the screwworm cases originated | Life has no blessing like a prufrom the eggs of one species of dent friend - Euripides fly that can survive only in -0wounds of living, warm-blooded CAN YOU IMAGINE? animals.

"Eliminate this primary fly and the trouble is removd.'

The eggs hatch in aproximately six to twenty-one hours and after three to ten days the worms drop from the wound into the ground to complete the cycle by germinating a new generation of flies, seven to fourteen days later.

The present is a crucial stage in the conception of the next crop of flies. and D. C. Parman, associate entomologist, reporting on the outlook, says:

"There is a large number of immature stages of the fly in the soil from November infestations on the western Balcones escarpment (Kinney county) but worms dropped early in November had not emerged as flies up to December 9. But flies were emerging from October dropped worms and those lightly infested wounded animals in December. Since warm weather was experienced in the latter part of Deember and the first few days in January, all wounds will be infested on the western escarpment and some bad cases may be expeted. February 1 is the best time for


making wounds on animals for fewer cases of screwworms and all winter cases should be treated to prevent high spring populations of the fly and a bad screwworm year."

The over-wintering area of the fly extends to the Rio Grande from a line starting with Terrell County and extending across Val Verde. Kinney and Uvalde. Frio. McMullen, Live Oak, Bee. Refugio. Calhoun, and across the southeastern parts of Jackson and Matagorda

But the fly travels only 35 miles a week, and dies in temperatures of 55 or less and in extreme heat. Therefore, Cushing says, hunt out and destroy the fly in its immature stages in the wound and the hazard of infestation also is destroyed.
