Selective Service Office Open Only

Announcement has been made from the Terrell County Selecctive Service Board that future office hours will be from 1 o'clock until 5 o'clock each afternoon with the exception of Saturday when the office will not be opened.

In the past the office has been kept open each day from 8 o'clock in the morning until 5 o'clock in the afternoon. Registrants will find it necessary to make their calls at the office during the afternoons and days other than Saturday.

Watt Page, State Selective Service Director, for all Texas registrants to: "Consult your doctor and your dentist to correct any remediable physical defects before you are called for School auditorium at examination by your local board."

Calling to attention that statistics compiled by National Selective Service Headquarters show a high rate of rejections of registrants for remediable physical disabilities, General Page suggested that registrants awaiting call for military training should endeavor to fit themselves for acceptance not only as a patriotic duty in a period of national emergency, but also in the interest of public health as well as for their own personal tainment that will please anywell being.

Must Be Renewed

For the purpose of expediting the renewal of Texas operator's icenses, provision has been week during the summer. made whereby they shall expire and be subject to renewal according to numbers. The numbers on the licenses, printed in red ink, are divided into four groups with one group expiring and becoming renewable at a time.

The first group, beginning with number 1 and including 450,000 will expire December 31, 1941, and these licenses may be renewed on or after October 1, 1941, must be renewed by the time the old licenses expire, or December 31, 1941.

The second group, bearing serial numbers from 450,001 to 900,000, expire March 31, 1942. and may be renewed on or after January 1, 1942.

Those bearing numbers from 900.001 to 1.350.000 make up the third group and will expire June 30, 1942. They may be renewed on or after April 1, 1942.

Licenses bearing serial numbers from 1,350,001 and upward, including all numbers issued on or before September 30, 1941, will expire November 1. 1942. These may be renewed on or after July 1, 1942.

Person holding driver's licnse should check the serial number of their license and take note of the expiration date and when it can be renewed. Renewals will be issued by the Highway Patrol who visit Sanderson each Friday afternoon from 1 until 1:30 in an office at the courthouse. No announcement has been made as to whether more frequent visits will be made for renewing the


