ORGANIZATION OF **COMPANY C GETTING** WELL UNDER WAY

Announcement was made this week by Captain D. L. Duke, Company C of the 46th Battalion. Texas Defense Guards, that organization of the company was well under way with 39 men on the list to date. He stated that 50 men would be required before the company would be accepted and guns and ammunition issued.

It is hoped that the additional men. ages from 18 to 64 years eligible, will soon be secured so that the company may be approved. At present members of the company train each Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock at the courthouse lawn as their regular training period, and each Thursday and Friday evenings as supplementary periods. These additional training periods are for the members who are unable to be present one of the other evenings. Some members are unable to be on hand Thursday evening while some will be unable to be there Friday evening. At times there are also occasions when they will not be able to be present for the regular training period Monday evening because of business or other matters.

It should be definitely understood that any man who joins the Texas Defense Guards may receive an honorable discharge at any time be requests it. This discharge will be given by the local officers in command and will be given at once without any red tape whatsoever. The training should be especially beneficial to those young men who will be required to enter the army for a year of military training within the next few months. The advance training will familiarize them with the marching and other routine of army life and should put them just that far ahead of those who have had no training. 





> WHEN SHOULD A ROAST BE SALTED?

Salt your roast whenever you find it convenient, before you put it in the oven, when you take

it out, or at any time between. In fact, you needn't salt it at all. You can be a thorough individualist about salting a roast! For steaks and chops, the rule is that they should be salted after they are browned. Salt has a tendency to draw out the juices of meat, but in the case of a roast, with its small proportion of exposed surface, this doesn't make much difference. As for the idea that the salt will "cook into" the meat, this doesn't seem so important becaus salt penetrates only a short dis tance into the meat anyway
