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It Happened in Sanderson TEN YEARS AGO This Week—Remember?

Friday, June 19, 1931

Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Teel of Houston, and Mrs. W. C. Weddell of Christoval, will arrive the latter part of this week for a visit with Mr. and Mrs. Lindsey Hicks at their ranch home near Dryden. Mr. Teel will take the train from here the first of the week for a business trip to points in California.

Pete Crawford, State Game Warden, with headquarters in Alpine, was a business visitor in the city the first of the week.

Ten years ago this week there were no accidents reported, and the main interest of the town and county, seemed to be in the American Legion's rodeo, which was held on the 19th and 20th. The usual events, connected with a rodeo were held, and all business houses were reported closing at noon each of the two days...twelve men were reported added to the Border Patrol effected July 1, as stated by the Del Rio Herald. Selection of the new men, five of whom were to fill vacancies, were not named but would be chosen from those successfully passing an examination, held throughout the Nation the month previous. It was stated that there were 29 districts of the Border Patrol in the United States, according to government records. A report of the Junior Young Peoples picnic was noted. The affair was under the sponsorship of the Womens Missionary Society of the Methodist Church. The picnic was held three miles north of town Fri-

day afternoon. A great time by all was reported. The Baptist were to celebrate on the 21st inst. The occasion was the 2nd anniversary of the pastorate of the Rev. Ira Harrison. The occasion consisted of a special program Sunday morning of song, music, and history of the organization from its inception to that date. After the program a picnic dinner was served in the basement of the church. The invitation to attend was extended the general public—"come, bring your baskets, and let us spend a few hours in fellowship together at God's house. Mineral Wells National Guard camp came in for \$1,154 for a new administration building. A large crowd was reported attending the Chandler Rodeo. Fort Stockton Pioneer—Valuations for Pecos County for 1941 taxation are expected to show a decline of about one million dollars from the 1940 total of 44 millions it is estimated by Judge H. H. Butz.

Cookery QUERY CORNER

There's no need for a spattered oven or a scorched surface of the steak if you follow the right method of broiling. That important rule, "A low temperature for cooking meat," holds good for broiling as well as roasting. So the solution to your problem from the source of the heat so that the meat cooks slowly and is nicely browned. For a steak one inch thick allow a distance of two inches; for a thicker steak, three inches. No spattered oven, so hard to clean! No smoky kitchen! And it's easy on the cook, too, for she doesn't have to stand over the steak turning it often. When one side of the steak is done, season it with salt and pepper, turn it and brown the second side and the steak is ready to serve. This method is also used in broiling chops and patties.

WHEN SHOULD A ROAST BE SALTED?

Salt your roast whenever you find it convenient, before you put it in the oven, when you take it out, or at any time between. In fact, you needn't salt it at all. You can be a thorough individualist about salting a roast! For steaks and chops, the rule is that they should be salted after they are browned. Salt has a tendency to draw out the juices of meat, but in the case of a roast, with its small proportion of exposed surface, this doesn't make much difference. As for the idea that the salt will "cook into" the meat, this doesn't seem so important because salt penetrates only a short distance into the meat anyway. Most cooks find that seasoning a roast before it is put into the oven is the most convenient way.
