The week's legislative work was highlighted by passage in the House of the Kersey-Morris road bond assumption bill, which renews for two years the existing law. This law excludes from the assumption privilege all bonds voted or issued since January 2. 1939. Also it continues to allocate among the counties what is left of one-fourth of the proceeds of the gasoline tax after bond requirements have been satisfied.

Gov. O'Daniel's second Anti-Strike bill requiring a 30-day cooling-off period in labor disputes. was passed; new legislative districts were set up by final House vote (the 87th District is the same as before, except that it will be called the 115th); a State Land Bank and the construction of a State Office Building were authorized in constitutional amendments (to be approved by the people); and the House in a resolution Thursday requested the Federal government to take full charge of the Social Security program.

Among the measures signed into law this week by Governor O'Daniel was the new Speed Law, setting the maximum speed for autos at 60 miles per hour, and trucks at 45 miles per hour.
