One ought to write the whole program into one bill and pass it without even committee consideration." Said one Senator: "O'Daniel and I still agree on only one thing: that part about Jesus Christ and the Ten Commandements."

O'Daniel recommended: (1) Give the governor power to fire. as well as hire, the members of six-year boards and commissions (O'Daniel claims the 100 commissions spend three-fourths of the State's money, do their own tax-collecting and banking. owe responsibility to no one, and actually constitute a Fourth Branch of the government. ruling without the will of the people.)

(2) Empower the Governor to appoint the State Budget Director. (3) Make the State Auditor an appointee of the Legislature, and not of the Governor. "Who ever heard of a corporation manager hiring his own auditor to audit his accounts?" O'Daniel queried). (4) Require the deposit of all State Moneys in the State Treasury instead of in the various special funds which now exist. (5) Vest all possible collecting powers in the office of the State Comptroller. Departments collect their own taxes and fees now, have their own bank accounts, spend as they please.) (6) Submit a constitutional amendment requiring that the Governor cannot sign an appropriation bill unless there is attached to it a report from the State Comptroller showing that funds are available for paying the appropriation. (This will stop deficit. spending, the Governor declared.) (7) Set up a State merit system for hiring employees.

O'Daniel further recommended: better farm to market roads; prohibition of liquor advertising in dry territories; increase of the truck load limit. to at least 14.000 pounds; limi-

the Legislature, whose duty he said is to enact laws for the State as a whole and not for separate counties; appropriate money to buy land for the proposed Big Bend National Park prohibit State officials from seeking other public offices until their terms of office with the State have expired (expressly aimed at members of the Railroad and Highway commissions) abolish the death penalty in favor of an irrevocable life sentence; abolish the State poll tax; redistrict the State legislative and judicial districts in accordance with the 1940 census; and guard against legalizing gambling and sale of liquor by drink. because there are other ways of paying for government than through the sale of vices

In his second message Friday O'Daniel took up Social Security financing, which he termed the No. 1 Problem of the State. Specifically he asked for \$74.500,000 additional funds annually to be raised by a Natural Resources Tax on oil (3.75 cents per barrel); sulphur (\$1.23 a ton); natural gas, 1/2-cent per 1.000 cubic feet; a Gross Receipts Tax on utilities (1.85 per cent); telephones (2.2 per cent); and amusement admissions (1.5 per cent) and a 1.6 per cent Transactions Tax on all business transactions
